CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Good morning.

Welcome. I hereby call to order the Regular

Meeting of the Board of Elections for August

2015. It is Wednesday, August 5, 2015. The time

is 10:47 a.m. We are meeting in Room 280 North

of One Judiciary Square.

I'm Deborah K. Nichols, Chairman of the Board. Present with me this morning is Board Member Stephen Danzansky.

MEMBER DANZANSKY: Good morning.

CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Also present this morning are Mr. Clifford Tatum, the Board's Executive Director, Ms. Cecily Collier-Montgomery, the Board's Director of Campaign Finance, and Mr. Kenneth McGhie, the Board's General Counsel.

Without objection, the Board's -without objection, the agenda for this morning's
meeting is hereby adopted. Unless there are
corrections, the minutes of the regular Board

meeting of July 1, 2015 are adopted. 1 Are there any matters that Members of 2 the Board wish to address in this public meeting? 3 MEMBER DANZANSKY: None here, Madam 4 Chair. 5 CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. Having 6 said that, we will receive the report of the 7 Board's Executive Director, Mr. Clifford Tatum. 8 DIRECTOR TATUM: Thank you, 9 I have only general matters to report on 10 Chair. for my report today. 11 The first is, 12 as you are several staff members, Eric Olsen, Lester Bird, 13 and Margarita Mikhaylova, participated in a grant 14 solicitation from the Knight Foundation and out 15 of over hundreds of participants that submitted 16 applications, we were one of 22 entities that 17 received a \$35,000 grant to develop a 18 capturing and analytical tool from the Knight 19 20 Foundation. If you recall in November 2014, 21 deployed data processing teams who were able to 22

collect data from the polling places on how much 1 time voters spent in the polling places. 2 Knight Foundation thought that that was a very 3 good analytical tool to be developed, so they 4 awarded us \$35,000 to develop that tool. 5 So the team is working on developing 6 that tool. And I believe we had thoughts of 7 partnering with the Pugh Foundation as well 8 with Professor Charles Stewart at MIT. Eric is 9 not here, but Margarita is in the back and she 10 could speak to it a bit if you would --11 CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. 12 DIRECTOR TATUM: care to have that on 13 the record. But we are very excited and the team 14 is doing really good things to collect data and 15 move and make the election process that much more 16 efficient for the District. 17 CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: That is fantastic, 18 outstanding. 19 The second item is DIRECTOR TATUM: 20 As you know after the the Canvass Card Update. 21 2014 General Election, we submitted -- we mailed 22

out 283,000 plus canvass cards to voters that did not participate in the November General Election.

And those cards are being returned to us as either undeliverable, address changes or address changes within the District of Columbia and address changes outside of the District, meaning voters have moved outside the District.

So we are continuously processing those cards. We have received roughly 43,000 cards back in those three categories, so the team, the staff members are processing those cards on a daily basis.

Voting System Updates. We had, as you recall for the April 2015 Special Election, a pilot demonstration of a new voting system by our current vendor, ES&S. We have had a vendor bring their equipment in to demonstrate the last -- two weeks ago, Hart Intercivic. And on August the 10<sup>th</sup> we will have Democracy Live come in and present a Yull Capa Ballot Delivery System and on September the 3<sup>rd</sup> we will have Dominion Voting Systems come in and demonstrate their voting

system to us as well. 1 And that's in an effort to determine 2 what new systems are on the market, so that we 3 can move our platform forward. 4 The only other item I have, 5 Chair, is just an announcement that there is two 6 months remaining in the Fiscal Year 2015 and we 7 are on schedule to close the fiscal year out in 8 good standing. 9 CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. All 10 11 Thank you, Mr. Tatum. Are there any questions for Mr. Tatum? 12 All right. We will now receive the report of the 13 Board's General Counsel, Mr. McGhie, but, first, 14 we will conduct hearing. 15 meeting, the Board will At this 16 conduct a hearing to formulate the short title 17 and summary statement and the legislative form of 18 the proposed initiative entitled "Fair Minimum 19 Wage Act of 2016." 20 Mr. McGhie? 21 MR. McGHIE: Yes, the Office of the 22

Counsel General prepared an initial 1 formulation for the Board's review. And I have 2 copies of our draft that I can give out to the 3 public, if anybody from the public wants 4 5 follow along. CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. 6 MR. McGHIE: And I will read the 7 General Counsel's Office draft formulation into 8 the record. Our draft reads: 9 Initiative Measure No. 76. The short 10 title is "Fair Minimum Wage Act of 2016." 11 summary statement reads as follows: 12 If enacted, this initiative will 13 increase the minimum in 14 gradually wage District of Columbia to \$15 hourly by 2020; 15 gradually increase the minimum wage for tipped 16 employees, so that they receive the same minimum 17 wage directly from their employer other 18 as employees by 2025. 19 Beginning in 2021, require the minimum 20 yearly in proportion increase to 21 increases in the Consumer Price Index. 22

1	wage increases under the initiative will not
2	apply to D.C. Government employees or employees
3	of the D.C. Government contractors."
4	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. I will
5	entertain any suggestions from the Board or the
6	interested parties.
7	MR. McGHIE: Well, first of all, may
8	I ask the proposer of the initiative to take
9	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: The proposer?
10	MR. McGHIE: a seat and then any
11	other interested persons.
12	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Good morning.
13	Would you identify yourselves for the record,
14	please?
15	MR. HANSON: My name is Matthew
16	Hanson. I'm the proposer of the initiative.
17	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Okay. And you,
18	ma'am?
19	MS. VALENTINO: My name is Ellen
20	Valentino. I'm here representing the Mid-
21	Atlantic Petroleum Distributors.
22	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. Mr.

Hanson, do you have any suggestions? 1 I'm happy with the MR. HANSON: 2 formulation. 3 CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. Ms. 4 Valentino? 5 MS. VALENTINO: Thank you. Just 6 7 having received this less than a minute ago, just some initial comments. And I quess the question 8 is the word fair and short title, whether that is 9 open for debate because it's fair to some, but 10 So the definition of who is not fair to others. 11 deciding what is fair and not fair, the Board has 12 a definition or has it evaluated what fair is, I 13 think is something that might not be objective or 14 reflective if it's entitled the Fair Minimum Wage 15 Act. 16 again, number one, point 17 having received this, a gradual increase, the 18 word gradual could mean a number of different 19 things to different people, so I think that it's 20 not clear to the public that would be voting and 21 I think it needs to be very specific on what this 22

bill will do and what the graduated steps will be.

Because my definition of graduated and maybe a voter's definition of graduated will be two totally different things. Just like the word fair, what's fair and not fair is not really good. So I think that needs to be drawn out and specific. That's just a comment.

Again, going down to point number two, tipped employees. With respect to clarifying who they are, what they are, does that mean cab drivers? Does that mean restaurant employees, waiters, waitresses? Again, I will know what a tipped -- I can subject what a tipped employee is, but I think that needs to be clarified and it might be unclear what constituency we are talking about, because, again, this does not apply to everybody across the board.

As a matter of fact, it's very clear that it doesn't apply to certain segments of D.C. residents.

Again, having just looked at this, I

just received this less than 2 minutes ago, those 1 are our initial -- my initial comments and I have 2 nothing further to add. 3 I don't think that this language is 4 fully reflective and I make those specific 5 comments just under quick review. 6 CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. 7 Sir, would you like you, Ms. Valentino. 8 identify yourself for the record, please? 9 MR. MICHAEL: I'm Delvone Michael with 10 DC Working Families. 11 CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Okay. All right. 12 MR. HANSON: I think we -- may we 13 respond together to the --14 CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Certainly. 15 MR. HANSON: Okay. I'll just go 16 The Fair Minimum Wage Act of 17 point-by-point. 2016 we believe is an objective description of 18 the proposal. A major goal of the initiative is 19 low-wage tipped workers raise wages for 20 to ensuring that there is one fair minimum wage for 21 all workers, so workers are not receiving two 22

different standards unless, obviously, as bullet point number four addresses, for D.C. Government contractors and we are constitutionally prohibited from applying the increase to them.

As to whether or not gradually is an objective term, I don't know how to argue it any other way. These are -- we would like it to be very clear to the electorate that this is not an increase from the \$10 to \$15 minimum wage data, \$15 tomorrow. We believe that to gradually increase the minimum age signals to voters that this is a, you know, process. It's not going to happen overnight.

And, you know, as to whether or not -you know, the same for the second bullet point. It's a slow increase for tipped minimum wage workers to get them to, you know, full minimum It's not an overnight thing. wage by 2025. We believe that is important for communicating voters have full understanding of the а employees the tipped have And classification, you know, in terms of employment

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1	classification is completely objective. Okay.
2	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: The last time.
3	MS. VALENTINO: Is there an
4	opportunity to respond or no?
5	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: You may go.
6	MS. VALENTINO: Thank you. As far as
7	the goals of the proposal, that's not the
8	business of the Board. The business of the Board
9	is putting forward objective language, so the
10	voter can deliberate. So I just want to make
11	that point.
12	What is fair and not fair is not for
13	the Board to decide. As a matter of fact, I
14	think that's a very persuasive and unfair term to
15	have in a title.
16	As far as gradual goes, I think it has
17	got to be very specific. Very specific without
18	the different
19	MR. HANSON: Well
20	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Wait, wait, no.
21	MS. VALENTINO: Very specific on what
22	the steps are and what the increase is going to

1	be and when, because the voter is going to walk
2	in and they are going to want to make a decision.
3	When they vote yay or nay, they think they are
4	going to get fair minimum wage. Well, not
5	everybody is going to be there, but gradually
6	they should know specifically what those
7	increases are and when.
8	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: A couple of things
9	that I have a question for. Do you think, Mr.
10	Hanson
11	MR. HANSON: Yes.
12	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: that there is a
13	difference between using the word gradually and
13	difference between using the word gradually and graduated?

8	MR. HANSON: I'm not sure.
9	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Okay. And the
10	second observation I would like to make is that
11	this is the title of the initiative as filed.
12	The Board did not come up with the word fair as
13	the title. Understand that. I don't need a
14	comment back.
15	MS. VALENTINO: Okay.
16	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: I don't need a
17	comment back on that. All right. Are there any
18	more comments or suggestions to be made on that?
19	Do you have any questions, Mr
20	MEMBER DANZANSKY: No.
21	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Mr. McGhie?
22	MR. McGHIE: Well, I just see her

1	point with the word fair.
2	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Yes.
3	MR. McGHIE: I mean, I think
4	MEMBER DANZANSKY: We are almost
5	required, aren't we
6	MR. McGHIE: Yes.
7	MEMBER DANZANSKY: to accept the
8	title?
9	MR. McGHIE: Oh, no, we are not
10	required to accept the title. The Board
11	MS. VALENTINO: Correct.
12	MR. McGHIE: makes the title up, so
13	the Board establishes the short title. So fair
14	can
15	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: We can drop the
16	MR. McGHIE: could be biased.
17	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: Right.
18	MR. McGHIE: And in favor of the
19	initiative, so maybe we would want to say
20	District of Columbia Minimum Wage Act of 2016.
21	MEMBER DANZANSKY: Okay.
22	MR. MICHAEL: I think I would agree

with this. I know that I wouldn't suggest that Mr. McGhie is wrong, but I think the title -- we chose the title. I'm not sure there is -- in the past the last five or six initiatives, the title has been accepted from the proposer and not necessarily the change which has gotten here.

I would also like to point out that the argument should be in good faith. And I'm not, you know, questioning Ms. Valentino's motives, but certainly she did sit here the last time at the hearing and suggest that giving a raise to the minimum wage would be for human rights and I would suggest that we not forget that. And the arguments are not necessarily here to be helpful, but to obstruct what we are trying to accomplish, that's my position on it.

But I think fair does not restore what we are trying to accomplish. I think we should go forth with what we submitted.

MR. HANSON: And just to clarify, and we view fair as not a value, but as an objective description of what the Act is proposing to do.

1.	MS. VALENTINO: You know, my position
2	has been clear and unhidden. I'm sure you will
3	hear it again in the future. The Board does have
4	the authority over the title and, you know, I
5	think the issue of the word fair and I think the
6	clarity of when increases happen are important
7	factors. And I still hold that it's unfair to
8	some and not fair to others.
9	MR. McGHIE: My recommendation would
10	be to drop the word fair.
11	MEMBER DANZANSKY: I would agree with
12	that.
13	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All right. I will
14	accept a motion to accept the summary title with
15	the exception that we drop with the change
16	being that we drop the word fair and in its place
17	substitute District of Columbia Minimum Wage Act
18	of 2016.
19	MEMBER DANZANSKY: So moved, Madam
20	Chair.
21	CHAIRMAN NICHOLS: All in favor?

Pursuant to D.C. Official Code § 1-001.17(g) the proposal to recall of the ANC shall have 60 days to circulate the recall petition and file the same with the Board beginning on the date the proposal was formally adopted of the original petition form as his or her own.

Accordingly, Mr. Jackson must file a recall petition with the Board by no later than 5:00 p.m. on Monday, October 5, 2015.

Official Code § 19 1001.17(h)(3), a petition for the recall of an 20 ANC shall include the valid signatures of 10 21 percent of resident voters of the affected SMD. 22

1	The 10 percent must be computed from
2	the total number of resident voters in the SMD
3	according to the latest official count of
4	resident voters made by the Board 30 days prior
5	to the date of initial submission of the Notice
6	of Intention to Recall.
7	As reflected in the table below, the
8	total number of resident voters in SMD 5E02 as of
9	May 31, 2015 was 1,361. Accordingly, the
10	petition for the recall of Commissioner Davis
11	must include the valid signatures of 136 resident

Committees. That represents 74 principal campaign committees and 19 political action committees. The number of timely filers as well as late filers and failures to file will have to -- is still to be determined.

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election cycle during the month of July: 1 Jack Evans, Evans 2016, Ward 2, City 2 Council, registered on July 1, 2015. 3 Emanci 8 PAC registered on July 2, 4 2015. Neighbors for Adam, ANC Recall Committee 5 registered on July 29, 2015. 6 We conducted entrance conference on 7 July 9, 2015. The participants were: Derrick J. 8 Ford and Lucius C. Gallion. 9 We conducted entrance conferences on 10 July the  $15^{th}$ . The participants were: 11 Culver, who is the treasurer of Two Alone for 12 Council of 2016 Exploratory Committee; Carlton 13 Retland, the chairperson for Petula for Council 14 2016 Exploratory Committee. 15 We also conducted entrance conferences 16 on July 31, 2015 and the participants were: Jack 17 Evans, Candidate Evans 2016, Robert Kimbel, the 18 treasurer for Evans 2016. 19 In our Audit Branch during the month 20 of July, the Audit Branch conducted 43 in depth 21 reviews of the financial reports filed with the 22

21	Reconsideration in another matter received a fine
22	of \$300.

1	Abraham for Ward 8 City Council was
2	fined \$1,100 for failure to timely file a report.
3	During the month of July, the Office
4	of the General Counsel collected \$1,100 in fines
5	from Vonetta Dumas an ANC conduit who had failed
6	to timely file her summary financial statement.
7	During the month of July, the Office
8	of the General Counsel carried seven open
9	investigations and no new investigations were
10	opened.
11	And during the month of July, there
12	were no requests for interpretative opinions nor
