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The District of Columbia Board of Elections convened Regular Board Meeting in Suite 750, 1015 Half Street, S.E., Washington, D.C., 20001, pursuant to notice at 10:30 a.m., Michael Bennett, Chair, presiding.

CHAIR BENNETT: Good morning, all. The meeting is now called to order for January. And in our new facilities here at 1015 Half Street, Southeast.

I want to start out with introducing, before adopting an agenda or anything, introducing the dais. To my far left, Alice Miller, Deputy Director of the Board of Elections. To her right and my left is Dionna Lewis, a Board Member. To my immediate right is Mr. Ken McGhie, General Counsel to the Board of Elections and to his immediate right is Mr. Bill Sanford, William Sanford, who is General Counsel of the Office of Campaign Finance and sitting in for Ms. Cecily Montgomery, who is out today, who is the Director of the Office of Campaign Finance.

So we're going to start out with the adoption of the agenda. Mr. Michael Gill is absent, the other Board Member. So we have a

1	quorum, myself and Ms. Lewis.
2	Adoption of the agenda. Ms. Lewis,
3	can I have a motion?
4	MEMBER LEWIS: Yes, I move to adopt
5	today's agenda.
6	CHAIR BENNETT: I second. And so
7	that's unanimous. The agenda is adopted for
8	today.
9	Ms. Lewis, can I have a motion to
10	adopt the minutes of the last meeting?
11	MEMBER LEWIS: Yes, I move to adopt
12	the meeting minutes from Wednesday, December 6,
13	2017 meeting.
14	CHAIR BENNETT: And I second. And so
15	that's unanimous adoption of the minutes from the
16	last meeting.
17	Board matters Ms. Lewis, any
18	matters for the Board today?
19	MEMBER LEWIS: No, but Happy New Year,
20	everyone.
21	CHAIR BENNETT: Yes, and it's also
22	very, very pleasant and nice being in our new

1	facility. We closed out December at the 441
2	Judiciary Square and opening up 2018 in this
3	wonderful, beautiful facility. So hats off to
4	our directors. And Office of Campaign Finance
5	will be moving within six months to offices next
6	door and we'll have everybody together. Hats off
7	to all the hard work of the directors and the
8	staff who made this happen, along with the
9	Department of General Services. So thank you
LO	all.
L1	And I don't have anything. So, we're
L 2	going to start off with the Office of did we
L3	get the line open? Okay.
L 4	So we're going to start with the
L5	report from the Office of Campaign Finance, Mr.
L6	Bill Sanford.
L 7	MR. SANFORD: Good morning, Mr.
L8	Chairman and distinguished Board Member Lewis.
L9	I'm Bill Sanford. I'm sitting in today for

21	MR. SINDRAM: Mr. Chair?
22	CHAIR BENNETT: Yes? Yes, sir.

1	MR. SINDRAM: I can barely hear you
2	guys. It comes in very muffled. Can you amplify
3	a bit, please?
4	CHAIR BENNETT: Yes, thank you for
5	letting us know. Can you speak a little?
6	MR. SANFORD: Sure, I'll be glad to.
7	CHAIR BENNETT: We also may we're
8	going to try to move the speaker a little bit
9	closer. That may help, Mr. Sindram.
10	MR. SINDRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
11	CHAIR BENNETT: So, I'm going to ask
12	Mr. Sanford to continue. And if for some reason
13	or another you don't hear him, then please or
14	hear us, then please speak up again.
15	MR. SINDRAM: I can hear you much
16	better now.
17	CHAIR BENNETT: Great, thank you.
18	Can everybody in the audience hear
19	okay? It's tough to hear in the back.
20	MR. SANFORD: Good morning. My name
21	is William Sanford. I am General Counsel to the
22	Office of Campaign Finance sitting in today for

our Director Cecily Collier Montgomery.

During the month of December, there was one required filing date, which was the December 10th required filing date. There were 79 required filers, 69 filers filed timely, one filer requested an extension, and there were nine failures to timely file which were referred to the Office of the General Counsel.

Those committees that failed to timely file included the following: Crawford for AtLarge City Council; Robert Quintero, Treasurer;

Kimberly Tignor, Treasurer; and the Mobilization
Project, John Jernick, Treasurer.

During the month of December 2017, the Reports Analysis and Audit Division conducted 45

audits and other activities; 42 of the audits were conducted of political action committees and a total of 22 principal campaign committees received further information letters.

During the month of December 2017, the Reports Analysis and Audit Division did not conduct any field audits; however, two random periodic audits were conducted. They were Brianne for D.C. 2018, that audit was initiated on September 27, 2017, and the Metropolitan PAC, which was initiated on September 12, 2017.

The final audit that was conducted as a random periodic audit was a Ward 4 Constituent Services Fund and that audit was initiated on October 30, 2017.

The Reports Analysis and Audit

Division issued the Ward 7 Constituent Services

Fund Audit on December 27, 2107 and the Do

Something Constituent Services Fund for Ward 8 on

December 18, 2017.

All of these audits are available at the Office of Campaign Finance website, which is

www.ocf.dc.gov.

During the month of December 2017, the Office of the General Counsel received nine referrals from the Public Information and Records Management Division for failure to timely failure December 10th reports of receipts and expenditures.

The Office of the General Counsel also issued 11 orders, which included the following: three orders were issued in which no fines were imposed and eight orders were issued in which fines totaling \$15,100 were imposed for failure to timely file a report.

The fines were imposed against the following respondents: Zukerburg for Attorney General, a fine of \$2,300 was imposed; Drew for D.C. received a fine of \$200; Holmes for Ward 8 received a fine of \$500; the Committee to Elect Natalie Williams received a fine of \$2,650; Committee to Elect Khalid Pitts received a fine of \$2,650; Justin Green At-Large Principal Campaign Committee received a fine of \$2,650; the

Gertrude Stein Democratic PAC received a fine of \$2,650; and the Gertrude Stein Democratic PAC also received a fine of \$1,500.

During the month of December 2017, the Office of General Counsel referred 18 petitions for enforcement to the Office of General Counsel for the Board of Election.

And during the month of December 2017, the Office of the General Counsel maintained three open investigations, which included Lee Calhoun, OCF-2013-013, campaign contributions violations; Stanley Straughter, OCF-2013-014, for campaign contributions violations; and Jeffery Thompson, OCF-2013-015, for campaign contributions violations.

The Office of the General Counsel did not initiate any new investigations during the month of December 2017. During the month of December 2017, there were no requests for interpretive opinions and there were no show cause proceedings conducted by the Office of the General Counsel.

And that should conclude the report 1 2 from the Office of Campaign Finance. CHAIR BENNETT: All right, thank you, 3 4 Mr. Sanford. 5 Mr. McGhie -- oh, I'm sorry. Any questions, Ms. Lewis? 6 No, thank you. 7 MEMBER LEWIS: 8 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, Mr. McGhie. 9 MR. McGHIE: Okay, yes. The only thing I have on my agenda is a litigation status 10 11 update. And the only matter that we have in 12 court right now is Paul Cohn versus the D.C. Board of Elections. 13 14 As the Board is aware, that deals with Initiative 77. Initiative 77 was a minimum wage 15 16 initiative which the Board accepted as having a 17 sufficient number of signatures to go forward 18 with the random sample. 19 After the Board made that decision, 20 Mr. Cohn appealed it to the D.C. Court of 21 Appeals. And I think at our last Board meeting I 22 indicated that the D.C. Court of Appeals has

affirmed the Board's motion for summary 1 2 affirmance. But after the Court of Appeals 3 4 affirmed that Board's motion for summary 5 affirmance, the other party, Mr. Cohn, who represents the Board of Trade, filed a motion for 6 7 reconsideration. 8 So we are now dealing with the motion 9 for reconsideration. Let's see, that was filed by Mr. Cohn on December 26th and the Board filed 10 11 its opposition to his motion for reconsideration 12 on January 4th. The intervenors joined in our 13 motion and so everything is just pending right 14 now before the Court of Appeals on the motion for 15 reconsideration. 16 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, thank you. 17 MR. McGHIE: That would conclude my 18 report. 19 CHAIR BENNETT: Any questions, Ms. Lewis? 20 21 MEMBER LEWIS: No, thank you. 22 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, great.

1 So, Ms. Miller, Executive Director of 2 the Board of Elections, your report. Thank you, Mr. Bennett. 3 MS. MILLER: 4 The first matter on my agenda is the 5 final relocation of the Precincts Numbered 6, 24, 59, 91, 92, 113, 129, 136, and a Ward 7 Early 6 7 Voting site. 8 I'll ask Mr. Budoo to come forward and 9 present those precincts. Just by way of background, as you know we've presented the 10 11 proposal of moving those precincts on December 12 6th at the Board meeting. They were posted in the Register for relocation consideration on 13 14 December 15th. And now we're asking the Board to 15 take final action and make those precincts --16 final action to move those precincts for the June 19th election. 17 18 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. 19 MR. BUDOO: Good morning. My name is Arlin Budoo with the Board of Elections. 20 21 MS. MILLER: Mr. Budoo, can you speak 22 up?

MR. BUDOO: Yes, ma'am. My name is Arlin Budoo with the Board of Elections.

The first precinct that I submitted for relocation was Precinct 6. The current voting area was Georgetown Community Library.

I'm proposing that we relocate to the Duke Ellington High School, located at 3500 R Street, N.W. We will be using the gallery at that location.

The next precinct is Precinct 24. The current voting area is Mary's Center. I propose that we relocate back to Marie Reed Elementary School located at 2201 18th Street, N.W. We will be using the Multi-Purpose Lounge upstairs.

The next precinct is Precinct 59.

Current voting area is Coolidge Senior High

School. The school is now closed for

renovations. I'm proposing that we relocate to

the Takoma Community Center, which also serves as

the Early Voting Center in Ward 4, located at 300

Van Buren Street, Northwest. We'll be using the

Multi-Purpose Room there.

The next precinct is Precinct 91. The current voting location is Friendship Public

Charter School Chamberlain Campus. I'm proposing that we relocate back to Watkins Elementary

School, located at 420 12th Street, Southeast.

We'll also be using the Multi-Purpose Room there.

Our next relocation is Precinct 92.

The current voting area is the Zion Baptist

Church-Eastland. I'm proposing that we relocate
to the newly renovated Kenilworth Recreation

Center, located at 4321 Ord Street, Northeast.

We will be using the gymnasium there.

The next precinct relocation is

Precinct 113. We currently use the East River

Washington Senior Wellness Center. I'm proposing

that we relocate to Hillcrest Recreation Center

located at 3100 Denver Street, Southeast. We

will be using the gymnasium there.

Our next relocation is Precinct 129, which is currently Martin Luther King, Junior Library. As you may know, the library is currently closed for renovations. I'm proposing

that relocate to First Congregational United
Church of Christ, located at 945 G Street,
Northwest. We'll be using the Multi-Purpose Room
and that site is right next door to the library.

Our next site would be relocation of Precinct 136, which is currently Leading Age.

And I'm proposing that we relocate to All Souls Episcopal Church located at 2300 Cathedral Avenue, Northwest. We'll be using the Church Hall.

And the last site that I am recommending for relocation is the Early Voting Site, EV-7, which is located in Ward 7.

Currently we were using the Benning Library. I'm proposing that we relocate to the Deanwood Recreation Center located at 1350 49th Street, Northeast and we'll be using the gymnasium there as well.

I am submitting these for final proposals for relocation. These were submitted for open forum to the public in the D.C. Register and published on 12/15/18, as well as sent out to

1 all affected ANC Commissioners, as well as 2 council members. Once the final relocation has been 3 4 approved by the Board, I will be sending another 5 notice to the D.C. Register, as well as all of those affected council members and ANC members as 6 7 well. 8 CHAIR BENNETT: Did you receive any 9 comments from the ANC or public, general public? MR. BUDOO: No, sir. And I gave them 10 11 the date -- once I published it in the Register, 12 I gave them the date of January 8th to give me 13 any feedback prior to the next scheduled Board 14 hearing. 15 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, any comments, 16 Ms. Lewis? 17 MEMBER LEWIS: No, thank you. 18 MS. MILLER: I just want for the 19 record, on several of these proposals, you have 20 that they are accessible with slight 21 modifications.

Yes.

MR. BUDOO:

MS. MILLER: Can you explain what the slight modifications may be?

MR. BUDOO: Slight modification may be proper signage posted at a location. Even though we have some where DCPS renovated a brand new school and you would assume that everything would be up to ADA standards, once we and Ms. Janice went out to actually survey the locations, we did observe that there were some issues at that location but it can be corrected with slight modifications and we will be working with DGS to try to get those corrections changed prior to the primary election.

CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. Are these corrections, like maybe to answer both, are these corrections that would be -- for modifications be permanent modifications at these facilities or temporary like maybe having a ramp that you would put in temporarily for certain areas?

MR. BUDOO: It would vary by location.

I couldn't say exactly but which, hopefully, once
we speak with DGS, at these public locations,

1	this would be something that would be permanent.
2	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. All right, any
3	other comments?
4	One of the things I would ask is that
5	I'm going to call for a vote on these removals
6	but also, if indeed you are not able to make some
7	of the modifications that you have reported that
8	to the Board as soon as platform, so if there is
9	anything we can do to support making sure that
LO	everything is ADA requirement, we'd like to see
L1	that.
L2	MR. BUDOO: Okay.
L3	CHAIR BENNETT: So I'd just call for
L 4	a vote for those changes permanent. Ms. Lewis?
L 5	MEMBER LEWIS: In favor.
L6	CHAIR BENNETT: I'm in favor. So,
L7	you've got unanimous approval of your report.
L8	MR. BUDOO: Okay.
L9	CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you.
20	Ms. Miller?
21	MS. MILLER: Thank you. Let me just
22	state the obvious, that is that we have moved.

The move took place between December 28th and 29th. We physically started working here on January 2nd. Doo, as you have already mentioned, Mr. Bennett, we want to thank clearly the staff for working through the holiday period to get this done and Department of General Services, who worked very closely with us to make this happen, as well as Members of the Council who supported the Board in this move.

So we are here. The space is definitely a lot better and serves our process more efficiently than our former space at 421 4th Street.

So, we're ready to get this election cycle underway. The pickup for the nominating petitions will be January 26th for primary election.

We are scheduling an open house for this facility for next Wednesday, January 17th, from 3:00 to 7:00, and on next Friday, January 19th at 11:00.

This office, as I've said before, is

accessible on the Green Line. It is the Ballpark Exit, I believe, and it's the Navy Yard Station.

All four major parties have submitted party plans for the Board to conduct any party elections during the June primary. Those plans are currently underway under review by the Board staff to make sure that they meet adequacy and are compliant with relevant processes and law so that we can accept and move forward for the June election.

Just an update on the eSign, and I talked about this all last year, eSign is basically ready to go. We will have 100 iPads that we will be able to lend out to members of the public. The process will mean that circulators will have an option of also using their own device. If they do opt to use the devices that we have, it will be a cost that we will ask them to make a deposit of \$350, which they will get returned back to them once the pads are returned. If they use their own personal devices, obviously, there will be no charge.

Training will be required before any devices are deployed that we give them.

This process will require training that we have worked closely with the City of Denver with and Denver reps will be here at the end of January, also, to do one final set of training with our staff. They will also be here through the beginning of the petition period to work with members of the public who want to go through training with them as well.

Also, the traditional pen and paper process will still be available to collect signatures. The options, obviously, would be available for anybody, hopefully, anyone who wants to do the eSign process or the traditional pen and paper, provides options for individuals to collect signatures once the petition period gets signed -- gets started.

We also have a contract in place now for the redesign of the website. That has finally been approved. The website will be more user friendly, hopefully, and we are targeting it

to be a 508-compliant to be accessible for members of the public who have accessibility issues. The goal is to have that final design to be launched by the first of April.

CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, thank you.

MS. MILLER: The Voter Registration

System proposal, \$3 million money that was

provided by the Council, that solicitation is

still underway. We were told by the contracting

officer yesterday that it was going to be out for

bid yesterday. We have not checked. As of last

night, we were told about five o'clock that she

was going to hit the button to put it out.

So I haven't checked this morning.

It's been an ongoing challenge to get that
solicitation finalized. Assuming the solicitation
did in fact go out last night, the target date
for the award of that contract is the end of
March. So we will check once we get out of the
meeting to see what the status of that is. We
have been on this since May, which is when the
Council allocated the funds for the Voter

1	Registration System. That's still ongoing.
2	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. And one thing
3	we need to make sure of with that is that, which
4	I don't think we thought about beforehand, well
5	maybe you did, is that the eSigning System is
6	properly or would properly be integrated with the
7	new Voter Registration System.
8	So, anyway, I'm sure that's something
9	we can't solve here but
10	MS. MILLER: That's part of the
11	CHAIR BENNETT: that's part of the
12	solicitation.
13	MS. MILLER: Yes, it's part of the
14	solicit it's part of the requirements of the
15	VR System
16	CHAIR BENNETT: Right.
17	MS. MILLER: of the solicitation is
18	what I'm saying, that they can merge.
19	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay.
20	MS. MILLER: Last Friday we met with
21	the Budget Review Team for the Administrative
22	Mayor's Office to discuss both the FY18 spending

pressures and the FY19 budget development.

We were promised that the current FY18 spending pressures would be given priority and that we should have follow-up very soon, hopefully by the end of this week.

And I will just reemphasize, as I have to them, that we cannot conduct elections without the proper funding. We are facing serious spending pressures and I do want to put on the record that this move had nothing to do with our fiscal budget because this move was all capital funding, which was in the capital budget by DGS. It did not affect our budget at all. So I don't want anybody to think that we took money out of our budget to make this move happen. all capital funding that was set aside years ago by DGS. So, hopefully, that request that we have been submitted will be addressed and we'll be able to get the funding that we need for both this year, FY18, and moving forward to FY19.

CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you.

MS. MILLER: That's my report.

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1	CHAIR BENNETT: Anything else?
2	MS. MILLER: No.
3	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay.
4	MEMBER LEWIS: Actually, I have one
5	question.
6	CHAIR BENNETT: I'm sorry. Please.
7	MEMBER LEWIS: In terms of the foreign
8	or sorry. In terms of the accessibility of
9	the new website, is there going to be foreign
10	language accessibility considerations or
11	translation options, other than English?
12	MS. MILLER: Yes.
13	MEMBER LEWIS: Okay.
14	CHAIR BENNETT: Any other questions?
15	MEMBER LEWIS: No.
16	CHAIR BENNETT: Now is the time we
17	move the public matters back to the end, as we
18	have earlier. Thank you, Mr. Sindram, for your
19	suggestion or your request. And so are there
20	matters from the public?
21	MR. SINDRAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
22	CHAIR BENNETT: Can I get the we

1	have one other one, Mr. Sindram, so I'm going to
2	ask you to be relatively brief, sir.
3	MR. SINDRAM: Sure.
4	CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you. Go ahead,
5	Mr. Sindram.
6	MR. SINDRAM: Thank you. When is the
7	next board meeting?
8	CHAIR BENNETT: Mr. Sindram, can you
9	give your name and all your information first for
10	the record?
11	MR. SINDRAM: Michael Sindram,
12	disabled veteran, served our country more than
13	most.
14	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay and address and
15	all that?
16	MR. SINDRAM: 6645 Georgia Avenue,
17	Northwest, Apartment 306, Washington, D.C. 20012
18	ZIP code.
19	CHAIR BENNETT: Great, thank you.
20	Would you ask your question again, Mr. Sindram?
21	MR. SINDRAM: The next Board meeting
22	is when for February?

The next Board meeting 1 CHAIR BENNETT: 2 for February, we just had a discussion about I was going to make that announcement at 3 that. 4 the end. But we are -- right now the 5 consideration is to move that meeting to February first, which is the first Thursday in February. 6 7 MR. SINDRAM: Okay. CHAIR BENNETT: But it will be on the 8 9 website within a couple of days but that's the -we had a discussion about that. And part of 10 what's driving that are just schedules but the 11 12 other is we have a distinguished Board member who is schedule to deliver her first child on 13 14 February the 12th and we wanted to try and make the Board meeting as far away from that as 15 16 possible, so that we don't have a situation here. 17 MR. SINDRAM: Congratulations are 18 surely in order, then. 19 CHAIR BENNETT: Absolutely. 20 MEMBER LEWIS: Thank you. 21 MR. SINDRAM: I happen to be 22 cybernetically challenged and I appreciate your

clarification about the upcoming meeting. Would 1 2 you, Ms. Jennings, who does the yeoman's job for ADA, send me a hard copy for the upcoming monthly 3 4 meetings for 2018? 5 Yes, she will. CHAIR BENNETT: The other is that 6 MR. SINDRAM: Okay. 7 as I heard Campaign Finance give its report, that 8 there was an audit of the Constituent Services 9 Fund for Ward 4 and it was indicated available 10 online. Again, being cybernetically challenged, 11 would you do the kindness to have a hard copy of 12 that sent to me as well? And I can repeat my 13 address, if needed. 14 CHAIR BENNETT: Yes, I think we have the address and we'll pass it on to Ms. Jennings 15 16 to make sure that you get that. 17 MR. SINDRAM: Cool. Again, that's 18 Ward 4, the Constituents Services audit. 19 That ward was the Ward MR. SANFORD: 20 7 Constituent Services fund that was complete. 21 MR. SINDRAM: But if I understood you

correctly, you also indicated Ward 4.

1	MR. SANFORD: No, there was a periodic
2	random audit. Those are not published. But this
3	is a published completed audit that was for Ward
4	7 Constituent Services Fund and was issued on
5	December 22, 2017.
6	The periodic random audit for Ward 4
7	was initiated on October 30, 2017 and has not
8	been issued.
9	MR. SINDRAM: And if I understand you
10	correctly, once it is issued, it will be made
11	public.
12	MR. SANFORD: Yes, it will.
13	MR. SINDRAM: Okay and at that time,
14	would you do the kindness to send me a hard copy,
15	please?
16	CHAIR BENNETT: We'll
17	MR. SANFORD: At the time, we'll
18	announce it and then if you'd remind us, we'll be
19	more happy to provide you with a hard copy.
20	MR. SINDRAM: Any idea when it will be
21	issued?
22	MR. SANFORD: I can't speak for the

Audit Division.
MR. SINDRAM: Okay, thank you.
And once again, clarification, Mr.
Chair. So public comment, then, will commence at
the end of the reports of the Board, yes?
CHAIR BENNETT: Yes. Yes, we have
made that change. And if I decide to make the
change and do it differently, I'll let you know
in advance but we made the change as you
requested.
MR. SINDRAM: Thank you.
CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, thank you.
Other public comment? Yes, sir. Can
you please
MR. BROWN: Good morning.
CHAIR BENNETT: Good morning.
MR. BROWN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman
for allowing me to address the Board for a very
simple change.
CHAIR BENNETT: Sure.
MR. BROWN: First let me say that I
love your new location and I think it's very

1	cool. So, congratulations.
2	And also, it took me just as long to
3	find a parking space here as it did at 441.
4	There's a sense of continuity.
5	CHAIR BENNETT: The parking is in this
6	building and it is a little more expensive but it
7	is here.
8	Can I ask you, for the record, to give
9	your name?
10	MR. BROWN: I'm Michael Brown,
11	Michael C. Brown. I'm one of the two elected
12	United States Senators from District 1 and I'm

requirements attached to it than any office in the District of Columbia. You must be a citizen for nine years. You must be at least 30 years of age, and you must comply with all the provisions of the Constitution. In addition, you must get eight times as many signatures as you need to become a member of the D.C. Council.

It's the only office that is referred to this way. We all know that the Mayor and Council cannot pass bills that are not approved by Congress but yet we don't refer to them as shadow council members, or shadow mayor, or

shadow delegate in the case of another employee. 1 2 So I ask that in the few places where the term shadow senator or shadow representative 3 4 appear in the nomenclature that you use, that the 5 term be removed. And I don't know the proper procedure 6 7 to make that happen, but I think it's important 8 to have the people of the District of Columbia, 9 who have created this office, stand up for it. It's very hard -- it's a hard job on 10 11 Capitol Hill, as it is. 12 Yes, I'm sure. CHAIR BENNETT: 13 MR. BROWN: So I make that request to 14 the Board. 15 CHAIR BENNETT: Your request is so 16 I don't think there is a need to do 17 anything in writing, is there, for that? 18 don't see a reason why we have to not do it. 19 So if, indeed there is something we 20 find that does not allow us to do it, we'll 21 certainly give you notice of that. 22 MR. BROWN: Okay, thank you so much.
