3 CHAIR THOMPSON: It is Wednesday,
4 October 2nd. Welcome to our regular Board
5 meeting. Only about a month to go before general
6 election day. Hope everybody's having a good
7 week.

8 We have a quorum. In addition to
9 myself, Gary Thompson, the Chair of the Board of
10 Elections, we have Board members Karyn Greenfield
11 and J.C. Boggs with us by Zoom.

12 And with our quorum, the first thing
13 we do is adopt our agenda, which has been
14 distributed. We've had a chance to review it and
15 I would move that we adopt the agenda.

16 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor?

18 (Chorus of aye.)

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: Agenda passes. Also,
20 the minutes. There's an aye from J.C. Boggs.

21 MEMBER BOGGS: Aye.

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: Reviewed our minutes

1 from our last meeting, September 3rd. I will
2 move that we adopt our minutes, please.

3 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Second.

4 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor?

5 (Chorus of aye.)

6 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, this is
7 easy. Okay. Moving along to the Executive
8 Director's Report from Monica Holman Evans.

9 MS. EVANS: Thank you and good
10 morning. The Executive Director's Report for
11 September 2024.

12 Executive Director September
13 engagements. During the month of September, I
14 presented to members of Washington, D.C., Alumni
15 Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. I
16 met with members of the Social Action Committee
17 to discuss voter education and outreach, plans
18 for the general election, and ways we engage with
19 special populations in the District of Columbia.

20 During the second week of September,
21 I attended the Election Center Conference in
22 Detroit. Workshop sessions covered election

1 security, the delivery of election mail, and
2 nuances of election administration. I serve on
3 the Ethics and Practice Committee. The committee
4 conducted a workshop to discuss standards of
5 conduct and ethics in elections.

6 On September 26th, the Committee on
7 Executive Administration and Labor of the D.C.
8 Council hosted a roundtable on preparations for
9 the 2024 general election. I presented testimony
10 for the record.

11 The general counsel and I fielded
12 questions regarding election administration,
13 Initiative 83, and partnerships with other
14 agencies. The D.C. Office of Planning was also
15 invited to testify.

16 Voter registration rolls. In
17 September, we registered 6,050 new voters and
18 processed 6,090 registration changes. In total,
19 we prepared 12,140 voter registration cards to be
20 mailed.

21 Additionally, 1,499 registered voters
22 moved out of DC, 622 voters canceled their DC

1 registrations and registered with other
2 jurisdictions, and 2,849 voters registered in DC
3 after canceling their registrations in other
4 states. We currently have 443,335 active
5 registered voters.

6 Online voter registration. We're
7 continuing to register voters using our website
8 portal. To date, we have processed over 75,400
9 applications using the portal. These include new
10 voter registrations and updates to existing
11 registrations.

12 Local Resident Voting Rights Amendment
13 Act. In September, we registered 77 non-citizens
14 to vote in local elections. Total non-citizen
15 registration is 760.

16 2024 Election Cycle. The general
17 election calendar for the 2024 election cycle is
18 posted on our website.

19 The candidate qualifying period for
20 the November 5, 2024, general election ended on
21 August 7th, and we held the ballot lottery on
22 September 13th.

1 Voting Options. As previously stated,
2 the November 5 general election will mirror the
3 primary. All registered DC voters will receive a
4 mail-in ballot. Voters may vote by mail, in
5 person, or by depositing a ballot in a mail
6 ballot dropbox.

7 DCBOE has 55 mail ballot dropboxes
8 that are placed throughout the city. We will
9 also operate 25 early-vote centers and a total of
10 75 Election Day vote centers.

11 The general election landing page has
12 been posted on our website. Voters may check
13 their registration status, use sample ballots,
14 and access the vote center locator tool.

15 Uniformed and Overseas Citizens
16 Absentee Voting Act, or UOCAVA Voters. The Board
17 successfully mailed ballots to individuals
18 eligible to vote under UOCAVA, and ballots were
19 mailed by the September 20 deadline.

20 Public Library Voter Lists. The voter
21 lists have been made available in public
22 libraries, as required. One citywide listing can

1 be found at the main public library, and one
2 ward-specific listing is at each branch library
3 within the respective wards. This was completed
4 on Monday, September 23rd.

5 Key Election Dates. Logic and
6 accuracy testing began on Monday, September 16th.
7 Each piece of voting equipment is tested against
8 the approved ballot, to ensure it produces the
9 correct election results. Voting equipment must
10 pass this process before it is deployed to a vote
11 center. We began mailing ballots on Monday,
12 September 30.

13 Many voters have already received
14 updates from the ballot-tracker system regarding
15 the status of their ballots. Dropboxes are
16 scheduled to open on Friday, October 11th.

17 The deadline to receive voter
18 registration applications online or by mail is
19 October 15. Voters will still have the option to
20 register in person or at our main headquarters.

21 Additionally, individuals may register
22 to vote at vote centers during early voting, or

1 on Election Day. Early voting will take place
2 from October 28th to November 3rd.

3 We encourage all voters to take
4 advantage of this opportunity to vote early and
5 avoid potential lines on Election Day.

6 We are actively meeting with our
7 vendors to prepare for the upcoming general
8 election. We have weekly planning calls
9 scheduled with KNOWiNK, Runbeck, BallotTrax, and
10 Democracy Live.

11 Election Worker Division. The
12 Election Worker Division has experienced
13 increased interest from individuals who want to
14 be election workers.

15 The call center is open and election
16 workers are being scheduled for our remaining
17 training classes.

18 Election worker training began on
19 August 13th. We are ahead of schedule and have
20 already met our goal of training over 2,000
21 election workers.

22 Election Day schedules will be sent on

1 October 11, and the final site coordinator
2 training will be held on Tuesday, October 15.

3 Additionally, we are working with ten
4 organizations that will adopt a vote center on
5 Election Day.

6 Voter Education and Outreach. During
7 the month of September, the Voter Education and
8 Outreach Division conducted 66 outreach events on
9 behalf of the agency.

10 We recognized National Voter
11 Registration Day on September 17 with seven
12 events.

13 September events included attendance
14 at Teen State of Wellness and Well-Being at MLK
15 Library and the H Street Festival.

16 We also had touch points with Howard
17 University, Springfield Baptist Church, Potomac
18 Job Corps Center, and the Girl Scouts.

19 Recall petition of Brianne Nadeau,
20 Ward 1 member of the D.C. Council. The
21 registered proposer did not timely file a
22 petition by October 1 for the recall of Brianne

1 Nadeau, or one member of the D.C. Council.

2 Since the deadline has passed without
3 the petition being filed, this matter is
4 considered closed.

5 And that concludes my report. Thank
6 you.

7 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, thank you
8 so much. Turning to General Counsel's Report
9 with Terri Stroud.

10 MS. STROUD: Good morning, everyone.
11 The only item on my agenda is litigation status.
12 We have nine cases that were active or resolved
13 in the month of September.

14 The first one is Stacia Hall v. D.C.
15 Board of Elections. This is an appeal from the
16 U.S. District Court's denial of a challenge to
17 legislation allowing non-citizens to vote in
18 local elections.

19 There is a briefing scheduled for this
20 matter. The appeal was filed on April 16th. The
21 Solicitor General for the District filed a Notice
22 of Cross-Appeal and the cases have been

1 consolidated.

2 Hall's brief and appendix were filed
3 on August 22nd, the Solicitor General's initial
4 cross-appeal brief is due on October 21st, and
5 Hall's reply cross-appeal response is due
6 December 5th. The Solicitor General's cross-
7 appeal reply is due January 6, 2025.

8 The next matter is Charles Wilson v.
9 Muriel Bowser, et al. That's in the D.C. Court
10 of Appeals.

11 And, excuse me, the first case is in
12 the U.S. Court Appeals for the D.C. Circuit. The
13 Stacia Hall v. the Board.

14 Wilson v. Bowser is in the D.C. Court
15 of Appeals. This is an appeal from a decision by
16 the D.C. Superior Court denying appellant's
17 challenge to initiative measure number 83, for
18 the reason that it was untimely filed. Briefing
19 is complete and oral argument is set for
20 October 23, 2024.

21 The third matter is Dr. Shiva
22 Ayyadurai v. Merrick Garland, et al. This is in

1 the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit.

2 This is an appeal from the U.S.
3 District Court order rejecting a plaintiff's
4 complaint for a declaration that he is eligible
5 to serve as President of the United States,
6 notwithstanding the constitutional natural-born
7 citizens clause or, alternatively, that this
8 qualification matter presents a non-justiciable
9 political issue for the voters.

10 On May 15th, the D.C. Circuit clerk
11 ordered the appellant to file his docketing
12 statement and other initial submissions by
13 June 14th.

14 The Solicitor General for the District
15 and the Department of Justice filed motions for
16 summary affirmance on July 1st and July 12th,
17 respectively. On July 10, 2024, the Solicitor
18 General also filed a cross-appeal.

19 On July 31st, the Court issued an
20 order directing the appellant to address the
21 motions for summary affirmance by August 30th or
22 face dismissal. The Court found that the

1 appellant did not so-file, and on September 19th
2 dismissed his appeal for want of prosecution.

3 Also, on September 19th, the Court
4 ordered the government to address the disposition
5 of the cross-appeal.

6 On September 25th, the appellant filed
7 for reconsideration of the dismissal, in part for
8 the reason that he claims that he did file a
9 timely response.

10 On September 26th, the Solicitor
11 General moved for dismissal without prejudice,
12 and the Solicitor General's response to the
13 Motion for Reconsideration is due on October 7th.

14 The next matter is Long v. The Board
15 of Elections. This is the resubmission of a
16 matter previously dismissed without prejudice.
17 Mr. Long is seeking \$10,000 in damages based on a
18 claim concerning an overdraft cost to his bank
19 account when a stop payment was issued or imposed
20 on a \$500 check issued for his service as an
21 election worker.

22 This case has been on a mediation

1 track since June of 2024. Since that time, the
2 plaintiff has filed three motions for summary
3 judgment, all of which have been denied. A
4 status conference is set for October 25th.

5 And there is currently the potential
6 that the Office from the Attorney General will
7 have to substitute another attorney to represent
8 the Board due to some credentialing issues with
9 the current attorney that's serving, or that's
10 working with the case from the Office of the
11 Attorney General.

12 The next matter is John Page v. Monica
13 Evans. This is in the U.S. Court of Appeals for
14 the D.C. Circuit.

15 On August 7th the Plaintiff appealed
16 the U.S. District Court's order granting the
17 Office of the Attorney General's motion to
18 dismiss his complaint on standing grounds.

19 In the District Court, the plaintiff
20 claimed that the recent Supreme Court decision in
21 Trump v. Anderson, which basically held that
22 states do not have the authority to disqualify

1 federal candidates under Section 3 of the
2 14th Amendment, does not apply to D.C. because
3 that decision pertains to the rights of states
4 under the 14th Amendment, and D.C.'s not a state.

5 Dispositive motions were filed on
6 September 23rd, at which time the Solicitor
7 General for the District moved to affirm the
8 District Court ruling that Page lacked standing.

9 And the next four cases were all the
10 D.C. Court of Appeals and they all involved
11 efforts to gain ballot access in the November
12 2024 general election.

13 The first matter is Deirdre Brown v.
14 the Board. Actually, this case has to do with
15 Initiative Measure Number 83.

16 On August 7th, the petitioner sought
17 review of the Board's certification of Initiative
18 Measure Number 83.

19 On August 14th, the petitioner filed
20 a motion for expedition or stay. On August 30th,
21 the Court denied the request for a stay. And
22 while it did expedite the matter, including by

1 ordering that the Board file the administrative
2 record on September 9th -- and we did so file --
3 the Court declined to resolve the case before the
4 finalization of the ballot.

5 This means that the ballots that are
6 going out will contain Initiative Measure
7 Number 83.

8 On September 12th, the Court ordered
9 that the petitioner's brief be filed in 40 days,
10 or on October 22nd, and that the Board's brief be
11 filed 30 days thereafter.

12 The next few cases involve ballot
13 access matters for nominating candidates who are
14 seeking to be put on the ballot as candidates in
15 the 2024 general election. The first matter is
16 Ashleigh Fields v. the Board.

17 On September 5th, the petitioner
18 sought review of the Board's order denying her
19 ballot access in her bid for the office of
20 advisory neighborhood commission for single-
21 member district 1B07.

22 The Board filed a motion for summary

1 affirmance, the agency record, and a motion to
2 expedite on September 6th. On September 9th and
3 10th, the petitioner filed, respectively, a
4 motion for summary reversal and an opposition to
5 the Board's motion for summary affirmance.

6 On September 11th, the petitioner
7 filed a motion to dismiss her appeal and that
8 motion was granted by the Court that same day,
9 closing the matter.

10 The next matter is Sherice Muhammad v.
11 the Board. On September 9th, the petitioner
12 sought review of the Board's order denying her
13 ballot access in her bid for the Ward 7 seat on
14 the State Board of Education.

15 On September 10th, the Board filed a
16 motion for summary affirmance, the agency record,
17 and a motion to expedite.

18 On September 11th, the petitioner
19 filed an opposition to the Board's motion for
20 summary affirmance, and the Board's motion for
21 summary affirmance was granted on September 12th.

22 The next matter is Kevin Rapp v. the

1 Board. On September 9th, petitioner sought
2 review of the Board's order denying him ballot
3 access in his bid for councilmember-at-large
4 seat.

5 The next day, the petitioner sought a
6 stay of the Board's order and expedited
7 consideration, and the Board filed a motion for
8 summary affirmance, the agency record, and a
9 motion to expedite. The challenger below, Joe
10 Bishop-Henchman, also sought amicus status in the
11 matter.

12 On September 11th, the petitioner
13 filed an opposition to the Board's motion for
14 summary affirmance. On September 12th, the
15 Board's motion for summary affirmance was granted
16 and the petitioner was denied ballot access.

17 And those are all of the matters that
18 are currently, or were, before the Board as of
19 September. And that concludes my litigation
20 status report.

21 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, thank you
22 so much. Everything is going very, very well,

1 with only about a month to go before Election
2 Day.

3 So, once again, thank you to everybody
4 at the BOE for doing everything that you do to
5 keep this ball moving down the field. And, wow,
6 thank you to the over 2,000 election workers who
7 are now teed up and just about ready to fill up
8 early voting centers. So, we'll continue to
9 thank them for their amazing efforts.

10 So, with that, we turn to the Campaign
11 Finance Report. Director Collier Montgomery
12 couldn't make it but we have General Counsel Bill
13 SanFord.

14 MR. SANFORD: Thank you. Good
15 morning, Mr. Chairman and distinguished Board
16 members Greenfield and Boggs.

17 I'm William SanFord, General Counsel
18 for the Office of Campaign Finance. I will
19 provide an abbreviated version of the Director's
20 Report, but the entire report will be published
21 at the OCF website by close of business today.

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: Your mic on?

1 MR. SANFORD: It is.

2 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, okay.

3 MR. SANFORD: The Office of Campaign
4 Finance hosted a debate on September 18, 2024, in
5 the contestant race for the office of at-large
6 member of the Council, which is scheduled for
7 election during the November 5, 2024, general
8 election in the District of Columbia. The debate
9 was moderated by Michael Brice Saddler, a
10 reporter for the Washington Post who covers local
11 District of Columbia affairs and the city's
12 government for the Washington Post metro desk.

13 The participants in the debate
14 included Democratic candidate Robert White,
15 independent candidate Christina Henderson, and
16 Statehood Green Party candidate Darryl Moch. The
17 recording of the OCF-sponsored debate will remain
18 online for viewing throughout the remainder of
19 the calendar year at dcdebates.com.

20 In September 2024, the Office of
21 Campaign Finance actively engaged with community
22 through a series of events to promote its

1 traditional Campaign Finance in Free Elections
2 program.

3 On September 17, 2024, the Office of
4 Campaign Finance held an informational session at
5 the Woodridge Public Library branch.

6 The Office of Campaign Finance
7 participated in two annual Community Day events
8 at the Mount Moriah Baptist Church on
9 September 21st, and Gethsemane Baptist Church on
10 September 28th.

11 Additionally, on September 23, 2024,
12 the Office of Campaign Finance presented at
13 Advisory Neighborhood Commission 3A monthly
14 meeting, focusing on the Fair Elections program
15 in the Fair Elections Division.

16 As of today's date, there are twenty
17 certified participating conduits in the Fair
18 Elections program, and the Office of Campaign
19 Finance has authorized the disbursement in total
20 sum of \$2,777,584.50, from the Fair Elections
21 fund, with base amount and matching fund
22 payments.

1 During the month of September, the
2 Fair Elections Division conducted 22 desk reviews
3 and issued six requests for additional
4 information letters.

5 As of September 30, 2024, the total
6 sum remitted of the Fair Elections Fund is
7 \$871,502.58.

8 In the Public Information and Records
9 Management Division, with regard to initiative
10 committees during the month of September, there
11 were two recorded filers who timely filed their
12 reports on September 10, 2024.

13 In the Reports Analysis and Audit
14 Division during the month of September, that
15 division conducted 108 desk reviews, which
16 included the following: 35 reviews of political
17 action committees were conducted, 45 desk reviews
18 of principal campaign committees were conducted,
19 16 desk reviews of independent expenditure
20 committees were conducted, and nine desk reviews
21 of initiative referenda and recall committees
22 were conducted.

1 During the month of September 2024,
2 the Reports Analysis and Audit Division issued 18
3 audit letters and requests for additional
4 information. They resolved 26 cases and approved
5 four cases determination.

6 Currently, the Reports Analysis and
7 Audit Division has two ongoing audits and they
8 include D.C. Political Action Committee and a
9 Credit Union PAC of Washington, D.C..

10 In the General Counsel's Division
11 during the month of September 2024, the Office of
12 the General Counsel received three referrals and
13 issued one order, in which a fine of \$3,000 was
14 imposed.

15 The fine of \$3,000 was imposed against
16 the Vincent Orange 2020 Principal Campaign
17 Committee.

18 During the month of September, the
19 Office of the General Counsel had one open
20 investigation pending. And that investigation
21 was docket number LCFFI2024-004. It was docketed
22 on the 18th of June, 2024.

1 The complainant was Tommy Wells,
2 Chairman of Neighbors United for Ward 6. The
3 respondents were Committee to Recall Charles
4 Allen, D.C. Neighborhood Alliance, and the D.C.
5 Republican Party.

6 The allegation? Possible improper
7 expenditures and illegal coordination. And the
8 current status is the investigation has been
9 completed. The orders are pending, because at
10 least two orders will be issued as a result of
11 this investigation.

12 During the month of September 2024,
13 there were no requests for interpretive opinions,
14 and no show-cause proceedings were conducted.

15 And that should conclude my report,
16 contents of my report, and the Director's Report
17 will be posted at the Office of Campaign Finance
18 website by close of business on today's date, the
19 2nd of October, 2024.

20 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, thank you
21 so much, Counsel SanFord. Appreciate that.
22 Before we jump into public comment, I just wanted

1 to note for the record that the next time we meet
2 will probably be Monday, December 2nd. That will
3 be the morning where we certify election results
4 after having waited the necessary amount of time,
5 et cetera.

6 We are probably not going to meet
7 before then, skipping our regular November
8 monthly meeting, which would otherwise fall on
9 the morning of Wednesday, November 6th, the
10 morning after the election. We'll probably be,
11 hopefully, asleep at that time. Might be a late
12 night.

13 But we will certainly have a meeting
14 if we need to. If there's any particular reason
15 or special reason to come together and have a
16 Board meeting, as always, we'll assemble for that
17 purpose. But, otherwise, we'll next meet Monday,
18 December 2nd.

19 So, with that, ready for public
20 comment. I see we've got 25 people here by Zoom.
21 So, if you just raise your Zoom hand, try to
22 limit your comment to three minutes, please. And

1 get all your comments in, in one comment period
2 up to three minutes, and then we'll respond if
3 needed.

4 And I see James Harnett raising his
5 hand. So, we'll call on James. Welcome back to
6 the BOE.

7 MR. HARNETT: Thank you. And sorry,
8 I don't think the hand-raise button is available
9 for us lowly participants.

10 Thank you, everybody. Good morning.
11 My name is James Harnett and I'm a Ward 2
12 resident. I live at 2221 I Street, NW, Unit 321,
13 Washington, D.C. 20037.

14 I would like to bring to the Board's
15 attention that the District of Columbia is not
16 currently in compliance with an important
17 component of federal election laws.
18 Specifically, Title II, U.S. Code, Chapter 1,
19 Section 8, Part B, which is titled, Special Rules
20 and Extraordinary Circumstances.

21 Part A of this statute states that the
22 laws of the several states and territories may

1 set out the timeline for how vacancies in the
2 House of Representatives may be filled.

3 Part B is an exception to that
4 requirement, which states, and quote, a special
5 election shall take place not later than 49 days
6 after the Speaker of the House of Representatives
7 announces that the vacancies in the
8 representation from the states in the House
9 exceed 100.

10 The statute further states that the
11 timing of this requirement applies to the
12 District of Columbia.

13 This law was passed in 2005 to aid in
14 the timely reconstituting of the House of
15 Representatives in the event of a catastrophic
16 attack against the U.S. Government.

17 That fear came frighteningly close to
18 reality four years ago, as we all watched a
19 violent mob, seeking to overthrow our government,
20 descend on the Capitol to stop the counting of
21 the votes, and we now know, in an attempt to kill
22 the Vice-President.

1 Last month the Government
2 Accountability Office polled 50 state election
3 officials about their knowledge of this
4 requirement.

5 More than half of the election
6 officials who responded were unaware this federal
7 requirement existed. And many expressed concern
8 that they lacked legal authority from their state
9 to comply with this federal law.

10 The D.C. Board of Elections was not
11 contacted as part of that survey.

12 The Board must take this opportunity
13 to bring our special election regulations --
14 specifically, Title III, DCMR, Section 910.1 and
15 910.3, into compliance with federal law.

16 The Council must also update their
17 companion statute that prescribes a minimum of
18 70 days to establish a special election after a
19 vacancy is certified.

20 This Board should immediately issue a
21 proposed rule that would rectify this oversight
22 and help protect our government and the

1 District's representation in Congress, in the
2 event of a catastrophic attack on the U.S.
3 government, which robs the residents of the
4 District of Columbia of their delegate and voice
5 in Congress.

6 Thank you, and I welcome any
7 questions.

8 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, thank you
9 so much for your comment. Yeah, I saw the GAO
10 report and looks like a whole lot of states,
11 maybe all of them, didn't pick up on this
12 particular detail.

13 And it's certainly something that our
14 D.C. Council would have to change, so that we in
15 turn could alter our regulations. But we really
16 appreciate you alerting us to this issue, and
17 defer to our General Counsel for any other
18 comment.

19 MS. STROUD: Yes. James, thank you
20 for bringing this to the attention. We did get
21 notice of the GAO report. And of course, if such
22 a circumstance arose, we would comply with the

1 federal statute, which is supreme over all laws.

2 The Section 5-A14 of the statute
3 indicates that our regulations derive from the
4 statute, the election statute. And so, any
5 regulations would have to be consistent with
6 that.

7 So, I think that the first step that
8 could be taken -- and I'm not even sure it'd be
9 necessary for anybody to do anything in the way
10 of, like, legislative amendment or rulemaking in
11 such an event, because clearly, the federal law
12 would trump our regulations and the election
13 statute.

14 But I know that you brought this to
15 the attention of the Council. And so, if they
16 deem it necessary to amend the relevant portion
17 of the statute, which I think is 10D2, then we
18 would, of course, conform our regulations with
19 that.

20 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Yeah,
21 thanks again. Yeah, I understand the Council's
22 aware and may be considering legislation in this

1 regard.

2 And makes me wonder what else is out
3 there in the fine details of federal statutes
4 that legislative bodies haven't picked up on yet.
5 But thank you so much.

6 All right, any other public comment
7 out there? If the hand-raise function of Zoom
8 isn't working for you, you can just go into chat
9 and let us know, or turn on your video and wave
10 your hands around.

11 We're looking through the screen to
12 see if anybody is signaling us. Doesn't look
13 like it.

14 But just in case there's a technical
15 issue, we'll wait a minute here. You could just
16 use the chat or turn on your video and let us
17 know.

18 All right, thank you so much,
19 everybody. Everybody have a great rest of your
20 week and great October.

21 We're doing great here at the BOE and
22 the Office of Campaign Finance. And we'll

1 continue to work hard and around the clock to
2 make sure we have a safe and fair election on
3 November 5th. With that, I'd move that we
4 adjourn.

5 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

6 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor?
