3 MR. THOMPSON: All right. Good  
4 morning, everybody. Happy belated Groundhog  
5 Day. We're all still here. My name is Gary  
6 Thompson. I'm the chair of the Board of  
7 Elections. Welcome. With me is Karyn  
8 Greenfield, my fellow board member, and we  
9 constitute a quorum of the three-member board.  
10 First thing we do is adopt our agenda, which  
11 has been distributed and reviewed in advance.  
12 And at this time, I'll move the agenda, and  
13 I'll take a second as a favorable vote as well.

14 MS. GREENFIELD: Second.

15 MR. THOMPSON: All right. The agenda  
16 being adopted. Also, our minutes from our last  
17 meeting have been distributed and reviewed.  
18 And at this time, I would move that we adopt  
19 our minutes as well.

20 MS. GREENFIELD: I second.

21 MR. THOMPSON: Our minutes are  
22 adopted. And with that, we will hear from our

1 executive director, Monica Holman Evans.

2 MS. EVANS: Good morning, and thank  
3 you. This is the executive director's report  
4 for January 2025. First, the Election Center  
5 held the Joint Election Officials Liaison  
6 Committee Conference in Pentagon City from  
7 January 8 through January 10. Several members  
8 from our office attended the conference.

9 Election Center staff asked the Board  
10 of Elections to host an office tour during the  
11 conference. Election officials from all over  
12 the country toured our offices on January 8.  
13 Staff members were able to provide information  
14 regarding the differences between the District  
15 of Columbia and other elections jurisdictions.

16 On January 16, I met with advocates of  
17 the local Resident Voting Rights Amendment Act.  
18 They have some concerns about the requirements  
19 of the current legislation. We are discussing  
20 the possibility of rulemaking and other changes  
21 that will align with the desired intent of the  
22 legislation.

1                   Voter registration rolls. In January,  
2 we registered 2,500 new voters and processed  
3 4,228 registration changes. In total, we  
4 prepared 6,728 voter registration cards to be  
5 mailed. Additionally, 50 registered voters  
6 moved out of D.C. and 180 voters canceled their  
7 D.C. registrations and registered with other  
8 jurisdictions. And 869 voters registered in  
9 D.C. after canceling their registrations in  
10 other states.

11                   Online voter registration. We are  
12 continuing to register voters using our website  
13 portal. And to date, we have processed over  
14 95,915 applications using the portal. These  
15 include new voter registrations and updates to  
16 existing registrations. In January, we  
17 registered no non-citizens to vote in local  
18 elections. Total non-citizen registration is  
19 980. Since the election, we have seen a  
20 noticeable decline in the number of non-citizen  
21 registrations.

22                   Restore the Vote. The Restore the

1 Vote Division has finalized the statistics from  
2 the general election. I previously reported  
3 that we had 1,173 D.C. residents in the Federal  
4 Bureau of Prisons registered to vote with 654  
5 voting, which represents a significant  
6 increase. Now I can report that the Department  
7 of Corrections had 655 registered voters with  
8 544 voting, the latter of which is an increase  
9 of approximately 225 percent over the 2022  
10 general election.

11 Of the 544 votes in the DOC or  
12 Department of Corrections, 428 were in-person  
13 and 116 were cast via mail ballots. The  
14 Department of Corrections' efforts are laudable  
15 as the number of people that voted in-person  
16 was twice that of the previous election.

17 Additionally, 172 people took  
18 advantage of same-day registration and voted  
19 immediately afterward. The Division has now  
20 turned its attention to working with the  
21 Corrections Information Council or CIC on  
22 reporting out various statistics and developing

1 any necessary legislative recommendations as  
2 required by the Restore the Vote Act.

3 2025 Next Steps Off Election Year  
4 Planning. We are looking at the 2024 general  
5 election and exploring areas improvement and  
6 assessing the need for new equipment. We are  
7 taking steps to fully implement new legislation  
8 ahead of the 2026 election cycle, and that  
9 includes reviewing the requirements of the  
10 Automatic Voter Registration Expansion Act.

11 Additionally, we are exploring updates  
12 to the Election Worker Training Manual,  
13 developing the 2025 Voter Education Outreach  
14 Plan, and assessing our plan for Vote Center  
15 and Mail Ballot Dropbox locations.  
16 Additionally, we will convene all of our  
17 vendors together to develop a strategy to  
18 conduct a mock election later this year.

19 List Maintenance. List maintenance is  
20 an ongoing process. Our data team will  
21 continue to focus on keeping voter registration  
22 records accurate and up-to-date by conducting



1 essential tasks such as identifying registrants  
2 who have moved, whether in-state or out-of-  
3 state, verifying deceased individuals,  
4 addressing duplicate records, identifying  
5 ineligible voters, and active voters.

6 We are working with ERIC or the  
7 Electronic Registration Information Center, the  
8 Department of Motor Vehicles, the U.S. Postal  
9 Service, and the Department of Health Vital  
10 Records to verify and cross-check data,  
11 ensuring the accuracy of the voter registration  
12 database.

13 As far as our biennial mail canvas, we  
14 are conducting the canvas to confirm the  
15 residential addresses of voters who were  
16 eligible but did not participate in the 2024  
17 presidential election. This will involve  
18 mailing a first-class, non-forwardable canvas  
19 postcard to the addresses listed in our  
20 records. We're in the process of finalizing  
21 the address confirmation postcards and plan to  
22 mail approximately 135,000 canvas postcards in

1 February. The card will be sent to our vendor  
2 next week.

3 As far as technology and  
4 cybersecurity, we are continuing to assess our  
5 technology infrastructure to identify necessary  
6 replacements or upgrades, ensuring readiness  
7 for the next election cycle. We are working  
8 with our election partners to conduct a  
9 nationwide cybersecurity risk assessment to  
10 evaluate our current environment, and we are  
11 following the assessment we will see -- well,  
12 we will receive to customize report with  
13 recommendations to strengthen our threat  
14 environment.

15 Voter Education and Outreach. During  
16 the month of January, the Voter Education and  
17 Outreach Division participated in two events on  
18 behalf of the agency. These events included  
19 the naturalization ceremony at the U.S.  
20 District Court and a day of action with the  
21 American Association of People with  
22 Disabilities.

1 Election Worker Division. We are  
2 reviewing feedback from site coordinators and  
3 looking at takeaways from the 2024 election  
4 cycle. Accordingly, we are exploring updates  
5 to election worker recruitment and training.  
6 We are also updating our materials based on  
7 feedback and new legislation.

8 ANC vacancies. We currently have 32  
9 active ANC vacancies for the 2025-2026 term.  
10 These positions are in different stages of  
11 being filled. After candidate filing  
12 requirements are met, an open vote of  
13 registered voters of the affected SMD will be  
14 held during regularly scheduled AMC meetings.

15 Special Election. We have been  
16 fielding questions and providing information  
17 regarding the possibility of a special  
18 election. Yesterday, the D.C. Council voted to  
19 expel the Ward 8 Council Member. After we  
20 receive the expulsion resolution from the  
21 Council, we will take steps to certify a  
22 vacancy at our meeting that will be held on

1 Friday, February 14th. And that concludes my  
2 report. Thank you.

3 MR. THOMPSON: All right. Thanks very  
4 much. In case people didn't catch that, we're  
5 going to hold a special meeting on Friday,  
6 February 14th, I believe at 1 o'clock to take  
7 up the issue of a special election to be held  
8 as a result of the vacancy created by the  
9 expulsion of the Ward 8 Council Member. With  
10 that, I'll turn to our General Counsel, Terri  
11 Stroud.

12 MS. STROUD: Thank you, Mr. Chair.  
13 The first item on my agenda is a notice of  
14 proposed rulemaking to Title 3 of the D.C.  
15 Municipal Regulations. This is being proposed  
16 on behalf of the Office of Voter Services for  
17 the Board. And what this amendment would do is  
18 to allow tuition and housing statements from  
19 District of Columbia Colleges and Universities  
20 to be accepted as valid and acceptable proof of  
21 residence.

22 The issue that we were finding is that

1 some of the institutions will have the student  
2 voter's residence address on the tuition or  
3 housing bill while others include it on a  
4 separate statement. And so including the  
5 statement as acceptable proof of residence will  
6 ensure that all students could provide valid  
7 documentation.

8 And should the Board allow me to  
9 proceed with publishing this rulemaking in the  
10 D.C. Register, it is anticipated that it would  
11 be published in the February 14th edition of  
12 the D.C. Register, which means that the  
13 deadline to provide comments would be March 17,  
14 2025. And of course, we will post the proposed  
15 rulemaking on the Board's website at the  
16 conclusion of the Board meeting.

17 And so at this time, I would ask for a  
18 motion that the Board permit me to send this  
19 rulemaking for publication in the D.C.  
20 Register, at which time would commence a 30-day  
21 review period during which voters may provide  
22 comments on the rulemaking. And then we would

1 take final rulemaking action after the close of  
2 the comment period. And so with that, I ask  
3 for the Board's motion.

4 MR. THOMPSON: All right.

5 MS. STROUD: And a roll call vote.

6 MR. THOMPSON: Yes, so moved. As you  
7 suggest, I would move -- allow the General  
8 Counsel to forward it for publication.

9 MS. GREENFIELD: And I second.

10 MS. STROUD: Okay. And so we have the  
11 Chair voting.

12 MR. THOMPSON: Chair votes aye.

13 MS. GREENFIELD: I vote aye.

14 MS. STROUD: Okay. And with that, as  
15 indicated, I will submit the rulemaking for  
16 publication in the D.C. Register such that it  
17 will be published, not this Friday, but the  
18 next Friday, which will be February 14th.

19 The next item on my agenda is  
20 litigation status. We have eight matters to  
21 discuss. The first is Stacia Hall v. the  
22 Board. That case is in the U.S. Court of

1 Appeals for the D.C. Circuit. This is an  
2 appeal from the U.S. District Court's denial of  
3 a challenge to legislation allowing non-  
4 citizens to vote in local election. The  
5 Solicitor General for the District's cross-  
6 appeal reply is due on February 19th, that  
7 there's been no new activity in this matter  
8 since the January 15th Board meeting.

9 The second matter is Charles Wilson v.  
10 the Mayor and the Board. That's in the D.C.  
11 Court of Appeals. This is an appeal from a  
12 decision by the D.C. Superior Court denying the  
13 appellant's challenge to initiative measure  
14 number 83 for the reason that it was untimely  
15 filed. All pleadings are due, have been filed  
16 in this matter, and there's been no new  
17 activity since the January 15th Board meeting.

18 The next matter is Long v. D.C. Board  
19 of Elections. That's in the U.S. District  
20 Court for the District. This matter results  
21 from the November 26, 2024 removal of a matter  
22 from the D.C. Superior Court -- of the Long

1 matter from the D.C. Superior Court to the U.S.  
2 District Court.

3 In that matter, the plaintiff was  
4 seeking \$10,000 in damages for an overdraft fee  
5 caused by a stop payment on a check issued for  
6 his service as an election worker. The removed  
7 action is pending in the District Court, and  
8 there's been no new activity since the last  
9 Board meeting.

10 The fourth matter is Deirdre Brown v.  
11 the D.C. Board of Elections. That's in the  
12 D.C. Court of Appeals. On August 7th of 2024,  
13 the petitioner sought review of the  
14 certification of initiative measure number 83.  
15 All of the pleadings have been filed in this  
16 matter, and there's been no new activity since  
17 the last Board meeting.

18 The fifth matter is Calvin Gurley v.  
19 the Mayor and the Board. That's in the D.C.  
20 Superior Court. This matter involves a  
21 complaint filed by the plaintiff on November  
22 18, 2024, which challenged initiative measure



1 number 83. There's been no new activity in  
2 this matter since the last Board meeting.

3 The next matter, number six, is Young-  
4 Bey v. the D.C. Board of Elections. That's in  
5 the D.C. Court of Appeals. This was a  
6 challenge filed by a resident at the D.C.  
7 Department of Corrections where he sought to  
8 challenge the outcome of the Advisory  
9 Neighborhood Commission single-member district  
10 7F08 seat.

11 On January 15th, the Court denied the  
12 Office of the General Counsel's request for  
13 reconsideration of the case due to a timing  
14 issue. And the Court denied the Office of the  
15 General Counsel's request, but also denied a  
16 rehearing request from Young-Bey. They ruled  
17 in the Board's favor on the merits. And so  
18 this case is now closed.

19 Item number seven is Shep Sobin v. the  
20 D.C. Board of Elections. This is in the D.C.  
21 Court of Appeals. On December 9th, the  
22 plaintiff petitioned the Court, or the

1 appellant petitioned the Court, to overturn the  
2 2024 general election results with respect to  
3 Advisory Neighborhood Commission 2A09 seat and  
4 declare him the winner.

5 On January 15th, the Court denied  
6 Sobin's rehearing request and denied the  
7 General Counsel's motion for leave to file a  
8 response to such request. So the case was  
9 dismissed, and this matter is now closed.

10 The final matter is Sobin v. the D.C.  
11 Board of Elections, and that's in the U.S.  
12 District Court for D.C. On January 13th, the  
13 plaintiff filed a complaint in the U.S.  
14 District Court in which he alleges that the  
15 Board's petition circulation process requiring  
16 candidates to gather signatures violates the  
17 Americans with Disabilities Act, and he also  
18 requested that an Advisory Neighborhood  
19 Commission election be held in his, that the  
20 election to be held in his single-member  
21 district was illegal.

22 At this juncture, there's not been any

1 action in that matter, and that concludes my  
2 litigation status and my report overall.

3 MR. THOMPSON: All right. Thank you  
4 very much. Now we'll hear from Office of  
5 Campaign Finance.

6 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: For the  
7 record, the full report of the activity of the  
8 Office of Campaign Finance for the month of  
9 January 2025 will be posted on our website,  
10 ocf.dc.gov, before the close of business today.  
11 I will, however, highlight a few items of  
12 interest for the public from the report.

13 First, the D.C. Auditor, on January  
14 the 28th, 2025, issued a report on the status  
15 as of December 31, 2024, of the recommendations  
16 which were made in the January 31, 2022 final  
17 audit report for several entities of the  
18 District Government, including the Office of  
19 Campaign Finance. The D.C. Auditor was  
20 required by the Fair Elections Act to audit the  
21 Fair Elections Program following the first  
22 cycle of its administration.

1           The Auditor had found that overall the  
2 Fair Elections Program was run well, but there  
3 was room for improvement, and she made 11  
4 recommendations. The Auditor found in the most  
5 recent report that six of the 11  
6 recommendations have been fully implemented and  
7 that five of the recommendations were in  
8 progress. The report is under review, and the  
9 Office of Campaign Finance intends to fully  
10 comply with the Auditor's report.

11           In our Fair Elections Program during  
12 the month of January, with respect to the 2024  
13 election cycle, again there were 20 certified  
14 participating candidates in the Fair Elections  
15 Program, and the agency authorized the  
16 disbursement of the total sum of \$2,830,041.15  
17 from the Fair Elections Fund in base amount and  
18 matching payments. The 2020 election cycle  
19 ended on November the 5th, 2024, the date of  
20 the general election.

21           During the month of January, there  
22 were no new candidates who were certified in

1 the Fair Elections Program for the 2026  
2 election cycle, and no disbursements were  
3 authorized from the fund during the month of  
4 January. The Fair Elections Program conducted  
5 34 desk reviews of amended reports of receipts  
6 and expenditures during the coverage period of  
7 this report and issued 16 requests for  
8 additional information as a result of the desk  
9 reviews.

10 With respect to remitted funds, as of  
11 January 31, 2025, the total sum of \$872,102.58  
12 has been remitted for deposit in the Fair  
13 Elections Fund. With respect to the ongoing  
14 2022 post-election full field audits, again the  
15 Office of Campaign Finance issued 42 post-  
16 election audit letters for the June 21, 2022  
17 primary election and the November the 8th, 2022  
18 general election to candidates who were  
19 certified to participate in the 2022 election  
20 cycle. The audits were initiated in March of  
21 2023.

22 To date, the Fair Elections Program

1 has issued 26 final audit reports for the 2022  
2 election cycle including the following audit  
3 report which was issued in January. Brian  
4 Schwalb, Brian for D.C. Principal Campaign  
5 Committee, the post-election audit report was  
6 issued on January the 14th, 2025, and this was  
7 a compliance audit report.

8 In our Public Information and Records  
9 Management Division, there were two dates for  
10 the filing of reports of receipts and  
11 expenditures during the month of January. The  
12 January 1 activity report by the Constituent  
13 Service and the Statehood Fund Program and the  
14 January 31st report of receipts and  
15 expenditures by Political Action Committees and  
16 Principal Campaign Committees. The real-time  
17 images of the reports are available at the OCF  
18 website for public review.

19 During the month of January for the  
20 2026 election cycle, we did have one candidate  
21 who registered in the traditional program and  
22 that was Nicholas Dorsey who registered on

1 January the 22nd, 2025 for the Office of Mayor.  
2 With respect to committee registrations, we had  
3 one new committee registration and that was a  
4 recall committee, the Committee to Recall D.C.  
5 Attorney General Brian Schwalb. The committee  
6 registered on January 27, 2025.

7 In our Reports Analysis and Audit  
8 Division, and that is our traditional campaign  
9 finance program, the Audit Branch conducted 26  
10 reviews of reports of receipts and expenditures  
11 and also issued 9 requests for additional  
12 information as a result of those reviews.

13 There were no new audits issued by the  
14 Division. However, the FEP Program -- I'm  
15 sorry. The Traditional Audit Branch is  
16 assisting with the audit of an audit which was  
17 initiated by the FEP Program. It's a post-  
18 election audit for the 2024 election cycle. It  
19 is the Committee to Elect Eboni-Rose, and the  
20 audit fieldwork is in progress with respect to  
21 that audit.

22 Also, the traditional, I would just

1 mention, the traditional audit program did in  
2 fact initiate on February the 3rd the following  
3 audits for the audit of newly elected officials  
4 who participated in the 2024 election cycle.  
5 And those audits are Re-elect Trayon White,  
6 2024, Jacque for D.C., 2024, T. Michelle  
7 Colson, State Board of Education, Ward 4, Re-  
8 elect Eboni-Rose for Ward 7. And again, those  
9 are newly elected officials and those audits  
10 will be conducted by the traditional campaign  
11 finance audit program.

12 And I would also mention for the  
13 record that in our Fair Elections Program, the  
14 Fair Elections Program also initiated on  
15 February 3rd 20 audits of the participating  
16 candidates who were certified in the Fair  
17 Elections Program during the 2024 election  
18 cycle. And that concludes the report for the  
19 Office of the Director, but I would ask our  
20 General Counsel William Sanford to give the  
21 report for our legal division.

22 MR. SANFORD: Good morning, Mr.



1 Chairman and distinguished Board Member  
2 Greenfield. My name is William Sanford,  
3 General Counsel for the Office of Campaign  
4 Finance. During the month of January 2025, the  
5 Office of the General Counsel received 29  
6 referrals, completed 12 informal hearings and  
7 issued 12 orders, which included the following.  
8 3 orders were issued in which no fines were  
9 imposed and 9 orders were issued in which a  
10 total of \$14,675 in fines was imposed.

11 During the month of January 2025, the  
12 Office of the General Counsel imposed fines  
13 against the following respondents. A fine of  
14 \$2,000 was imposed against the Principal  
15 Campaign Committee McDuffie '22. A fine of  
16 \$2,700 was imposed against Friends of VJ 4, for  
17 Ward 4. A fine of \$2,050 was imposed against  
18 our friend Brandaun Douglass, Principal  
19 Campaign Committee. A fine of \$800 was imposed  
20 against the Ward 7 Democrats.

21 A fine of \$1,475 was imposed against  
22 Robert for D.C. A fine of \$2,000 was imposed

1 against Robert for D.C. A fine of \$1,500 was  
2 imposed against T. Michelle Colson for State  
3 Board of Education. A fine of \$1,400 was  
4 imposed against Jacque for D.C., 2024. And a  
5 fine of \$700 was imposed against Jacque for  
6 D.C., 2024.

7 During the month of January 2025,  
8 there were no open investigations before the  
9 Office of Campaign Finance. During the month  
10 of January 2025, there was one request for an  
11 interpretive opinion. That was docket number  
12 202501. The requester was Dipa Mehta, Esquire.  
13 And the subject was whether the prohibitions  
14 regarding the use of government resources apply  
15 to a recall measure, which is related to  
16 pending litigation involving the Office of the  
17 Attorney General of the District of Columbia.

18 That matter was docketed on the 24th  
19 of January 2025, and the opinion was issued on  
20 the 27th of January. The Office of the General  
21 Counsel concluded that in view of the context  
22 of this recall measure, those prohibitions did

1 not apply to the Office of the Attorney  
2 General.

3 During the month of January 2025,  
4 there were no show cause proceedings conducted.  
5 And that should conclude my report, the  
6 contents of which will be posted at the Office  
7 of Campaign Finance website under the reports  
8 and data section by close of business today,  
9 the 5th of February 2024.

10 MR. THOMPSON: All right, thank you  
11 very much.

12 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: And that  
13 concludes the report of the Office of Campaign  
14 Finance.

15 MR. THOMPSON: Okay. All right,  
16 moving right along to the last segment, we'd  
17 love to hear from the public. So if you're out  
18 there on Zoom, just raise your hand, your Zoom  
19 hand, and we'll be patient and ask for you to  
20 speak and limit your comments to three minutes,  
21 if you can.

22 I see we have 26 participants. We're

1 looking up and down the Zoom list there and I  
2 don't see any hands raised. Yeah, we'll go to  
3 the top. So going once, going twice, three  
4 times.

5 All right. Well, thank you,  
6 everybody, for being here. As mentioned, we'll  
7 hold a special meeting on Friday, February  
8 14th, Valentine's Day. And I believe it's  
9 going to be at 1 o'clock when we will take up  
10 the matter of the special election to fill the

12 Council member.

13 I believe we'll also consider a recall  
14 petition. And there'll be obviously an agenda  
15 published in advance, which might change. So  
16 be on the lookout for the publication, the  
17 notice of the agenda for that special meeting.

18 Beyond that, our next regular meeting  
19 will be Monday, March 3rd at 10:30 a.m. instead  
20 of Wednesday, March 5th. If we need to have a  
21 regular meeting, not sure yet, but that's when  
22 we'll do it, in March, if we're proceeding.

1 And anything else before we adjourn from  
2 anybody?

3 MS. STROUD: Not for me.

4 MR. THOMPSON: All right. Well,  
5 hearing nothing, I move that we adjourn.
