I hereby call to order the Special 4 Meeting of the Board of Elections to declare 5 and certify a vacancy in the Office of the 6 Ward 8 Member of the State Board of Education 7 among other information and to receive a 8 9 preliminary update of the April 1, 2014 primary election preparation update. 10 It is Tuesday, March 18th. 11 The time is 10:34 a.m. 12 I am Deborah Nichols, Chairman of 13 the Board of Elections. 14 Present with me this morning is 15 Mr. Stephen Danzansky. 16 We are meeting in Room 280 North 17 18 in One Judiciary Square. Also present this morning are Mr. 19 Kenneth McGhie, the General Counsel to the 20 Board and Mr. Clifford Tatum, the Board's 21 Executive Director. 22

I will turn the meeting over to

Mr. Tatum to make a presentation regarding the

vacancy in the Office of the Ward 8 Member of

the State Board of Education.

MR. MCGHIE: Before Mr. --

CHAIR NICHOLS: Oh, I'm sorry.

I'll turn it over to Mr. McGhie for the legal citation.

MR. MCGHIE: Yes, Mr. Trayon White who was the Ward 8 Member of the Board of Education submitted his letter of resignation on Friday which was -- no, on Monday, March 10th and pursuant to D.C. Code Section 1-1001.10(e)(1), the Board of Elections has to declare -- certify a vacancy in that office and after a vacancy has been certified, the Board must establish or set an election date.

So, the Board at this meeting will be required to entertain two motions. One would be to certify the Office of Ward 8

Member of the Board of Education as vacant and then to certify an -- or schedule an election

1 date.

And Mr. Tatum has prepared an outline of how the Board would administratively go about that process.

CHAIR NICHOLS: All right. Thank you, Mr. McGhie. Mr. Tatum.

MR. TATUM: Thank you, Madam

Chair. Mr. McGhie is correct in that we received a notice of resignation from Mr.

Trayon White and as a result of that notice, the Board is required to certify a vacancy and then announce the election date.

Based on the date that we received the notice, the resignation, the Board has according to the statute the requirement to hold an election on the first Tuesday within or outside of 114 days at which the contest is certified vacant. So, as the Board certifies that vacancy for today, well, actually it's certifying it vacant as of yesterday, March 17th, the staff has determined that the first Tuesday after March 17th would be July 15th,

1 2014.

And as a result of that date, July 15, 2014, we then look to the calendar to determine when the nominating petitions would be made available and when the challenge period would be and I'm prepared to give the Board those dates and set them forth in the calendar.

According to the statute, the nominating petition would begin 90 days before the election contest itself. So, as of March the 24th, the staff would make the nominating petitions available for the Ward 8 vacancy. The nominating petition deadline would be April the 16th, 2014. The challenge period for those nominating petitions would be April the 19th, 2014. The challenge period would end on April the 28th, 2014.

At which point, the Board would then have 20 days to resolve any challenges.

The deadline for the Board to resolve all challenge petitions would be May 19th, 2014

which would then result in the contest appearing on the ballot on July 15, 2014.

This would be a Ward 8 only contest. There are 17 precincts in Ward 8 and one early vote center. We would be required to do the in-person absentee as well as the early voting. The question then becomes whether we'd open up a satellite location or simply conduct an in-person here in Judiciary Square.

We have done some preliminary projections on the cost for this election and we looked to our historical records for conducting a ward only contest and we found that in May 2012 we conducted a ward only contest and that contest cost exactly \$280,536 and that contest was, of course, two years ago. So, we believe that conducting the contest for this special would cost us approximately the same. We, of course, would attempt to mitigate costs where possible to reduce the cost as much as possible.

options for this election for the Board to 2 consider and those options are, number one, to 3 conduct a vote by mail program for this 4 special election wherein the Board would send 5 a paper absentee ballot to every registered 6 7 voter in Ward 8. There are currently 54,087 voters in Ward 8 and we would expend postage 8 on the ballot going out to Ward 8 voters and 9

We have looked at alternative

the postage on the ballot returning to us from the Ward 8 voters and we project that that

cost would at the current postage rate at 69 cents per ballot would cost us approximately

\$1.40 per ballot which would equate to

15 \$75,000.

And additional costs associated to ordering those ballots and extra ballots and establishing staff and working the vote center, we project that at a minimum the early -- if we conducted a vote by mail project, it would cost us approximately \$162,000.

The second option is to

amendment of the vacancy statute which would allow the Board to waive the 114-day special election requirement to move the special election to the November general ballot so that there wouldn't be a special election on a separate day. We could hold that election on the same day as the November general election. That option would cost the Board no additional cost.

The third option that we discussed is to ask the Council to consider amending the statute to allow for the State Board or some interested stakeholder to appoint a replacement for the vacant seat that would fulfill that seat until holding a special election in the November general election.

Both of those options would require -- all three of the options would require an amendment to the legislation by Council. So, as the General Counsel's pointed out, we would have to amend 1-1001.10(b)(1) to

Page 10 1 allow for mailing ballots. That statute requires us to open polling places on election 2 So, we would add in the mailing option. 3 dav. The second option would be to 4 amend 1-1001.10(e)(1) to waive the 114-day 5 time line to extent the contest to the 6 7 November ballot. And the third option would be to 8 name a replacement which is also in 1-1001.10 9 10 and I don't have the specific -- (f), 1-11 1001.10(f). Yes, 10(f). So, those are the three options 12 13 for conducting this election. The first option would cost us -- the main -- the 14 current statutory obligation would cost us a 15 minimum of \$280,000. The second option would 16 17 cost us nothing. I'm sorry. The second option would cost us a minimum of \$162,000. 18 The third option would cost no money. 19 20 MEMBER DANZANSKY: Mr. Tatum --21 may I ask, Madam Chair? CHAIR NICHOLS: 22 Yes. Yes.

1 MEMBER DANZANSKY: Do we have money in our budget, the \$280,000, given the 2 fact that we're holding a major election this 3 year in November and primary in April? 4 MR. TATUM: No, we do not have 5 those funds in our budget. 6 7 MEMBER DANZANSKY: Okay. CHAIR NICHOLS: So, this would 8 require a supplemental budget from the 9 10 Council. 11 This would require a MR. TATUM: supplemental budget from the Council and --12 13 CHAIR NICHOLS: And the Executive. MEMBER DANZANSKY: 14 Well, perhaps, this may not require a motion, but it seems to 15 me that it might be our sense of the Board 16 17 that we notify the Council of the fact that there are not sufficient funds to conduct a 18 selection and give them the three options 19 because it will require legislation on their 20 21 part and do that in some formal way with

Council is meeting on a structured schedule if you will during this primary season. They're having one meeting per month. Their next meeting is scheduled for April. I'm not sure of the exact date. I think it's April the 8th which is after our -- we have a Board meeting scheduled for --

CHAIR NICHOLS: Okay.

MR. TATUM: Actually, I think our Board meeting is scheduled later in the month. So, I think we'll -- I think they're meeting the first or second week in April. So, we would communicate our recommendations to Council -- to the Government Operations Committee and then the Council Members.

If they take up the recommendation, it would require emergency legislation on their part and assuming that they pass emergency legislation, then that would by waiving the 114 days and announcing or either waiving the 114 days and/or creating the ability for the State Board to appoint a

TATUM: The next item is an update on the April 1, 2014 election 14 preparation and up until yesterday, things 15 were chugging along rather smoothly I would 16 17 say. We generated our ballots and our absentee ballots meeting our February 7th, 18 2014 deadline and that included the supplies 19 for absentee envelopes, instructions sheets 20 and we've mailed out over 3,000 absentee 21

ballots to domestic voters as well as 250-plus

22

ballots to military and overseas voters.

So, ballot-wise, we've received all of the paper ballots delivered to the warehouse from the vendor. We're going through and dividing the ballots. Accounting for all the ballot orders to make sure we've ordered the -- we've received the correct numbers and we're placing the ballot orders onto what we call the truck delivery schedule so that we can have ballots delivered to the precincts.

We conducted L&A on all M100s that are going out on election day and are used for early voting and we've completed the L&A for the iVotronics that are being used for early voting as well as for election day. There are a total of 130 units being used. Those being used for early voting and 286 units -- I'm sorry. Three hundred units being used for election day.

Every polling place will receive two iVotronics. There is 12 polling places

that will receive three iVotronics and that's based on the captains requesting additional units based on their -- the demand from registered voters there.

Voter registration, the deadline to register by mail is March the 14th.

Actually, it was March the 4th. The deadline to register in person at the DMV or at our -- or at any NVRA location was March the 14th.

That has come and gone. We are processing applications into the system, any last minute applications, that came in through the mail postmarked as of the 14th into the system.

We're conducting a vote at the jail program and based on the snow that happened on Monday, we weren't able to pick up the applications from those folks. So, we're picking those up today. Those applications will be added into the system and that will be the last of the NVRA applications being added, registered voters being added to the system.

Any other voter that wants to

register now will have to do so same-day registration at the early voting center or at their polling place on election day.

We have -- as part of the early voting process, we have opened One Judiciary Square downstairs for in-person absentee -- in-person absentee runs from Monday, March 17th through Saturday, March 22nd and then early voting starts March 22nd through March 29th with the exception we're closed on Sunday, March 23rd.

The early vote center for One
Judiciary Square has both paper ballots for
every polling place as well as an iVotronic.
We were able to program the iVotronics to have
every ballot style on a single iVotronic. So,
we didn't have to bifurcate any of the
iVotronic machines. So, when a voter comes
in, they can go any machine and vote their
particular precinct ballot.

We talked about the early voting queue which demonstrates -- indicates that the

wait times at the early vote centers --we've deployed the queue and as of today, it's working well and it shows that the early vote center at One Judiciary Square is open and as of last night, at the close of business yesterday, at the close of the early vote center, we had 158 voters who appeared at the early vote center to vote.

As part of the election process yesterday, we did observe and witness what we would describe as an error on the Spanish ballot, electronic Spanish ballot, in that the final page of the electronic Spanish ballot has a misinterpretation if the voter -- wherein the voter who has not cast a vote in all of the contests on the ballot receives a message that has been misinterpreted between English and Spanish and so, what we know is that when a voter votes on the touch screen, if they make every selection, the summary screen tells them you've voted your ballot, press confirm and cast your ballot.

If you skip a contest, the instruction sheet tells you that you've skipped a contest. The misinterpretation in the case is that you've left your ballot blank. That's an incorrect interpretation.

It does not impact the way the machine actually tabulates the votes. The votes -- any selections that the voter has made will be tabulated. The instructions simply misinforms the voter.

So, to address that, we have created what we call a Spanish insert that will be handed to every Spanish-speaking voter that wants to vote on the touch screen. That advises them there's a misinterpretation on the last page. This is what it should say and your ballot will be counted regardless of whether you vote every contest or not.

We will deploy that Spanish insert to every early vote center and to every polling place to be used on election day. We will also do a press release that announces

that there's a misinterpretation and this is how we intend to resolve it.

We believe that that will address the misinterpretation, but we'll be prepared to address any questions that actually come forward.

We have at the early vote center downstairs sample Spanish paper ballots that we will pass out to the voters that come in that want to vote in Spanish. That gives them the Spanish interpretation of the paper ballot. So, if they prefer to vote a paper ballot, we have the sample Spanish ballot so that they can vote the English paper ballot and we'll do that same thing for the election day voting precincts.

The other early vote center sites, they only have iVotronic voting. So, if someone wants to vote a paper ballot at those early voting sites, they'll have to come down to One Judiciary Square or they'll have to wait and go vote on main election day.

1 CHAIR NICHOLS: So, not to interpret you but just to be clear, the issue 2 is with the instructions only on the 3 electronic ballot. The paper ballot instructions are accurate. 5 MR. TATUM: That is correct. 6 7 CHAIR NICHOLS: But, also, all the 8 votes that you cast whether you cast them on 9 every contests or not will be counted. 10 MR. TATUM: That is correct. That 11 is correct. CHAIR NICHOLS: Will be counted. 12 13 MR. TATUM: If you make a selection, it will be counted. 14 CHAIR NICHOLS: It will be 15 counted. 16 17 MR. TATUM: And we conducted L&A launching accuracy on every touch screen unit 18 as well as M100. So, we know that if you make 19 a selection, that vote will be counted 20

regardless of what that written instruction

says.

TATUM: And I want them to be 15 16 aware that every vote is precious and we 17 expect every vote to be counted. 18 CHAIR NICHOLS: Absolutely. MR. TATUM: And we know that every 19 vote that's cast will be counted. 20 21 CHAIR NICHOLS: Absolutely. 22 MR. TATUM: The absentee process,

as indicated, is moving forward. The deadline to request an absentee ballot is March the 25th. As of today, we -- as applications come in, we're turning those applications around within the next business day. So, we're being steadfast in getting the absentee ballot out as quickly as it comes in.

The e-Poll Books at the early vote center are operating according to plan. They are syncing with one another and are syncing with what we call the broker here in the accounting center.

And at the end of the night, we're able to update the voter registration system with every voter that's voted on election -- during early voting so that we will update that list on election day. So, if you voted early voting, it will show that you voted early voting. If you go to your polling place on election day, it will already show that you voted and if you insist that you didn't, you will have to vote a special ballot.

1 CHAIR NICHOLS: Okay.

MR. TATUM: And for this election cycle, we've included -- we've added the -- well, we've reshaped the signature capture period. So, we'll be able to see every signature that's cast on the early voting to compare that signature from your early voting sign-in to your signature on the special ballot --

CHAIR NICHOLS: Okay.

MR. TATUM: So, we'll be able to see whether -- if perhaps -- we know historically folks have -- not hysterically, but historically some folks have signed in on the wrong line.

CHAIR NICHOLS: Yes. Right.

17 Right. Right.

MR. TATUM: So, we'll be on the lookout for that.

The early vote center connectivity at the satellite locations have been tested and they're ready to go. We will retest them

on Thursday and Friday and deploy all equipment to the satellite locations on Friday night for opening on Saturday, the 23nd.

All notifications for precinct relocations have been mailed out to voters.

So, everyone that had a precinct reassignment or relocation has received notice of that.

The website has been updated with notice of those relocations.

Voter Guides have been mailed out to every resident in the District.

CHAIR NICHOLS: Yes.

MR. TATUM: And staff did a good job on the Voter Guide. It contained no errors. I'm pleased to say that and it also lists the precincts that have been relocated.

The poll workers are being trained. We obviously missed training a group of captains yesterday because of the snow day.

Once the government was closed, the building was closed. So, we didn't have a training class. So, we'll reschedule those captains.

We've already rescheduled those captains to later this week and next week and anticipate having all the training completed by Wednesday or Thursday of next week. Which is well in time for the April 1 primary.

The media, we've been doing bus signs. So, running on the back of the buses throughout the city. We've placed what we call sandwich boards, the stationary ads, at key locations within the Metro stations. TV PSAs are running. Print -- not print and radio, but radio PSAs will begin --

MS. ROBINSON: Actually, they started on March 3rd.

MR. TATUM: Okay. So, radio PSAs are running as of March 3rd and print publications will go out on March the 16th.

The Washington Post.

MS. ROBINSON: Well, the sample ballot will go out on the 16th, but there have been ads that have been running in communities and --

The early vote results will be the first results that'll be posted on election night and we have -- with the increase of the area reps and technical rovers, we anticipate each rover is assigned to a smaller number of precincts so that they -- on paper, they should be able to get the results back down to

us faster. Caveat to that, each precinct now will be closing two iVotes instead of one.

CHAIR NICHOLS: Right.

MR. TATUM: So, there will be a little bit of -- I anticipate that they'll be a little bit of delay in getting those results down to us because now they're closing more -- CHAIR NICHOLS: Right.

MR. TATUM: -- machines than they have in the past.

The tech rovers will be assisting the captains. We identify the captains who we anticipate -- which precincts will need some support in closing those machines and we measure that throughout the day with how effective the captain is performing with changing the roll on the iVotronics.

The M100s is the turning of a key. So, that's not a big deal for us there.

As always has happened in the past, somehow there's a captain who does close a machine down properly. Which means we don't

get those iVote results back to us election
night and we arrange with PSD to or Public
Works to try to get into some of those public
facilities to get the results that night, but
if we don't, we'll get the results. We'll
print. We'll run the paper results that night
and if we have to go back, we'll run the
iVotronic results the next morning.

It seems to always happen. That's one of the performance measures that we've put into place for our captains, but with their being two iVotes this time, I'm being cautiously optimistic.

CHAIR NICHOLS: Okay.

MR. TATUM: So, that's election night. If all goes as expected, we should be out of here by 11:15/11:30.
