3	MEMBER GREENFIELD: We're going to go
4	ahead and call meeting to order. First I want to
5	make sure we have a quorum. The chairman is not
6	here. I am here, Karyn Greenfield. Mike Gill,
7	you're here?
8	MEMBER GILL: I'm here, Karyn.
9	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay.
10	MEMBER GILL: Can you hear me?
11	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Yes, I sure can,
12	Thank you.
13	MEMBER GILL: All right.
14	MEMBER GREENFIELD: So we do have a
15	quorum. We'll move on to a motion of the
16	approval of the minutes. We'll first move to
17	approve the minutes. Can I get a motion to move
18	approve the minutes from the last Board
19	meeting?
20	MEMBER GILL: Yes, I make a motion to
21	can I approve the agenda at the same time?
22	I'd like to make a motion to approve the agenda

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and approve the minutes from the September Board 1 2 meeting. MEMBER GREENFIELD: We have a amendment 3 to the agenda, so I'm going to do the minutes and 4 5 then we'll go back to the agenda. MEMBER GILL: All right. 6 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. 7 8 MEMBER GILL: All right, so a motion to 9 approve the minutes from the last Board meeting. 10 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay, I second. All in favor? 11 (Chorus of ayes.) 12 13 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. The minutes 14 have been approved and passed. Now to the 15 adoption of the agenda. I want to amend it to 16 include final rulemaking on this agenda, so we'll 17 address that. Can I have a motion to approve the 18 agenda as amended? 19 MEMBER GILL: I make a motion to 20 approve the agenda as amended. 21 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second the motion. All in favor? 22

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1	(Chorus of ayes.)
2	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. That has
3	been moved and properly passed.
4	Okay, we will now move into Board
5	Matters. Mr. Gill, do you have anything for
6	Board Matters?
7	MEMBER GILL: Just quickly and Alice
8	maybe I'll just think about it now, and I'll ask
9	the question during your report, but I'm just
10	curious where we are now with and who, you know,
11	hired employees for the actual election date, and
12	then volunteers for the election date. I'm
13	curious on those.
14	Also, Alice, I want to ask the
15	question on your report regarding I know we've
16	called we started the process a couple years
17	ago in terms of, you know, voters who have passed
18	away and things like that, and as that process is
19	ongoing. We also have a process that if you
20	don't vote for a number of elections you get
21	brought off the rolls, but none of that took into
22	account that suddenly we would be doing mail in

ballots, which we've decided that -- as a Board 1 2 that that's the right thing to do because of health concerns, sending everyone a ballot. 3 4 Invariably there's going to be people who have 5 passed away who are getting ballots, and I want to just ask about addressing that and giving 6 people comfort that that's not a surprise that's 7 8 part of the calling of the system that's been 9 ongoing, but there's going to be that issue. It is fraud to take one of those ballots and turn it 10 11 in. In the past, before we had the pandemic, the 12 way we handled this is that dead people have a 13 strong preponderance not to show up at the polls, 14 and so it's something we deal with, but it's not something that has been a fraud problem in 15 16 previous elections. Just the heads up that I 17 also want to talk about those things. 18 MS. MILLER: Sure. 19 (Simultaneous speaking.) 20 MEMBER GILL: I don't have any 21 questions right now. MS. MILLER: Some of that is actually 22

1 covered in my prepared report. 2 MEMBER GILL: I can barely hear you, Alice. I don't know if others are having 3 4 trouble. 5 MS. MILLER: I said some of that is actually covered in my prepared report. 6 7 MEMBER GILL: Oh, good. Well see I'm 8 ahead of things. 9 (Laughter.) 10 MS. MILLER: Yes, you are, as always. 11 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. The only 12 thing I would like to say is just thank the team for everything they've done so far getting ready 13 14 for this election, and thank you in advance for all the hard work that's coming and that's going 15 16 forward to get us to November 3rd. 17 We'll now move on to the Campaign 18 Finance Report. Cecily, will you report. 19 (No audible response.) 20 MEMBER GREENFIELD: We can't hear you 21 Cecily. Hold on. 22 (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter

1	went off the record at 10:36 a.m. and
2	resumed at 10:40 a.m.)
3	MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: The first
4	thing I will report is that the Agency continues
5	to operate under a modified status. All of our
6	services continue to be provided remotely via
7	email and also by telephone. We can be reached
8	at 202-671-0547.
9	I would report that on September the
10	29th and the 30th, 2020, the office of Campaign
11	Finance hosted the virtual 2020 DC debates for
12	the November the 3rd, 2020 general election
13	contest for at-large member of the State Board of
14	Education and at large member of the Council of
15	the District of Columbia.
16	The debates were the normal debates
17	under the Fair Elections Program, and were live
18	streamed at 2020dcdebates.com. All candidates
19	certified in the Fair Elections Program were
20	required to participate in the debate, and all
21	candidates who achieved ballot access in the
22	traditional Campaign Finance Program were invited

to participate.

2	On September the 29th the At Large
3	Member of the State Board of Education Candidate
4	Debate was moderated by Perry Stein, the
5	Washington Post Reporter for Education, and a
6	total of six candidates participated. The
7	September the 29th and 30th debates for At Large
8	Member of the council were moderated by the
9	Washington Post reporter, Fenit Nirappil, and a
10	total of 18 candidates participated. Debate one,
11	which again was the Board of Education debate,
12	was held on September the 29th from 4:30 to 6:00
13	p.m. There were six participants.
14	The first debate for the at large
15	member of the council was held on September the
16	29th from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. There were five
17	participants. The second debate for the At Large
18	Member of the Council was held on September the
19	30th, again, from 5:00 to 6:30 p.m. There were
20	seven participants, and the last debate for the
21	at large member of the council was held again on
22	September the 30th from 8:00 to 9:30 p.m., and

there was six participants.

2	Advertisements for the debates were
3	placed on bus exteriors on various routes
4	throughout the District of Columbia area, and on
5	15 area radio stations, and digital ads were
6	placed on the Internet. Press release and
7	information on the debates was also published on
8	the website at 2020dcdebates.com. There were 14
9	partners affiliated with the 2020 DC debates.
10	The videos of the debates are
11	available at OCF's 2020 DC Debates' website.
12	Again, www.2020dcdebates.com for continuous
13	viewing, and will remain online through the
14	November 3rd general election.
15	In the Fair Elections Program during
16	the month of September I would report that the
17	total sum of \$72,752.00 was authorized for
18	distribution in base and matching payments to the
19	following FEC participating candidates, on nine -
20	- on September the 10th a payment of \$600.00, a
21	matching payment, was authorized to James for
22	Ward 2, State Board of Education.

1	On September the 10th a matching
2	payment of \$400.00 was authorized for Lex Reed
3	(phonetic) 2020. On September the 11th a
4	matching payment of \$21,877.00 was authorized for
5	the Committee to Elect Mysiki Valentine. On 9/11
6	a base amount payment of \$10,000.00 was
7	authorized for the Committee to Elect Mysiki
8	Valentine.
9	On 9/11 a matching payment in the
10	amount of \$1,375.00 was authorized for Franklin
11	Garcia for DC 2020, as well as a matching payment
12	for the amount of \$1,150.00. On September the
13	16th a matching payment of \$15,650.00 was
14	authorized for Randy Downs, Ward 2.
15	On September the 28th a matching
16	payment of \$20,100.00 was authorized for the
17	Friends of Christina Henderson, and on September
18	the 29th a matching payment of \$600.00 was
19	authorized for the Committee to Elect Dontrell
20	Smith.
21	As of September the 30th, the total
22	sum of \$3,612,451.00 has been disbursed in base

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amount and matching payments to the 35 candidates who have been certified in the Fair Elections Program to participate in the elections which were held during this calendar year, the June 2nd, 2020 primary election, the June 16, 2020 special elections, and the November the 3rd general election.

There are currently, again, 20 8 9 candidates certified as participating candidates in the program for the November the 3rd general 10 election. Eleven candidates were certified in 11 the June 2nd, 2020 primary elections. 12 Ten of these candidates were defeated and, again, will 13 14 not continue to participate in the general The four candidates who were certified 15 election. 16 as participating candidates in the June 15th 17 special election were defeated.

During the month of September we also certified three new candidates into the Fair Elections Program for them to participate in the November the 3rd, 2020 general election. The first is the Committee to Elect Mysiki Valentine.

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The Committee and the candidate were certified on September the 11th, Ebony Rose Thompson for DC State Board of Education Ward 7 were certified on September the 11th, 2020. The Committee to Elect Friends of Allister Chang were certified on September the 11th, 2020.

Also the Fair Elections Program
conducted 29 desk reviews, and basically those
were of the optional August 31st to September
30th, and amended reports of receipts and
expenditures as a result of the desk request for
additional information.

13 Ongoing audits. In the Fair Elections 14 Program for the 2020 primary election the Fair 15 Elections Program is in the process of conducting 16 post-election audits. Notice of full field 17 audits were issued on June the 19th, 2020.

18 The status of the full field audits is 19 as follows, Kelvin Brown for DC Council, Ward 7. 20 The audit documentation has not been received as 21 of September the 4th. The matter was referred to 22 the Office of the General Counsel. A hearing on

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the failure to file documents is scheduled for 1 2 October the 8th. Green for Ward 7, the audit documentation was received on August the 6th, 3 4 2020. The audit is in progress. Evans 2020, the audit documentation was received on July 31st. 5 The audit is in progress. Yilin for Ward 2, 6 7 audit documentation was received on August the 8 The audit is in progress. Patrick Kennedy 29th. 9 for Ward 2, an extension was approved until October the 12th for a commission of the 10 Mike for Ward 8, audit documentation 11 documents. 12 was received on August the 14th. The audit is in 13 progress. Kishan for DC 2020, the audit 14 documentation was received on August the 6th. 15 The audit is in progress. Jordan Grossman for 16 Ward 2, the audit documentation was received on 17 August the 5th, and the audit is in progress. 18 John Fanning for Ward 2, an extension was 19 approved until October the 12th for submission of 20 the documents. Elect Renee Bowser, audit 21 documentation was received on August the 24th. 22 The audit is in progress, and it was referred to

the General Counsel and the hearing is scheduled 1 2 on the failure to timely file the documents, and that's scheduled for October the 8th. 3 Again, I would point out that these 4 5 are the post-election audits that are being conducted at the campaign operations of those 6 candidates who participated in the primary 7 election, and who were certified in the Fair 8 9 Elections Program and were defeated. 10 Also, we are conducting post-election 11 audits of the candidates who participated in the 12 special election. The notice of the full field 13 audits was issued on July 6, 2020, and the candidates who are under audit are as follows: 1) 14 Kishan Putta, Kishan Putta for Ward 2 special 15 16 election 2020, an extension was approved until October the 12th for the submission of documents. 17 18 John Fanning, John Fanning for Ward 2 special 19 election, an extension was approved until October the 12th for the submission of documents. 20 Jordan 21 Grossman, Grossman for Ward 2 special elections, 22 the audit documentation was filed on August the

1	14th, and the audit is in progress. Patrick
2	Kennedy, Patrick Kennedy for Ward 2 special
3	election, the extension was approved until
4	October the 12th for the submission of documents.
5	In our Public Information and Records
6	Management Division during the month of September
7	2020, there were three filing dates for the
8	reports of receipts and expenditures. The first
9	one was for the Legal Defense Committee. The
10	ninth report of receipts and expenditures was due
11	on September the 1st, 2020. There is one
12	required filer. The filer timely filed and
13	report was electronically filed with our
14	Initiative Referendum Committee.
15	A second report of receipts and
16	expenditures was due on September the 10th.
17	There was one required filer, and the filer did
18	timely file and electronically filed the report
19	with our Fair Elections Program for our Principal
20	Campaign Committee. September the 30th was an
21	optional report date for the candidates who were
22	certified in that program. We had ten who filed

the optional report, and all of the ten 1 2 committees electronically filed their report. During the month of September we had 3 one candidate and committee that registered with 4 us, that is an exploratory committee, the Butler 5 Mayoral Exploratory Committee registered on 6 7 September the 21st, 2020. We also had two 8 candidates and treasurers who completed the 9 Entrance Conference presentation. The first was Sarah Mehrotra, Candidate and Treasurer Committee 10 11 to Elect Sarah Shanti Mehrotra, Ward 2, State 12 Board of Education, Cathy Henderson, Candidate and Treasurer Committee to Elect Cathy Henderson 13 14 for At Large City Council. In our Reports Analysis and Audit 15 16 Division during the month of September 2020 the audit branch conducted 36 reviews of reports of 17 18 receipts and expenditures that had been filed. 19 Again, I would just mention, or clarify for the 20 record, that this is the audit of the -- or desk 21 review of the reports that are filed in our 22 traditional campaign finance program.

1	The following are the ongoing audits
2	in the audit branch, and the first are the
3	periodic random audits, and these are of
4	candidates in the upcoming 2020 election, and of
5	the January 31st filing. The first is Friends of
6	Robert White. Audit records were received in
7	March 2020. The field work continues. Veda for
8	Ward 7 was initiated on March the 2nd. The field
9	work continues.
10	Committee to Elect Rogers for Council
11	for initiated March 2nd. Again, the audit field
12	work continued in that matter as well. We also
13	are conducting periodic random audits of a filing
14	by our Political Action Committee on January
15	31st. The first is Verizon Communications Inc.,
16	The Government Club Pact, which was initiated on
17	March the 2nd. The audit work is ongoing, the
18	field work. The DC Libertarian Party, which was
19	initiated March 2nd, again, the audit field work
20	continues. The Firefighters Committee on
21	Political Activities, which was initiated on
22	March 2nd, the audit field work continues.

1	We issued one audit during the month
2	of September, and that was of the Ward 4
3	Continuant Service Program. The audit report was
4	issued on September the 22nd, 2020. That was a
5	compliance audit, and the audit is available at
6	our website for review by members of the public.
7	That completes my report, but I would
8	now ask the General Counsel for the Agency,
9	William Sanford, to present his report.
10	MR. SANFORD: Hello, good morning.
11	(No audible response.)
12	MR. SANFORD: Hello, good morning.
13	(No audible response.)
14	MR. SANFORD: Hello, good morning.
15	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Hello, we can hear
16	you.
17	MR. SANFORD: Okay. Good morning,
18	Madam Chairman and distinguished Board Member
19	Gill. My name is William Sanford, General
20	Counsel for the Office of Campaign Finance.
21	During the month of September the Office of the
22	General Counsel received five referrals and

conducted six informal hearings, and issued six 1 2 orders in which no fines were imposed and no fines were collected during that month. 3 During the month of September 2020, the Office of the 4 5 General Counsel maintained three open investigations. They include the following: 6 Complaint filed by Jennie Malloy against Karl 7 8 Racine for Attorney General 2018. The allegation 9 is inappropriate use of campaign funds. The investigation in this matter is 10 11 completed, however, we have been unable to issue 12 the order, because there's one missing report that the Committee has been unable to provide 13 14 because their accountant became gravely ill and expired during the process of this investigation, 15 16 and so we have extended the time for them to 17 provide that final document. 18 The second complaint is a complaint 19 filed by Chuck Thies. The Respondent was Anthony 20 Lorenzo Green. The allegation was inappropriate 21 use of a government resource. The final draft of

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that order is under review and it will be issued

2	The final investigation that was
3	opened in the month during the month of
4	September is a complaint that was filed by Lauren
5	Wolfe. The Respondent was candidate Brooke
6	Pinto, who is currently Council Member Brooke
7	Pinto. The allegation was failure to report
8	excessive contributions. The investigation was
9	completed. The Order was issued on the 25th of
10	September 2020, and the order dismissed the
11	complaint due to insufficient evidence to support
12	the allegations.
13	During the month of September there
14	were no requests for interpretative opinions, and
15	no show cause proceedings were conducted during
16	the month of September 2020. And that should
17	conclude my report.
18	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. Thank you.
19	Thank you very much.
20	MR. SANFORD: Thank you.
21	(Simultaneous speaking.)
22	MEMBER GILL: No comments for no

questions for Bill or Cecily.

2 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. Thank you. We'll then now move forward to the Executive 3 4 Director's Report, Alice Miller. 5 MS. MILLER: Thank you. Good morning, I want to begin by thanking all of 6 everyone. District of Columbia residents who've answered 7 8 our call, stepped up, signed up to be election 9 workers for this election. We have not only met, but well exceeded our goal thanks to all of the 10 11 DC residents who willingly volunteered. We have 12 over 3,000 applications now that are still 13 sitting in the queue to be contacted for training 14 and placement at a vote center -- in one of the 95 vote centers citywide. We're fortunate and 15 16 definitely appreciative of this. The individuals who have answered our 17

request represent a much younger workforce than the average older workers that we normally employ, in fact, many of these workers average between 25 and 40 years of age, and for that we're grateful. Of course, we continue to need

the support and appreciate the support of our 1 2 veteran workers who really know how to get the job done, and they'll help guide the younger 3 4 workers and our new workers as we go through this 5 process; we will definitely rely on them. With that said, as of yesterday 6 Election Worker Training and Recruitment Division 7 8 has trained 3,081 election workers. There are 9 655 election workers that are still scheduled to attend an upcoming training class. According to 10 11 the allocation list, we estimated that we needed 12 a minimum of 2,159 workers, so at this point we 13 have trained 922 more, and with the 655 that are scheduled to be trained that'll take us to about 14 15 1,500-plus over, which we will have on a reserve, 16 and use and have a few of them come down and meet 17 us in the warehouse to be available if we need to 18 deploy them out for election day for the 95 19 sites.

20 Our last and final training class has 21 been scheduled for Saturday, October 24th. All 22 of the workers have been trained and will be

trained in the following positions: as site 1 2 coordinators, registration clerks, ballot clerks, voter assistance clerks. And since August 4th we 3 have conducted 45 registration clerk classes. 4 5 There are nine more classes that are scheduled to be conducted, 53 ballot clerk classes, nine more 6 7 scheduled to be conducted, 47 voter assistant 8 classes, seven more scheduled, three site 9 coordinator classes, and there are nine more scheduled. 10

We also are scheduled to have six precinct technician classes, and we'll have 95 technicians scheduled to be at each of the 95 vote centers, as well as technicians scheduled for early vote centers as well.

The election day assignment letters were mailed out by USPS mail on Friday, October 2nd to 90 percent of the workers that have been assigned to one of the 95 election day vote centers. We're scheduling right now a few more registration clerks to fill vacancies in Ward 7 and 8. We have the people we're just -- I'm

scheduling them, so don't get upset we do have 1 2 the people we're just trying -- need to schedule them for Ward 7 and 8, but the response from 3 4 those wards was not quite as high as from the 5 citywide, so we're looking to see how we can navigate some of the other individuals to go over 6 7 to Ward 7 and 8. 8 Early voting assignment letters are 9 now being finalized, and should be ready to be emailed prior to the end of this week, and our 10 11 training on the processes will continue through 12 October 24th. So that's with the training. I'11 13 stop and see if Mr. Gill wants to ask questions 14 on that, or you want me to continue? 15 MEMBER GILL: What was your question to 16 me, Alice? 17 MS. MILLER: Do you want to question on 18 the votes -- on the staffing, or you want me to

19 continue with the report?

20 MEMBER GILL: Just finish the report. 21 I guess what I'm hearing though is that we're 22 looking good. The queue -- is the queue because

1 we have way more applications than we thought, or 2 needed, or is the queue something we need to be 3 concerned about?

4 MS. MILLER: No, the queue is there 5 because at this point we really can't place anymore people, and so we have those voter 6 records. We'll keep those, and we're telling 7 8 them that we will keep them, and if we need them we'll call them, to have for upcoming elections. 9 MEMBER GILL: All right. That's a good 10 11 problem to have. 12 MS. MILLER: And just to move on as we 13 previously reported they'll be 32 early vote 14 sites, 95 election day sites, and we will now 15 have six super vote centers with the recent 16 addition of the Entertainment and Sports Arena in 17 Southeast. I will add that there will be no 18 curbside voting at any of the super vote centers, 19 but the remaining 89 will all have curbside 20 voting available. As of yesterday, all 55 mail drop 21

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boxes were available for voters to deposit their

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They will be available 24 hours up 1 ballots. 2 through and including election day. The ballot drop boxes will close at 8:00 p.m. on November 3 4 3rd. There is an interactive map that will allow 5 voters to locate both the closest drop box, and the vote centers based on their address -- based 6 7 on the address that they put on the website to 8 direct them to the closest vote center or drop 9 box. Ballot Trax is -- or let me do this 10 11 first, we mailed 463,422 ballots to registered 12 voters from our mail house in Washington State on September 25th. Those ballots were delivered to 13 14 the USPS in DC on 9/27, and started delivering --15 and USPS here started delivering our ballots on 16 September 28th. Just a breakdown of that, 18,031 have been returned as undeliverable. 17 The 18 undeliverable are broken down into the following 19 categories, 6,610 in the city have address

20 changes or have moved, and that move has been 21 since July or August which was when we did our 22 last national change of address update in our

system, 8,422 are out of state movers, of which 1 2 we have no information on, 2,461 have no forwarding address, 534 have a stamp that says 3 temporary away, return to sender, and we have 4 5 four that have come back as deceased, so our ballots will continue to be mailed out on a 6 7 rolling basis to voters through the middle of 8 October from the mail house, like to remind 9 voters to check their mailboxes. If you receive a ballot at your home that does not belong to you 10 11 or anyone in your household please mark it as you 12 would with any mail that you receive at your home 13 to return to sender, put it back in the mailbox, 14 or in this case you can drop it in mail ballot drop box, one of ours, and we'll get it. 15 16 As of yesterday the United States Post 17 Office -- Postal Service has returned 7,674 18 ballots to us, and our ballot boxes as of 19 yesterday we had 7,861 ballots returned. Ballot 20 Trax is operating for voters to track their 21 ballots. The ballots deposited through the USPS, 22 or the mail ballot drop box will be tracked, and

voters can follow the travel path of their ballot 1 2 back to our offices through the website. Ballot Trax will show the ballot has been received and 3 accepted to be counted. You can go to our 4 5 website available through our splash page, type in your name and sign up for notifications as you 6 7 deem necessary. That's it's for the ballots.

8 I'll talk a little bit about restore 9 Restore the vote process, as you know, the vote. the city enacted the law to restore and to have 10 voters who were incarcerated to have their rights 11 12 restored. Back in August we mailed 2,400 13 registration applications to 107 federal prisons 14 where we knew DC voters were incarcerated. We've been working with the Federal Bureau of Prisons 15 16 to get those registration applications back. То 17 date since we sent those out we've gotten -- 400 18 communications have been received back, but those 19 are not necessarily applications, but 20 communications, registration applications, 21 request for information, and request for applications for DC residents within the federal 22

Three hundred and fifty-two DC residents 1 prison. 2 incarcerated within the federal prison have successfully completed the voter registration 3 application, and approximately 85 applications 4 5 are being returned to federal prison through BOP for correction for missing information. 6 We're 7 working closely with BOP re-entry affairs 8 coordinators to complete this task, and hopefully 9 we'll have all the information that we need by the October 13th deadline. 10 11 With respect to the DC jail, to date 12 we have 42 ballots that have been returned from 13 the DC Jail, and we have been working closely with them as well to make sure that these 14 individuals are registered, and that their 15 16 ballots will be sent to them in a timely fashion.

Outreach activities, there have been quite a few outreach activities, and we continue to do those through -- I will mention that we will have one -- last one scheduled for September -- October, I'm sorry, October 13th, which will be our last day for voter registration, and that

will be held at the Entertainment and Sports 1 2 Arena, and we're going to partner with the Washington Football Team, with the teams at the 3 Capital Arena, and we're going to do an all out 4 splash to get voters one last time to register to 5 We plan on it being a pretty hype event. 6 vote. 7 There'll be a lot of media, and going out to the 8 meeting and get them there. We'll have a disc 9 jockey there, and there's going to be an opportunity for people to meet some of the alumni 10 11 players who will also be there, and just really 12 get that promoted as we move into next week as 13 well. That's going to be scheduled for Tuesday. 14 The time frame is from 10:00 to 2:00, and that's at the Entertainment Sports Arena in Southeast. 15 16 I also want to indicate that we have sent out a number of information and postcards 17 18 with flyers. I'm sure many of you, but not 19 everyone, has received at least two of the 20 postcards that we've sent out. Postcards went 21 out -- the first went out on September 16th to The second one was mailed 22 all registered voters.

out on September 25th to households. We sent e-1 2 flyers for distribution to all ANCs through --Gottlieb Simon as you know is the ANC executive 3 4 director, and he has helped us get the e-flyers 5 out by using email addresses that he has for all the ANC officers, so the e-flyers have gone out 6 7 to them. We will send additional e-flyers, I 8 think, by the end of this week or next week we'll 9 have that scheduled.

We have 500 yard signs that will be 10 11 delivered to individual yards scheduled for, 12 actually, tomorrow for October 8th. One hundred 13 thousand door hangers will be delivered on October 9th, and another 100,000 on October 13th. 14 15 The second e-flyers, I just mentioned, will go 16 out on October 14th, and then another e-flyer for 17 all of our registered voters with whom we have an 18 email address will go out on October 15th, and 19 additional yard signs will be delivered between the 19th and 20th with 400,000 door hangers --20 21 additional door hangers to be delivered on October 25th. 22

1	I just want to talk a little bit about
2	some of the events that the Board members and
3	staff members have been participating in. A
4	number of different webinars with local and
5	national federal partners. I had the privilege
6	of serving on a panel sponsored by Harvard with
7	election officials and others in crisis
8	management this week. I also participated
9	earlier this week as a panelist with experts in
10	elections and election fraud issues from the U.S.
11	Attorney's Office, the FBI, the Public Corruption
12	Civil Rights Section of the United States
13	Attorney's Office of DC. That panel the topic
14	of that was protecting our vote as well as a
15	group that I participated in with the through
16	the lawyers division of the DC Bar Association, I
17	believe that was last month.
18	We will DC BOE and along with the
19	U.S. Attorney's Office and the Black Prosecutors
20	of the U.S. Attorney's Office and National Bar
21	Association Young Lawyer's Section will host an
22	event on October 20th titled Navigating the 2020

Election, What You Need to Know to Protect Your 1 2 Vote. This will be -- panelist for this will include both our general counsel and myself, and 3 what I wanted to indicate was all of this, all 4 5 these webinars, all of these meetings, and all 6 these things that we're doing is all about 7 messaging and ensuring that voters have the right 8 information that they need from trusted sources 9 and who those trusted sources are that they should rely on when getting this information. 10 11 I think that concludes my report. Oh, 12 I forgot to mention the voter guides have gone 13 out, so people should have that as well. 14 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. Board Member Gill, you have any questions? 15 16 MEMBER GILL: No questions for me. 17 Thanks, Alice. 18 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Chairman Bennett is 19 now here. Do you have any questions? 20 CHAIR BENNETT: No questions. Thank 21 you. 22 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Go ahead.

1	(Simultaneous speaking.)
2	MEMBER GREENFIELD: We're going to the
3	General Counsel's report from Terri.
4	MS. STROUD: Thank you. Good morning,
5	everyone.
6	The first item on my agenda is
7	litigation status. The first case in the status
8	is William V. Hunt versus the Board. This matter
9	was a complaint regarding the counting of write-
10	in votes in the mayoral contest in the November
11	2018 general election. Mr. Hunt, who was a write
12	in candidate for mayor, filed a complaint to
13	request that the Board count the write in votes
14	cast in the mayoral contest, which the Board was
15	not required to do, because that amount was not
16	sufficient to elect a write in candidate. The
17	Board filed a motion to dismiss in April of 2019,
18	which were granted on March 10th of this year.
19	Mr. Hunt filed an appeal on April 16th of 2020,
20	which was beyond the 30-day period provided for
21	in the rules. The court gave Mr. Hunt until May
22	22nd to show cause why the case should not be

dismissed as untimely, and subsequently extended that deadline to July 1st. Mr. Hunt's re-file on June 25th did not address the question of why the appeal should not be dismissed as a matter of law. We're awaiting the court's decision in this matter.

7 The second two matters which are 8 combined are Phillip Hammond v. the Board, and 9 Robin Marlin v. the Board. These matters are appealed Board Orders 19-032 and 19-033, both of 10 11 which upheld the resolutions of ANC 7B, which 12 found no vacancies in single member district 7B04 13 and 7B05 respectively. These matters are at the 14 DC Court of Appeals. The petitioners filed their 15 briefs on December 16th of 2019 and their 16 appendices on March 4th. We filed our response 17 on April 5th of this year via electronic case 18 filing, and we expect the court to decide the 19 merits for both cases on the papers. 20 The last -- the next matter is

Alliance Party v. The Board. This was a matter
that was filed in the District's Federal District

Neal R. Gross and Co., Inc. Washington DC

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Court, and is being handled by the District's 1 2 Office of the Attorney General. It involved a complaint for declaratory and injunctive relief 3 against the Board, and it seeks to preclude -- it 4 5 sought to preclude the Board from enforcing the August 5th, 2020, ballot access filing deadline 6 against independent and third-party candidates 7 8 for the Office of U.S. President, because 9 although the signature requirement for that office was lowered by the passage of the General 10 11 Election Preparations Emergency Amendment Act of 12 2020, that did not occur until after the August 13 5th deadline had passed, thereby precluding 14 independent and third-party candidates from being able to take advantage of the reduced signature 15 16 requirement. Plaintiff sought to have the court 17 order the Board to accept a petition with the 18 requisite number of signatures filed by noon on 19 Tuesday, September 8th. On September 3rd, the court held a hearing on the Plaintiff's request 20 21 for a temporary restraining order, and in that hearing the court denied the Plaintiff's request 22

for the TRO. Plaintiffs are still litigating
 this case on the merits, and the Office of the
 Attorney General filed an answer and a motion to
 dismiss on September 23rd, and the matter is
 still pending.

The final case is Henderson v. the DC 6 7 Board of Elections. That matter involved an 8 appeal by Plaintiff Kathy Henderson from a Board 9 order granting ballot access to Bernice Blacknell, a candidate in the office -- a 10 candidate in the contest for ANC commissioner in 11 12 Single Member District 5D04. The Board filed a 13 Motion for Summary Affirmance in this matter in 14 the DC Court of Appeals on September 9th, and it was granted on September 11th. 15

16 The next item on my agenda is 17 Rulemaking, and I have final rulemaking and 18 emergency and proposed rulemaking. The final 19 rulemaking would amend Chapters 5 and 7 to 20 replace those sections into -- those chapters 21 into conformity with the General Elections 22 Preparation Emergency Amendment Act of 2020. It

would clarify that cameras may be used in voting 1 2 accounting locations as long as they do not disrupt or interfere with the election 3 administration process, and it would establish 4 5 that request for absentee ballots must be received by the 15 day before election day. 6 This 7 is with respect to ballots that have been 8 misplaced, or have not been received, because we 9 did mail ballots to all registered voters, so requests are not required, but in certain 10 11 circumstances you can request a ballot by the 12 15th day before election day. That is the final 13 rulemaking. A notice of proposed -- emergency 14 proposed rulemaking with respect to this rulemaking was published in the DC Register on 15 16 September 11th at 67 DCMR 010977. No written 17 comments on the proposed rules were received 18 during the public comment period, and no 19 substantive changes have been made to the 20 regulations as proposed. The Board adopted these rules as -- well, I'm done with that. That's the 21 22 final rulemaking for the consideration by the

4	rulemaking Chapter 7 would be amended to place it		
5	into conformity with the Election Worker		
6	Residency Requirement Waiver Emergency Amendment		
7	Act of 2020, which provides that District		
8	government employees who are not district		
9	residents, or qualified electors may serve as		
10	polling place officials, and so I would ask the		
11	Board for a motion to adopt both the Final and		
12	Emergency and Proposed Rulemaking.		
13	MEMBER GILL: I make a motion to the		
14	Board to adopt the Final and Proposed Rulemaking.		
15	CHAIR BENNETT: I second your motion.		
16	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. All in		
17	favor.		
18	(Chorus of ayes.)		
19	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay, that has been		
20	moved and passed.		
21	Is that all?		
22	MS. STROUD: That's all on my agenda.		

1	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Okay. We're done		
2	with that part of the agenda. What we have next		
3	is Public Matters. I don't know how we'll
