3 CHAIR THOMPSON: Good morning, everybody.

4 Welcome to the July 2nd regular Board meeting.

5 My name is Gary Thompson, the Chair; and with me

6 is Karyn Greenfield, my fellow Board member.

7 Together, we have a quorum.

8 And we've looked at the agenda. And, at

9 this time, I'd move to adopt that agenda.

10 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Second.

11 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor? Aye.

12 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

13 CHAIR THOMPSON: We've also looked at our

14 meeting minutes from last month. And, at this time,

15 I'd move that we adopt them.

16 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Second.

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor?

18 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye. We have a pretty

20 light agenda today. Like a summer day, it's light

21 and breezy. So I think, with that, we'll hear from

22 our Executive Director, Monica Evans.

1 MS. EVANS: Good morning and thank you.

2 As far as Executive Director engagements in the
3 month of June, on Friday, June 8th -- I mean, June
4 6th, the D.C. Council's Committee on Executive
5 Administration and Labor had the Budget Oversight
6 Hearing on the Board of Elections. We testified
7 regarding the FY 2026 budget enhancement requests
8 and filling ANC vacancies. Many of the witnesses
9 who signed up to testify urge the Council to fund
10 83.

11 On June 16 and 17, we met with the Institute
12 for Responsive Government, and we accompanied them
13 to several D.C. public library locations to conduct
14 user testing of some of the materials that will
15 support implementation of the Automatic Voter
16 Registration Expansion Act. And this act will be
17 effective on October 1.

18 Voter registration rolls. In June, we
19 registered 2,040 new voters and processed 3,654
20 registration changes. In total, we prepared 5,694
21 voter registration cards to be mailed.
22 Additionally, 1,445 registered voters moved out of

1 D.C.; 116 voters canceled their D.C. registrations
2 and registered with other jurisdictions; and 770
3 voters registered in D.C. after canceling the
4 registrations in other jurisdictions.

5 Voter registration online. We are
6 continuing to register voters using our website
7 portal. To date, we have processed over 98,351
8 applications using the portal. These include new
9 voter registrations and updates to existing
10 registrations. Total non-citizen registration is
11 981. In June, we registered two new non-citizen
12 voters. Since the election, we have seen a
13 noticeable decline in the number of non-citizens
14 registering to vote. Additionally, some
15 non-citizens have been removed from the registry
16 due to our list maintenance efforts. We are
17 continuing our outreach in D.C. communities to share
18 information.

19 As previously mentioned, on June 16, we
20 began beta testing some of the documents and
21 processes that will be used to comply with the AVR
22 Expansion Act. We are making changes based on the

1 findings. We are also working with our vendor to
2 implement the requirements of the AVR Expansion Act.

3 We are also monitoring pending legislation
4 and information on the federal level. Legislation
5 to repeal the Local Resident Voting Rights Amendment
6 Act has passed the House. The legislation is now
7 with the Senate.

8 As part of our voter registration list
9 maintenance efforts, we are required to conduct a
10 biennial mail canvas to verify the residential
11 addresses of voters who were eligible but did not
12 participate in the 2024 general presidential
13 election. This process included sending
14 first-class, non-forwardable canvas mailers to the
15 address on record. This initiative helps maintain
16 the integrity of the voter roll by identifying
17 outdated or inaccurate address information.

18 To initiate the process, 153,404
19 first-class, non-forwardable canvas mailers were
20 sent to voters' registered addresses on February
21 28. And on May 25, a second forwardable canvas
22 mailer was sent to 21 registered voters. To date,

1 a total of 36,569 of those mailers have been returned
2 by the Postal Service and 2,769 individuals have
3 confirmed their address online.

4 Additionally, we are actively conducting
5 voter list maintenance to ensure the accuracy and
6 integrity of the voter registration database. This
7 ongoing process involves identifying and updating
8 records for voters who have moved out of the
9 District, changed addresses within the District,
10 have duplicate registrations, or are deceased. The
11 Board utilizes data from the U.S. Postal Service
12 National Change of Address, or NCOA system; DMV;
13 and other reliable sources to flag and verify
14 changes in voter status.

15 Voter Education and Outreach. During the
16 month of June, the Voter Education and Outreach
17 Division participated in 26 outreach events on
18 behalf of the agency. Many of these events were
19 in Ward 8. The events included the Beat the Streets
20 Late Night Hype Event, the Salvation Army's Annual
21 Community Fair, and the Ward 8 Clergy and Faith
22 Leaders Meeting.

1 Election Worker Division. In preparation
2 for the Ward 8 Special Election, the Election Worker
3 Division held its final training class on June 23rd.

4 We successfully trained 215 election workers for
5 the Ward 8 Special Election.

6 On Election Day, we will have a small group
7 of reserve election workers report for duty. These
8 individuals have been trained but not assigned for
9 Election Day. Additionally, the operations team
10 has prepared all supply bins and equipment for early
11 voting and Election Day.

12 ANC Vacancies. We currently have 16
13 active ANC vacancies for the 2025-2026 term. These
14 positions are in different stages of being filled.

15 After candidate filing requirements are met, an
16 open vote of registered voters of the affected SMD
17 will be held during regularly scheduled ANC
18 meetings.

19 Ward 8 Special Election. The Ward 8
20 Special Election is officially underway. There are
21 four candidates on the Ward 8 Special Election
22 ballot. Ballots were mailed on June 10th and mail

1 ballot drop boxes opened on June 13. We have
2 already received 1,531 ballots via the U.S. Postal
3 Service and 367 ballots via mail ballot drop boxes.

4 Early voting will begin on Friday, July
5 11 and will end on Monday, July 14. Four locations
6 will be open from 8.30 a.m. to 7 p.m. There will
7 be 12 Election Day Vote Centers open on Tuesday,
8 July 15. Election Day Vote Centers will be open
9 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. As a reminder, in-person
10 voters may vote at any vote center regardless of
11 their residential address. Voters may also deposit
12 their mail ballots at vote centers without waiting
13 in line. Mail ballot drop boxes will close at 8
14 p.m. on Election Day, and ballots mailed via the
15 U.S. Postal Service must be postmarked by July 15
16 and received at BOE by July 25.

17 And I do have one clarification for the
18 record. There have been allegations that the Board
19 of Elections did not investigate and improperly
20 dismissed claims that BOE had misappropriated
21 challenges to Mr. Trayon White's petition sheets.
22 BOE did launch a full investigation into the matter.

1 In response to the allegations, no
2 evidence was found that any of the sheets were
3 mislaid or misappropriated. BOE and the D.C.
4 Council repeatedly asked for evidence of the missing
5 sheets. Again, no evidence was provided. The only
6 BOE staff misstep appears to be that the intake staff
7 person neglected to count the challenge sheets
8 submitted page by page and to enter on the challenge
9 receipt form the actual number of sheets submitted.

10 This misstep has been properly addressed
11 through our personnel proceedings. And that
12 concludes my report. Thank you.

13 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. Thank you very
14 much. And before we turn to General Counsel Terri
15 Stroud, join me in wishing her a happy birthday
16 today.

17 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Happy birthday.

18 MS. STROUD: Thank you. And I will say
19 for the record that Monday was the Executive
20 Director's birthday.

21 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Oh wow.

22 MS. STROUD: And today is the Chair's

1 birthday.

2 CHAIR THOMPSON: Awesome.

3 MEMBER GREENFIELD: It's all around.

4 CHAIR THOMPSON: It's birthday season.

5 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Yeah.

6 CHAIR THOMPSON: And a fun fact, if you
7 didn't know it, July 2nd was the actual day that
8 the Continental Congress voted to declare our nation
9 independent. And July 4th was a mere signing
10 ceremony.

11 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Oh, wow.

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: So that's an important
13 day. It's also the date that the state of New
14 Hampshire ratified the Constitution, the ninth
15 state to do so, the day that the Congress received
16 that news and formally declared the existence of
17 the United States of America. So July 4th gets all
18 the fireworks, but July 2nd is the real day.

19 MS. EVANS: For many reasons, right.

20 MS. STROUD: So good morning, everyone.

21 I have one item on my agenda, and that's the
22 litigation status report. The first matter is

1 Stacia Hall versus the Board. This is an appeal
2 from the U.S. District Court's denial of a challenge
3 to legislation allowing noncitizens to vote in local
4 elections on the basis of standing. On
5 June 20th, the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals
6 reversed and remanded this case back to the District
7 Court, finding that the appellants had sufficiently
8 made a claim of standing to proceed. And so that
9 is the status of that case. And we will, of course,
10 keep everyone up to date as to the status of that
11 matter.

12 The second matter is Charles Wilson versus
13 the Mayor and the Board. That's in the D.C.
14 Superior Court. This is a remand from the D.C.
15 Court of Appeals of a challenge to both the Board's
16 finding that Initiative Measure Number 83 met proper
17 subject requirements in its formulation of the
18 measure. The Court of Appeals disagreed with the
19 Superior Court's decision that the case was untimely
20 filed because it was submitted before the 10-day
21 period for judicial review.

22 On April 8th, the Board filed a motion to

1 dismiss in the D.C. Superior Court. On June 5th,
2 the plaintiffs filed their opposition to the Board's
3 motion. Both the Initiative 83 proposers and Grow
4 Democracy D.C. sought and were granted authority
5 to intervene and have filed their own motion to
6 dismiss. On June 30th, the Board filed a reply to
7 the plaintiff's opposition, as well as a motion to
8 strike improper claims and materials from that
9 opposition.

10 The third matter is Long versus the D.C.
11 Board of Elections. That is in the D.C. Superior
12 Court. This was a case that was brought back from
13 the U.S. District Court to the D.C. Superior Court.

14 It is a case that Plaintiff Long resubmitted in
15 the Superior Court after it was previously dismissed
16 without prejudice. Mr. Long seeks \$10,000 in
17 damages for an overdraft fee caused by a stop payment
18 on a check issued for his service as an election
19 worker. To date, no activity has been docketed in
20 this matter.

21 The fourth matter is Sobin versus the
22 Board. This matter -- and that's in U.S. District

1 Court. It concerns a complaint in the U.S. District
2 Court in which the plaintiff alleges that the
3 Board's petition circulation process requiring
4 candidates to gather signatures violates the
5 Americans with Disabilities Act. And an Advisory
6 Neighborhood Commission election to be held in his
7 single-member district is illegal; that's another
8 claim.

9 On June 11th, the OAG filed a motion to
10 dismiss on behalf of the Board. On June 16th, the
11 court directed the plaintiff to respond by June
12 30th. On June 23rd, the plaintiff filed an
13 opposition to the motion to dismiss. And on June
14 30th, defendants replied to the opposition.

15 The final matter is Muhammad versus the
16 D.C. Board of Elections. That's in the D.C. Court
17 of Appeals. It involves a petition filed by
18 Petitioner Muhammad for review of a Board
19 enforcement order imposing a civil fine of \$150
20 against her because she failed to personally witness
21 signatures on her nominating petition. There has
22 been no activity in this case since the Board's last

1 meeting.

2 And I would also like to clarify some
3 misunderstandings that appear to be held by some
4 members of the public. The first is that there were
5 several challenges to the nominating petition filed
6 by Trayon White in the 2022 primary election.

7 There was one, and that challenge, the
8 named challenger was an individual named Luis
9 Martinez Maldonado. Although it was widely
10 referred to in the press as being filed by either
11 Robert White or the Robert White campaign, he was
12 not the named challenger in this matter. But it
13 appears to have been filed by his campaign, but he
14 did not file a separate challenge to, in addition
15 to the one that was filed by Luis Martinez Maldonado.
16 Again, there was the one.

17 The second is that we have treated certain
18 candidates differently in terms of how their names
19 appear on the ballot. A concern is that we allow
20 some members to place variations of their name that
21 are not modifications of their given name on a
22 ballot, and that has not been the case. We enforce

1 a rule regarding names on ballots, not names on
2 nominating petitions. So while there might be some
3 leniency with respect to how candidates identify
4 their names on the ballot, we only allow candidates
5 to use modified forms of their given name on the
6 ballot if that use would not confuse or mislead the
7 public.

8 And so if we make a decision, if the Board
9 makes a decision that a person's given name is not
10 what they want to appear on the ballot, they can
11 bring their case to the Board and indicate that they
12 have been widely regarded in the public as using
13 the nickname that they want to use. But we -- and
14 so, in those instances, the Board might allow
15 individuals to use monikers other than their given,
16 their actual name or their modified version of their
17 given name. But if we allow someone to use
18 something on their petition, it does not necessarily
19 follow that that will be allowed on the ballot
20 because the rule that we're enforcing does not apply
21 to petitions that are being circulated, but only
22 to the ballot that voters actually cast votes on

1 in the election. So just wanted to clarify those
2 two things for the record.

3 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. Also a fun fact
4 about July 2nd, it's the birthday of Thurgood
5 Marshall. We're proud to share that one. Also
6 Jimmy Hoffa. We're not sure where he is, but Jimmy
7 Hoffa.

8 All right, those fun facts aside, let's
9 see. It's time for the Office of Campaign Finance
10 update.

11 PARTICIPANT: Good morning, Mr. Chairman
12 and distinguished Board Member Greenfield. I'm
13 appearing on behalf of Director of Cecily
14 Collier-Montgomery. The Office of Campaign
15 Finance appeared before the D.C. Council Oversight
16 Committee on Executive Administration and Labor on
17 the 6th of June 2025. Among the topics discussed
18 were funding for the Fair Elections Program during
19 the July 15th, 2025 special election in Ward 8;
20 funding for the Fair Elections Program during the
21 2026 election cycle; and possible legislative
22 changes or recommendations regarding reducing the

1 five-to-one matching funds that are provided to
2 candidates in the Fair Elections Program when the
3 government faces budgetary shortfalls.

4 During the month of June 2025, the Office
5 of Campaign Finance participated in several
6 community outreach events across the District. On
7 June 11, 2025, the office joined District agencies
8 and organizations in participating in the Community
9 Resources Fair held at the Paul Laurence Dunbar
10 Apartments. On June 12th, 2025, the Office joined
11 other district agencies and organizations
12 participating in the Harvard Towers resources
13 workshop held in the Mount Pleasant neighborhood.

14 On June 16, the office joined the district agencies
15 participating in the Anacostia Fair held along
16 Martin Luther King, Jr. Avenue in southeast
17 Washington, D.C. And on June 18, the office, in
18 partnership with D.C. Public Libraries, held an
19 information session at the Lamond-Riggs/Lillian J.
20 Huff Neighborhood Library.

21 In the Fair Elections Division, during the
22 2025 special election cycle in Ward 8, as of today's

1 date, there are three certified participating
2 candidates in the Fair Elections Program. And the
3 Office of Campaign Finance has authorized
4 disbursements in the total sum of \$335,375.95. The
5 following certified candidates have received
6 disbursements during the month of June: Mike for
7 Ward 8 Principal Campaign Committee was authorized
8 for disbursement of \$4,900 in matching funds on June
9 26, 2025. Mike for Ward 8 Principal Campaign
10 Committee was authorized for disbursement of
11 \$20,000, which is the second half of the base amount,
12 on June 3rd, 2025. Sheila Bond for Ward 8 Principal
13 Campaign Committee was authorized for disbursement
14 on June 26, 2025, in the amount of \$7,600 in matching
15 payments. Sheila Bond for Ward 8 Principal
16 Campaign Committee was authorized for disbursement
17 on June 3rd, 2025, in the amount of \$20,000, which
18 is the second half of the base amount. Friends of
19 Salim Adofo Principal Campaign Committee was
20 authorized for disbursement in the amount of \$8,323
21 in matching payments on June 4th, 2025. And,
22 finally, Friends of Salim Adofo Principal Campaign

1 Committee was authorized for disbursement in the
2 amount of \$20,000, the second half of matching of
3 the base amount, on June 3, 2025.

4 The Fair Elections Division conducted 49
5 desk reviews and issued 13 requests for additional
6 information letters during the month of June 2024.

7 Fair Elections Program Division issued the
8 following audit reports and findings during the
9 month of June 2025. Toni Criner for Ward 7,
10 State Board of Education, Principal Campaign
11 Committee, was issued on June 10th, 2025,
12 post-election final audit. LaJoy for Ward 8, State
13 Board of Education, Principal Campaign Committee,
14 was issued on June 19, 2025 a preliminary statement
15 of findings.

16 Nate Fleming for Ward 7 was issued on June
17 24, 2025, a preliminary statement of findings.
18 Paul Johnson for Ward 4 Principal Campaign Committee
19 was issued a preliminary statement of findings on
20 June 24th, 2025. Rodney "Red" Grant for City
21 Council Principal Campaign Committee was issued a
22 preliminary statement of findings on June 24th.

1 Committee to re-elect Janeese Lewis George was
2 issued a final post-election audit on June 26, 2025.

3 And Ebony Payne for Ward 7 Principal Campaign
4 Committee was issued a post-election final audit
5 report on June 26, 2025.

6 In the Public Information and Records
7 Management Division, during the month of June, there
8 were nine required filers who were required to file
9 June 10th reports in the traditional program. Six
10 timely files filed and three were referred to the
11 Office of the General Counsel. There were four
12 required filers who were required to file the June
13 10th reports in the Fair Elections Committee, two
14 timely filed, one was granted an extension, and one
15 matter was referred to the Office of the General
16 Counsel.

17 Regarding Advisory Neighborhood
18 Commission candidates, a total of 413 Advisory
19 Neighborhood Commission candidates were required
20 to file summary financial statements, 377 timely
21 files and 36 failed to file and were referred to
22 the Office of the General Counsel.

1 Regarding new candidates in June, one
2 candidate, Regan Jones, registered as a candidate
3 for mayor on June 10, 2025. One candidate, Ryan
4 Futter, registered as a candidate for Ward 1 Council
5 on June 23rd, 2025. During the month of June 2025,
6 there were no recall or initiative committees
7 registered in the Office of Campaign Finance. In
8 addition, during the month of June 2025, Ryan
9 Futter, candidate for mayor of Washington, D.C.,
10 completed the mandatory entrance conference.

11 In the Reports Analysis and Audit
12 Divisions, 32 desk reviews were conducted during
13 the month of June, which included the following:
14 one desk review for a political action committee,
15 26 desk reviews for principal campaign committees,
16 and 5 desk reviews for initiative, referendum, and
17 recall committees. The Reports Analysis and Audit
18 Division also conducted two consultations with the
19 following candidates: Oye for D.C. and Eboni-Rose,
20 State Board of Education. The Reports Analysis and
21 Audit Division also issued a preliminary draft audit
22 report regarding Michelle Colson, the State Board

1 of Education, on June 11, 2025.

2 In the General Counsel's Division, during
3 the month of June 2025, the Office of General Counsel
4 received 39 referrals and issued six orders, which
5 included the following: two orders in which no fines
6 were imposed or issued, and four orders of
7 satisfaction of outstanding fines were issued in
8 the amount of \$395. During the month of June, the
9 following respondents satisfied outstanding fines:
10 Nate Fleming for Ward 7 satisfied a fine of \$50,
11 Nate Fleming for Ward 7 satisfied a fine of \$132.50,
12 the Committee to Elect Nate Fleming satisfied a fine
13 of \$50, and Carly Sessions for State Board of
14 Education satisfied a fine of \$162.50. During the
15 month of June 2025, the Office of Campaign Finance
16 collected a total of \$395 in fines.

17 During the month of June 2025, there were
18 no open investigations pending before the Office
19 of Campaign Finance. There were no requests for
20 interpretive opinions, and no show-cause
21 proceedings were conducted. Contents of the
22 reports that I have just read will be published in

1 their entirety at the Office of Campaign Finance
2 website under the Reports and Data section by close
3 of business on today's date, the 2nd of July 2025.

4 And that should conclude my report.

5 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. Thank you very
6 much.

7 PARTICIPANT: Thank you.

8 CHAIR THOMPSON: Two other fun facts.
9 The birthday of comedian Larry David and, perhaps
10 most importantly in American history, it's also the
11 day that President Lyndon Johnson signed the Civil
12 Rights Act of 1964. So there you have it, this day
13 in history.

14 Okay. Anything else before we turn to
15 public comment from the BOE or the OCF?

16 MS. STROUD: I have nothing.

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Any more fun
18 facts? Hearing nothing, there is a request in the
19 Q&A from a Robert Vincent Branham to speak, so we'll
20 call on Robert first. And hello, Mr. Branham.
21 Welcome. And please give us your comment of
22 approximately three minutes length.

1 MR. BRANHAM: Thank you. Greetings and
2 salutations, Board members. My name is Robert
3 Vincent Branham. One of my earliest community
4 service participation activities as a young man was
5 to assist in the counting of election ballots. My
6 mentor then was Dr. Robert Martin, who was a member
7 of the D.C. Board of Elections.

8 Today, as a senior, doing my best to remain
9 civically involved, I am dismayed and disappointed
10 by today's Board, which seems unwilling to engage
11 the public and to receive valid criticism. The
12 manner by which the Board holds its public meetings
13 illustrates how the Board is determined to distance
14 itself from the public. I urge Board members and
15 certain senior staff members to humble themselves
16 as public servants to the people.

17 Finally, I request a correction to be made
18 in the minutes, as reported, regarding I-83. I
19 testified at the council's budget hearing on the
20 D.C. Board of Elections, and I strongly urged the
21 council not to fund I-83. It is disingenuous to
22 assert there is wide public testimony and support

1 to fund I-83.

2 I thank you.

3 MS. EVANS: Thank you, sir. I appreciate
4 your comments, and I'll respond. At no time did
5 I say there was wide support for funding I-83. All
6 I stated was many individuals did testify in
7 support. I never used the word wide support for
8 that funding in any way. And that was based on
9 merely numbers of individuals for and against, and
10 many were for. And so my comment does stand.

11 MR. BRANHAM: There was no reference to
12 the fact that there was public statements opposed
13 to I-83.

14 MS. EVANS: May I finish my sentence,
15 please?

16 MR. BRANHAM: You did not say that.

17 MS. EVANS: May I finish my sentence,
18 please? Thank you. I didn't interrupt you; I
19 would appreciate the same courtesy.

20 MR. BRANHAM: I gave you the same
21 courtesy. I thought you had ended your comment.

22 MS. EVANS: Thank you. Additionally, I

1 will say that as far as humbling ourselves to accept
2 criticism, we have always accepted criticism. We
3 have made adjustments and modifications as a result
4 of that criticism. Our processes are open to the
5 public. We have issued press releases for every
6 step of our process. Members of the public may come
7 and observe our logic and accuracy testing. They
8 may come and observe counting of ballots. As far
9 as the mail ballots that are being processed,
10 individuals can apply to be poll watchers, poll
11 observers. There is a process for that. There is
12 a process for reviewing our audit. All of that is
13 articulated through press releases that we put out
14 and post on our website. We absolutely welcome the
15 public to be part of it. We have accepted and made
16 changes based on public comment, and we will always
17 continue to do so. We do in no way discount public
18 engagement in our work. Thank you.

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. Anybody else out
20 there on the Zoom? Would you like to raise your
21 hand and make a comment? I'm not seeing anybody.
22 Also, it's a pretty low number of attendees. It

1 looks like mostly BOE staff. Okay.

2 Well, goodness, I hope everybody gets a
3 nice relaxing break for our holiday coming up and
4 a nice weekend ahead. And soon enough, we'll be
5 conducting our special election in Ward 8, and then
6 we'll see you back here on August, the first
7 Wednesday in August, whatever that is.

8 MS. STROUD: Actually, our election is
9 scheduled to Friday, August 8th.

10 CHAIR THOMPSON: Friday, August 8th it is.
11 Okay. Oh, that's the day we're going to certify
12 the election results as well for the special
13 election.

14 Okay. Well, once again, happy holidays,
15 everybody, and thanks so much for being here. And
16 I got no more fun facts. You're on your own.

17 With that, I move we adjourn.

18 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor.

20 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

21 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you.
