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The District of Columbia Board of Elections convened via Videoconference, pursuant to notice at 3:30 p.m. EST, Gary Thompson, Chair, presiding.

3	CHAIR THOMPSON: Good afternoon to the
4	two people that are here.
5	My name is Gary Thompson, the Chair of
6	the Board of Elections. Also attending is Karyn
7	Greenfield, fellow board member that's two out
8	of three, so we have a quorum.
9	This special meeting has been duly
10	noticed and the agenda has been circulated.
11	There's only one matter on the agenda and at this
12	time I would move that we adopt the agenda, as
13	advertised.
14	MS. GREENFIELD: Second.
15	CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, here we
16	go.
17	And I see that Mr. Philip Newland is
18	present, and we appreciate you being here, Mr.
19	Newland.
20	And that's the purpose of our being
21	here is it's an appeal from a adverse preliminary
22	determination on your eligibility for ballot

access to be the ANC commissioner for a ANC Single Member District 1E05.

Just a few introductory remarks from me. Number one, thank you so much for being willing to serve as the commissioner for this SMD. I believe it's empty and that you are the only person so far to step forward to take the seat.

I also looked at the map and I noticed, I believe this is Howard University and McMillan Reservoir, with some residential areas. So, thank you so much for stepping forward for this particular neighborhood.

And before I say anything else, I'll turn it over to our general counsel Terri Shroud for background.

MS. SHROUD: Good afternoon, everyone.

As the Chair noted, this is an appeal from an adverse determination of eligibility, made with respect to the nominating petition that Mr.

Newland submitted in support of his candidacy for the Office of Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner

in Single Member District 1E05.

Mr. Newland picked up the nominating petition on January 18 and filed it on January 30, which was a timely filing.

And I just want to say at the onset that Mr. Newland's petition will be posted for a five-day challenge, if it has not been already. During which, members of the public will be able to review and challenge the petition.

So, any determination the Board makes today is not outcome determinative, in terms of the question of whether or not you, Mr. Newland, will be able to be a candidate in the contest.

And so, what the Board is addressing today is simply the resolution of the preliminary determination reached by the Executive Director, through her designee Registrar of Voters, Ms.

Marissa Corrente. So, we're just here for that limited issue today.

On January 30, Mr. Newland submitted a petition that contains three sheets, which contained a total of 26 signatures -- one above

the number required for ballot access.

Pursuant to rule 1605.3 and 1605.4 of Title 3 of the DC Municipal regulations, within three business days following the deadline for filing petitions, the executive director or their designee shall issue a preliminary determination of petition sufficiency.

In order to be determined sufficient, a nominating petition has to contain the minimum statutory number of signatures required to obtain valid access for the office sought, on sheets that contain complete affidavits.

And I will defer to the Registrar of Voters to discuss the result of her review of the nominating petition, with respect to those requirements that I just set forth.

MS. CORRENTE: Thank you. So, when we reviewed the three petition sheets, we found that none of the circulator affidavits were dated.

So, just like Counselor Shroud said, there were three sheets, they contained the 26 signatures, but those dates for the circulator affidavits

weren't there.

So, the other necessary information, the circulator name, address, and signature were there, but they were just missing the dates on each page for that particular piece. So, that was the reason that we issued the adverse preliminary determination letter.

And to clarify, too, the petitions were posted during the regular challenge period.

And that challenge period started also on

February 2, and ends today -- that would be the end of the challenge period.

MS. SHROUD: Okay. And, what else -I would add that Mr. Newland submitted to the
Registrar of Voters a letter -- and I'll let him
speak to that -- or the Board will let him speak
to that, regarding the circumstances around which
he circulated the petition.

And so, but he is here to be questioned by the Board. And, to the extent that there are any questions, we could swear Mr.

Newman in. Since he's going to be testifying

regarding the circumstances under which he circulated the petition, Mr. Chair.

CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah. Mr. Newland, thank you so much. If you could unmute, that would be great.

I'll let you speak to this but I really just have one question. The signatures are all applied January 20 to, it looks like about January 23, 4, 5 -- as noted, there's no date next to the signature of the circulator.

This is an issue that typically we allowed to be cured by the candidate testifying under oath as to the date that the sheets were signed, which you could do presently.

So, that's my question, is -- on what date did you affix your signature as circulator on these three sheets? If you could speak to that question. And, I guess, Terri, maybe if you want to ask him to do so under oath?

MS. SHROUD: Sure. Mr. Newland, do you swear or affirm that the testimony that you're about to provide is the truth, the whole

1 truth, and nothing but the truth? 2 MR. NEWLAND: T do. 3 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yep. Please qo 4 ahead, Mr. Newland. 5 So, first off, MR. NEWLAND: Yes. just thank you, everyone, for meeting today. 6 Ιt 7 sounds like I'm the only agenda item, so I 8 appreciate the time. 9 The main thing for me is I just want 10 to apologize, it was an oversight on my part. 11 And I think I described this in the letter, but the first time that I have run for any sort of 12 13 public position like this and I just, I don't 14 know, got nervous or something submitting them. 15 I remember picking up the sheets and 16 it was explained to me that, you know, the date 17 at the bottom can't be, you know, before the 18 dates that are signed by individual people. 19 the recommendation was to wait until the end of 20 the day to do it. 21 So, I was saving it until the end to 22 do and then just, something in submitting the

paperwork I just completely forgot about it. So it was an oversight but I did -- all of those signatures were between, I think it was the 20 through, I think, the 24.

So, it should have been dated by, you know, the end period of me doing that -- from those couple days of going around and knocking on doors. But, again, it was just an oversight because, I don't know, I think I got caught up in sending all the different pieces of paperwork required.

CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, really appreciate that. I was an ANC commissioner myself for eight years and I remember the first time I picked up my papers, I was, you know, a little nervous about everything. I can't remember whether I did it correctly or not -- if I did it incorrectly, no body caught it.

But thank you for that. So, just to be clear, when you signed as the circulator at the bottom, you did so on a date that was subsequent to each and every one of the

1 signatures made by individuals? 2 MR. NEWLAND: Yes. I signed those 3 sheets when I went into submit them, which I think was the last day that they were due. 4 5 Because I wanted to make sure that I didn't miss anything, but obviously I did. 6 So --7 The last day they CHAIR THOMPSON: 8 were due, I think was the 27? 9 The 30 of January. MS. SHROUD: 10 MR. NEWLAND: Yeah. So, I held them 11 until the 30 and I signed them in the office when 12 I went in-person to submit everything. 13 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. 14 All right, well, as I mentioned, 15 that's, I believe from precedent, something that 16 is curable -- that I believe you just cured. 17 You know, there are certain things 18 about this that can't be cured. Like, you can't 19 submit 23 signatures and then show up later and 20 say, I got more people here to sign today. 21 But not dating the circulator 22 signature is something we have waived before, and

1	I believe it's appropriate to waive it today.
2	And so, I'll just put a motion out there to do
3	so, to waive the defect and allow you valid
4	access.
5	I see Karyn raise her hand you're
6	on mute, though.
7	MS. GREENFIELD: I second it. Sorry,
8	I was on mute.
9	CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. All in
10	favor?
11	(No audible response.)
12	CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, see how
13	isn't this quick on a nice, Spring day.
14	So, we've passed the motion and I
15	don't know if there's anything else for us to do
16	at this point. I'll ask General Counsel Shroud
17	for that.
18	MS. SHROUD: Nope. We have completed
19	the business that we were convened for today, and
20	a written order on this matter will issue
21	shortly. And I think that concludes this matter.
22	MR. NEWLAND: All right. Mr. Newland,

1	I don't know if anyone else is going to run for
2	this spot, maybe, maybe not, but best of luck.
3	MR. NEWLAND: Thank you. Thanks,
4	everybody.
5	CHAIR THOMPSON: So, I'd move we
6	adjourn.
7	MS. GREENFIELD: Second.
8	CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor?
9	(No audible response.)
10	CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. We are
11	adjourned, have a great afternoon, everybody.
12	(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter
13	went off the record at 3:43 p.m.)
