3	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Let me call the
4	meeting to order. This a Special Meeting of the
5	D.C. Board of Elections. Actually we had
6	intended just to deal with one matter. That's
7	the hearing regarding the Jack Evans recall that
8	was filed by Mr. Eidinger. But we actually have
9	one other item we need to deal with before that,
10	and that's to approve as final the regulations
11	for the Fair Elections Program.
12	And so what I'm going to do first,
13	other than call the meeting to order and go
14	through the agenda, I want to introduce who's
15	here.
16	To the far right, Ms. Cecily
17	Montgomery.
18	MS. MONTGOMERY: Good morning.
19	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Director of the
20	Office of Campaign Finance.
21	To my right is Mr. Ken McGhie. Your
22	last name's not Montgomery. Ken McGhie, the
_	

1	general counsel to the Board of Elections.
2	To my left is Board Member Dionna
3	Lewis.
4	MEMBER LEWIS: Good morning.
5	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: And to her left is
6	Executive Director of the Board of Elections, Ms.
7	Alice Miller.
8	We're waiting on another Board Member,
9	Mr. Michael Gill. We will we don't need him
10	to get through the final rulemaking for the Fair
11	Elections Program, so we're going to go ahead and
12	do that. And then when he gets here, we'll start
13	the hearing regarding the recall of Jack Evans
14	filed by Mr. Eidinger.
15	So, anyway, first thing I'd like to do
16	is open the meeting up and get adoption of the
17	agenda.
18	Ms. Lewis.
19	MEMBER LEWIS: So moved.
20	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: It's properly been
21	moved, and I second. And it is unanimously
22	approved with the two of us here as a quorum.

The next thing I want to do is to open
 up and address the matter around final rulemaking
 for the regulations for the Fair Elections
 Program.

5 I want to just explain very quickly 6 that we are going to adopt as final rules the regulations that were issued in March for public 7 8 review in the D.C. Register and that came back --9 got through the 30-day period in April. We will do additional modifications to those regulations 10 11 based on legislation, emergency legislation that 12 the Council passed but the Mayor has not signed 13 as of yet, that should be signed prior to May 14 29th.

We will modify the final regulations that we approve today on May 29th at our regular board meeting based on that emergency legislation. We're not able to address that today because those legislative changes to the Fair Elections Program have not been finally approved yet.

So what I'd like to do is to turn it

over to Mr. McGhie, and we'll start the process 1 2 of Final Rulemaking. Okay. The first thing on 3 MR. McGHIE: the agenda is Final Rulemaking to Title 3, DCMR. 4 5 It's Chapter 3, Advisory Opinions of the Board; Chapter 37, Investigations and Hearings; Chapter 6 7 42, The Fair Elections Program; and Chapter 43, 8 The Verification Process. 9 These are all Office of Campaign Finance Regulations, so I will defer to the 10 11 general counsel for the Office of Campaign 12 Finance to explain what these regulations entail. 13 MR. SANFORD: Good morning, Mr. 14 Chairman and distinguished Board Member Lewis. My name is William SanFord, general counsel for 15 16 the Office of Campaign Finance. As the general counsel for the Board of Elections indicated, we 17 18 are requesting final approval of the final 19 rulemaking of Chapters 30, Chapter 34, Chapter 20 37, and Chapter 99. 21 Chapter 30 includes the organizational 22 requirements for the Fair Election Program.

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1	Chapter 34 implements an audit and
2	bookkeeping and record keeping requirement for
3	the Fair Election Program.
4	Chapter 37 includes the investigative
5	and hearings and penalties provisions that affect
6	the Fair Elections Program.
7	And Chapter 99 includes the
8	definitions which will be expanded under the Fair
9	Elections Program.
10	As the Chairman of the Board has
11	indicated, these regulations were published in
12	the D.C. Register in April, and they were
13	finalized after 30 days. And so on today's date,
14	we'd ask the Board to approve final rulemaking.
15	MR. McGHIE: Okay. At this point I
16	would ask the Board to entertain a motion to
17	approve the as final rulemaking the
18	regulations of as outlined by the Mr. SanFord.
19	MEMBER LEWIS: So moved.
20	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: It's been properly
21	moved, and I second that.
22	MS. BRIZILL: Mr. Chairman, can

1	someone from the public make a comment about what
2	Mr the legal counsel for the Office of
3	Campaign Finance has just said? Because this is
4	not in the agenda.
5	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: It is on the agenda
6	today, Ms
7	MS. BRIZILL: This is not on the
8	printed agenda that the citizens were given when
9	they came in. It says Rulemaking regarding
10	Chapter 37, 42, and 43. And the general counsel
11	for the Office of Campaign Finance indicated that
12	it's Rulemaking for Sections 30, 34, 37, and 99.
13	That is not what is on the public notice.
14	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Mr. SanFord?
15	MR. SANFORD: The Chairman indicated
16	I mean initially the Chapters that are noted
17	on the agenda were supposed to be part of this
18	hearing. But as the Chairman indicated, that has
19	not been signed by the that legislation has
20	not been signed by the Mayor so that has not been
21	offered today for final rulemaking for approval.
22	So we are requesting approval of the

1	chapters that have been published in the D.C.
2	Register for the notice and comment period that
3	was that expired in April of this year.
4	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Brizill, would
5	you properly identify yourself for the record.
6	MS. BRIZILL: My name is Dorothy
7	Brizill. I'm Executive Director of D.C. Watch;
8	our address is 1327 Girard Street, Northwest.
9	Mr. Chairman, let me put on the record
10	a concern I have. Number one, the five items you
11	have on today's agenda are not the items that are
12	on the website for the Board of Elections hearing
13	today.
14	But, in addition, when we arrived at
15	this meeting today, the printed agendas were on
16	the table. And item 2 on that agenda says Final
17	Rulemaking, Title 3, D.C. Municipal Regulations,
18	Chapter 3, Chapter 37, 42, and 43.
19	What we've just heard is you want to
20	adopt Final Rulemaking for Chapter 30, 34, 37 and
21	99. So I'm voicing a concern regarding the fact
22	that if you're going to add four additional items

1 to the agenda for today other than the recall, 2 they were not posted on the D.C. -- on the Board of Elections website in a timely matter. 3 4 Moreover, you're changing the agenda 5 as we sit here versus the agenda that we were given when we came into the room. This is --6 this is not the way this is supposed to go. 7 This 8 is not acceptable, and I don't think this is 9 legal. It is legal. 10 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank 11 you for your comment, Ms. Brizill. 12 MS. BRIZILL: Why do you think it's 13 legal? Why do you think it's legal? 14 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Because we have the authority to do so. 15 16 Do you have any other comments, Ms. 17 Brizill? 18 MS. BRIZILL: Why do you have the 19 authority? The open governments law requires you 20 to give the public notice. You give the public 21 notice by publishing on your website and by putting the agenda here. None of those documents 22

coincide with what you're about to do. So why is 1 2 it legal? Ms. Brizill, I 3 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: don't intend to have a --4 5 MS. BRIZILL: I just would like a 6 civil explanation, not just for a ruling from the 7 Chair saying that it's legal. 8 The agenda can be CHAIRMAN BENNETT: 9 amended at any time, Ms. Brizill. Is there something else that you want 10 to -- that you want to tell us? If you'd like to 11 12 come and address those issues with the other 13 changes we're going to make to the regs on the 14 29th, we would love to see you. MS. BRIZILL: No. Mr. Chairman, you 15 16 know repeatedly for the past several months I 17 have been raising concerns about what's not on 18 your website, and you have dismissed it. 19 Now it's not only not on your website 20 -- if you look at the homepage of your website it 21 says special meeting, it doesn't say all these other -- and if it's going to be regular board 22

meeting.

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2 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: This is not a regular board meeting. It is a special meeting. 3 MS. BRIZILL: Why do you think this is 4 5 legal given D.C. law on the subject matter in terms of you have to publish --6 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: The agenda can be 7 8 changed at any time, Ms. Brizill. 9 MS. BRIZILL: Can I have a ruling from 10 the legal counsel? Where does it say the agenda 11 can be changed --12 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Brizill, you're 13 not going to hijack this meeting. 14 MS. BRIZILL: I'm not hijacking. I'm 15 asking a simple question. I would like an answer 16 to it. 17 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Brizill, do you 18 have any other comments? 19 MS. BRIZILL: Why did you decide to 20 change the agenda from a special board meeting to 21 a regular board meeting -- putting five things on 22 the agenda?

1	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Brizill, you
2	are not going to hijack this meeting. I
3	explained what we were doing in the beginning.
4	I'm sorry that is not something that meets your
5	requirements. That's what we're going to do.
6	We're going to proceed.
7	MS. BRIZILL: It's not meeting my
8	requirements, not making the legal requirements.
9	It's not meeting the legal requirements.
10	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Brizill, we're
11	done. Do you have anything else to say?
12	MS. BRIZILL: I would like a ruling
13	from the
14	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: You're not going to
15	get a ruling.
16	MS. BRIZILL: I don't want a ruling.
17	I want his comment because his office is
18	responsible in a large part for putting up the
19	agenda. How are citizens supposed to know
20	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Brizill, you
21	have got to stop doing this. He can I'm happy
22	to allow him to respond to you

1	MS. BRIZILL: Cite me a section of the
2	code
3	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: I am happy to allow
4	you
5	MS. BRIZILL: on the regulations
6	governing the Board of Elections that say that
7	you can willy-nilly change your agenda. Cite me
8	a section.
9	MEMBER LEWIS: Ms. Brizill, we do
10	appreciate your concern and your activism, but we
11	have to have and maintain a decorum in our
12	meetings. And so if you wouldn't mind letting
13	the Chairman speak, and then he'd let you speak,
14	it would be a better and more efficient dialogue
15	if we could have just that decorum and the
16	respect present here today for the meeting.
17	MS. BRIZILL: I appreciate your
18	comment, Ms. Lewis. But I also want respect and
19	decorum. Okay. You have a room full of people
20	who came down here not knowing half of these
21	items were on the agenda. You have people who
22	come to the meetings, who don't come to the

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1 meetings, who try to follow what the Board of 2 Elections is doing, to be checking the Board website on a regular basis as regards to the 3 agenda for the meetings, and then to find out 4 5 that you have changed it this morning, but then 6 you change it again in the course of the meeting. CHAIRMAN BENNETT: 7 Ms. Brizill, what 8 we'll do is we'll table the matter just to check 9 the citations that you indicate that were not proper, and we'll bring it up right after the 10 11 hearing again. 12 So thank you for your -- thank you for 13 pointing that out. 14 All right. Thank you, Mr. SanFord. 15 Let's check the citations, and we'll 16 table it and bring it up for a vote after the 17 hearing. 18 Has Mr. Gill gotten here yet? 19 We're going to -- if the 20 representative for Mr. Evans and the 21 representative for Mr. Eidinger, who's here, if 22 you guys could get set up. We're going to

1	adjourn the meeting for a few minutes until Board
2	member Michael Gill can find his way upstairs and
3	get into the room. Okay?
4	We'll reconvene in about five or ten
5	minutes. Thank you.
6	(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter
7	went off the record at 12:00 p.m. and resumed at
8	12:07 p.m.)
9	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: We are back, and we
10	are officially reconvened. I want to introduce
11	to the right of Mr. McGhie is Mr. Michael Gill,
12	Board Member.
13	Prior to moving to the hearing we will
14	conclude the issue around for the rulemaking. To
15	your credit, Ms. Brizill, we were actually wrong
16	in terms of the citations. Thank you for
17	pointing that out. There were two public filings
18	with regard to rulemaking. So we will address
19	that after we have a hearing with regards to
20	that. Okay?
21	Mr. McGhie.
22	MR. McGHIE: Okay. The next matter on

1 the agenda is a challenge to the eligibility of 2 Adam Eidinger who filed as proposer of a recall measure of Jack Evans of Ward 2. 3 4 Before I outline the procedures, can 5 I have the parties identify themselves beginning with Mr. Eidinger? 6 7 MR. EIDINGER: Hi. Adam Eidinger, 8 2448 Massachusetts Avenue NW, Washington, D.C., 9 I am the proposer. 20008. MR. McGHIE: And is that counsel next 10 11 to you? 12 MR. EIDINGER: No. 13 MR. NORMAN: I'm just here to consult. 14 MR. McGHIE: So could you please state 15 your name and address? 16 MR. NORMAN: Tony Norman, 533 Gresham 17 Place. 18 MR. McGHIE: Is that Northeast, 19 Northwest --20 MR. NORMAN: Northwest. 21 MR. McGHIE: Okay. Great. Thank you. And are you an attorney or just --22

1	MR. NORMAN: I'm an attorney, but I'm
2	not representing Mr. Eidinger here today.
3	MR. EIDINGER: He is consulting me on
4	process and procedure but not speaking on my
5	behalf. I'm speaking on my own behalf.
6	MR. McGHIE: Okay. Great. Mr. Dinan?
7	MR. DINAN: Donald Dinan, and I
8	represent the respondent, Councilmember Jack
9	Evans.
10	MR. McGHIE: Okay. So procedurally,
11	this is how we're going to do it.
12	Mr. Evans, this is a challenge by Mr.
13	Evans to your qualifications, so they will have
14	the burden of proof. So they will have, what I
15	call, two bites of the apple.
16	MEMBER GILL: It's a challenge to
17	Eidinger's
18	MR. McGHIE: Eidinger's
19	qualifications. So they'll have two bites of the
20	apple. So what we'll do is first the challenger
21	will have 15 minutes to present their case in
22	chief, followed by you having 15 minutes to

present your case, and then they will have 5
 minutes in rebuttal.

What we will do additionally, though, is that we will it open it up for any public comments that want to be heard. Anybody that wants to be heard, either for or against the measure, will be given time to present any comments.

9 And then we'll end it with closing
10 arguments. Each party will be given two minutes
11 for closing arguments.

12 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Can we see how many 13 people we have that would like to speak either on 14 behalf of the proponent or the opponent? Would you raise your hand so I can get a count? 15 One, two, okay. 16 Three. Four. Okay. 17 When we open it up to additional comments, we 18 will limit that to two minutes, okay. So please

20 MR. McGHIE: Okay. So Ms. Christensen 21 is behind me, and she will be holding up your 22 time. So she'll let you know when there's ten

gather your thoughts and be succinct.

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1 minutes left, five minutes left, and one minute 2 left. We're going to try to strictly follow the time limits. 3 4 So does anybody have any questions? 5 You have no questions. No? No questions. 6 MR. DINAN: 7 MR. McGHIE: Mr. Dinan, you may 8 proceed. 9 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: What we'll do --10 I'm sorry. Just from a procedural standpoint. 11 Once we finish, the Board will convene 12 and try to make a determination today prior to 13 your leaving. And if we're not able to do that, 14 then we'll let you know when we will have a 15 decision. But we'll certainly try to do that 16 today. Okay? 17 MR. DINAN: Thank you very much, Mr. 18 Chairman, Members of the Board. My name is 19 Donald Dinan, and I represent Councilmember Jack Evans in this matter. 20 21 First, and I will not use my time to 22 reiterate the procedural history of this case,

which the Board well knows, which has been set 1 2 forth, but we would take this opportunity to, as we did in our brief, incorporate by reference the 3 transcripts of the April 3rd hearing, previous 4 petition, both those of Mr. Eidinger and myself. 5 As Mr. McGhie has just pointed out, 6 7 the legal standard that's in front of us, as set 8 forth in D.C. Code Section 1.1001.17, is that a 9 request for petitions must be filed by a Ward 2 elector, that is a Ward 2 registered voter. 10 11 At the pretrial -- not pretrial, pre-12 hearing conference held within this case on May 13 3rd, Mr. Eidinger produced for the first time a 14 driver's license where he was registered at 2448 15 From the face of this Massachusetts Avenue. 16 driver's license, he obtained it after the April 17 3rd hearing, but before he refiled his petition 18 on April 12th. 19 Therefore, he got his driver's license 20 after the first rejection but soon thereafter he 21 did change it and then almost immediately filed this recall. 22

1	At the pre-hearing conference we were
2	informed by the Board of Elections that the
3	obtaining of this driver's license lifted the, in
4	quotes, flag on his voter registration that we
5	had pointed out previously, that in order for the
6	registration to become final he had to show a
7	proof of address.
8	It is submitted that having a D.C.
9	driver's license does not prove, per se, that one
10	is a bona fide resident. As the ground rules of
11	this hearing have set, it may create a prima
12	facie case rebuttable presumption, thus shifting
13	the burden of proof to the opposer.
14	But that it does not, in and of
15	itself, it's not an irrebuttable presumption.
16	And, in fact, particularly in the light of facts
17	and history of this case in determining whether
18	Mr. Eidinger is a bona fide resident of Ward 2,
19	a real resident, that all the facts and documents
20	in this case have to be taken in their totality.
21	No one piece of evidence proves anything. It
22	must be weight must be given to the totality

1 of the facts.

2	And in the totality of the facts, you
3	know, I'm going to come back to vehicle
4	registration, Mr. Eidinger's two vehicles are
5	registered at Mintwood Place. I'll return to
6	that soon.
7	His mobile phone numbers are
8	registered to the Mintwood Place. He has filed
9	no forwarding address with the United States
10	Postal Service of moving his address to 2448
11	Massachusetts Avenue. We reference our
12	opposition at 4.
13	According to the IRS records, his
14	address, his tax address, residency is still at
15	Mintwood Place. And on August 15th of this year,
16	Mr. Eidinger was under the requirement to make an
17	IRS filing, which presumed he did. So in
18	other words, he told the IRS on April 15th, three
19	days after he filed the renewed request for
20	petitions under oath that he lives on Mintwood
21	Place.
22	And then there's the issue of him

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filing with OCF that his address, when he made the donation to Elissa Silverman, that he lived at Mintwood Place. That also -- this is for the past election. That also is in our opposition at 4.

Now returning to the issue of the 6 driver's -- of the vehicle registration, Mr. 7 8 Eidinger today has produced a registration for 9 one of his vehicles, Chevrolet, for 2448 Massachusetts Avenue. 10 That was on May 5th. 11 Excuse me, May 11th that he got that. That was after it was pointed out on May 3rd at the pre-12 hearing conference that his vehicles were still 13 14 registered at Mintwood Place.

What this evidence is showing is that in -- taken in its totality, Mr. Eidinger has used a friend's address where he is allegedly illegally operating a business. That's because he has employees and clients come there, and this is the reason he had utility bills at that address.

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It appears that Mr. Eidinger used a

completely coincidental fact, coincidentally that he operated a business in Ward 2 in a friend's house, and he is using that to now claim that on -- that he lives there, and he's doing that for the sole purpose of trying to recall Jack Evans.

6 While at the same time, and this was 7 published by the Baltimore Sun on April 10th, he 8 has announced his intention to move, not only 9 move out of Ward 2, but to move out of the 10 District of Columbia, back to the State of 11 Maryland where he can continue his battles 12 against Congressman Andy Harris.

13 One looks, and today Mr. Eidinger 14 produced some new documents, but in the utility 15 bills that he produced at the last hearing on 16 April 3rd, this is Exhibit 1 in our supplement, on the face of them, the utility bills and the 17 18 license bills predate any time that he claims he 19 lived at Massachusetts Avenue. The WASA bill 20 dates back to at least March 2018, and the 21 business tax, DCRA records show that that was issued in April 2016. 22

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1	Today Mr. Eidinger produces some new
2	documents, including one, two PEPCO bills, one
3	from March and April. And this is not surprising
4	because he's been conducting a business there
5	since at least April 2016.
6	Again, the coincidence, the address of
7	convenience for the sole purpose of claiming to
8	have a residence there to get the recall
9	petitions and then leave town. Well, the and
10	that addresses those new documents.
11	As we there is a pattern of conduct
12	here, Mr. Eidinger and his addresses of
13	convenience, all of which are on the record. You
14	have Salisbury, Maryland so he can fight Andy
15	Harris; Massachusetts Avenue so he can recall
16	Jack Evans; Mintwood Place, which he has owned
17	and lived in since 1999.
18	The purpose of the recall statute, the
19	purpose of the law, if one does a close reading;
20	two Title 1 Section 1001.17. That the purpose
21	cannot be that one can move into Ward 2, use an
22	address of convenience that is enabled only by

blind coincidence; two, go get a driver's 1 2 license, which he could, because even under the new DHS regulations, we have to show enhanced 3 documentation. He had the utility bills because 4 5 he had them for the business. And then less than one week later, four, request petitions to 6 7 recall. 8 And while he's doing all this, 9 announced to the press, as published in the Baltimore Sun, republished in the Washington 10 Post, he's leaving town as soon as this is done. 11 12 And as we have cited, statutes -agencies in the District of Columbia have an 13 14 inherent right of discretion. We cite People's Counsel v. The Public Service Commission 474 A.2d 15 16 1274, D.C. 1984. Where at page 1279 the Court of 17 Appeals says it is -- which it inherently does, 18 this is agencies, referring to agencies' 19 discretion, when statute entrusts a decision at 20 agency discretion.

In quotes, it implicitly withholds
some measure of the reviewing court's authority

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to set aside that agency decision.

2	Put it another way, to the extent that
3	the decision is committed to an agency's
4	discretion, the reviewing court cannot replace
5	the agency's judgment with its own. And
6	supported by the 4th Circuit case, Laytel v.
7	Morton 445 F.2d, 1207, 4th Circuit, 1971.
8	So we have this fact pattern. The
9	Board has discretion, and in the interests of
10	time, is that we provided a time line of the
11	possibilities of the inherent chaos that this
12	could create, this being granting Mr. Eidinger's
13	petition, and we did set forth that the Board in
14	the exercise of its discretion has to look at the
15	maximum times. They can't look that he's going
16	to get the petitions in 30 days or 60 days,
17	whatever.
18	And this chaos, and it's really
19	regardless of the actual times, is we're going to
20	have in Ward 2 three elections within about a
21	five to six-month period. Maybe even shorter.
22	And, indeed, the specter that the recall election

will be just before the primary election. The primary election, currently scheduled for June 16th, whoever wins that is going to be the overwhelming presumptive winner in the general election. The Democratic candidate can't really lose.

7 If the Board discresses to follow the 8 request of Petitioner, three elections in a four 9 or five-month period, the voters are going to be completely confused. They could be voting after 10 11 they voted in the primary for the person they 12 And let's, for the sake of argument say it want. 13 is Jack Evans, and then they're going to be asked 14 afterwards to vote in a special election to fill 15 a vacancy.

And, of course, if it's not Jack Evans on June 16th then the matter's over. Whoever wins that election will become the Ward 2 candidate. And all of this is going to be at the cost of hundreds of thousands of dollars to the taxpayers in the District of Columbia.

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We would submit that under this fact

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1	questions in this time. Just to make sure we
2	have all the documents that you referenced in
3	your presentation just now. We have his driver's
4	license.
5	Now I know you mentioned he had
6	another vehicle, another vehicle that's
7	registered?
8	MR. DINAN: Yes, in our opposition
9	supported by cite to DMV records, both his
10	vehicles were registered at Mintwood Place, which
11	was the status of things up to May 3rd.
12	Today Mr. Eidinger has produced a
13	statement with some exhibits, I presume, either
14	they're in the record or he's going to put them
15	in, but in that he shows that after the hearing
16	on May 3rd, where the pre-hearing conference,
17	where it was pointed out his cars were still all
18	registered at Mintwood Place, he runs down to
19	DMV, and he changes the address. And he did that
20	apparently on May 11th.
21	And this falls into our argument of
22	the address of convenience. Every time it's

1 pointed out that he hasn't done something, he 2 runs down and does it. Okay. I just want to 3 MR. McGHIE: 4 make sure I have track on everything that you 5 just mentioned. So we've got the two vehicles, we have the cell phone bill that says Mintwood, 6 7 the tax address, tax information that he's using, 8 you know, he filed on April 15th. That's 9 Mintwood also? 10 MR. DINAN: Yes. 11 MR. McGHIE: Yes. And the OCF 12 donation to -- I forgot which Councilmember he donated to. 13 14 MR. DINAN: Ms. Silverman. 15 Elissa Silverman, that MR. McGHIE: 16 also indicates a Mintwood address. 17 MR. DINAN: Yes. And that's in the 18 record. 19 There's a PEPCO bills you MR. McGHIE: 20 That has Massachusetts Avenue. say. 21 MR. DINAN: That has Massachusetts 22 address, but they predate any time -- those

1 accounts predate any time that he's ever claimed 2 he lived there. 3 MR. McGHIE: Okay. MR. DINAN: And he has admitted he's 4 5 run the business there, and we concede to that. MR. McGHIE: All right. Do we have 6 7 anything else, Ms. Lewis? 8 Mr. Dinan, when MEMBER LEWIS: Yes. 9 you were -- Mr. Dinan, when you're referencing the renewal, are you referring to this exhibit? 10 This is Eidinger's packet, the registration for 11 12 residential parking renewal notice? What are you 13 referring to? 14 MR. DINAN: Yes, I'm -- he just produced this today. 15 16 MEMBER LEWIS: Oh, I see. 17 MR. DINAN: Yeah. 18 MEMBER LEWIS: Okay. All right. Is 19 it --20 MR. DINAN: And that's what I'm 21 referencing. 22 MEMBER LEWIS: Is it that you're

saying he went down there on May 11th and did 1 2 renewal? Well, that's what it says. 3 MR. DINAN: 4 MEMBER LEWIS: I think it says it 5 expires on May 11th. But there -- well, it does 6 MR. DINAN: 7 say that, but it's the time that he would have 8 had to renew it. 9 MEMBER LEWIS: Okav. MR. DINAN: And because of the time 10 11 that -- in reading this, he either got a one year 12 or a two year registration, which means he either got on May 11, 2017 or May 11th, 2018. 13 Okay. 14 Both those times predate the time that -- any 15 time he claims he lives on Massachusetts Avenue. 16 It appears from this document that one 17 of the vehicles it was going to run out on May 18 11th, 2019, so -- but this is after it was 19 pointed out that that vehicle was still 20 registered at Mintwood Place on May 3rd, 2019. 21 MEMBER LEWIS: In which document? Are you still referencing the same renewal document 22

1 when you're saying that, or are you now 2 referencing one of the Allstate or insurance --No, this is the same 3 MR. DINAN: 4 registration and RPP. 5 Okay. And where are MEMBER LEWIS: you seeing that something was running out? 6 Ι 7 just want to make sure I'm following you. MR. DINAN: Well, it says it's going 8 9 to expire on May 11th, 2019. 10 MEMBER LEWIS: Okav. 11 MR. DINAN: So what I'm saying is 12 after the pre-hearing conference on May 3rd, where it's pointed out both vehicles are still at 13 14 Mintwood Place, again another coincidence, one of them is going to expire, well he runs down after 15 16 the hearing and he has to renew his registration, well he renews it at Massachusetts Avenue. 17 18 MEMBER LEWIS: Do you have some 19 documentation supporting that? I'm just trying 20 to make sure I'm following --21 MR. DINAN: What he did --MEMBER GILL: We don't seem to have 22

anything that shows that he had vehicles 1 2 registered at Mintwood. You're saying he did. I think that's what Dionna is getting at is just 3 4 where does it show they were registered at 5 Mintwood? This to me just looks like he pulled 6 a renewal notice that was coming and it shows 7 8 Massachusetts. So he obviously had a car 9 registered at some point in the last year Massachusetts. But you're saying Mintwood. 10 So 11 I just -- I think that's what Dionna is saying is 12 that you have some evidence that there was a car 13 registered at Mintwood. 14 MR. DINAN: That evidence came from an 15 online search of DMV records. 16 MEMBER LEWIS: Do you have copies of those online searches? 17 18 MR. DINAN: We do have the 19 investigator's printouts. 20 MEMBER LEWIS: Can we see those? I -- I don't believe -- we 21 MR. DINAN: did not put them in the record. I don't believe 22

we have them here today. I mean we could 1 2 supplement the record if you want. But I would again emphasize the date that he had to have 3 gotten this registration is before any date that 4 5 he claims he lived there. And then I quess 6 MEMBER LEWIS: 7 another question I have, could you just explain 8 the relevance in your perspective of the time 9 line that you offered in the appendix? 10 MR. DINAN: It was just to show my 11 example of what maybe could be called the worst 12 case scenario, but to show by example that no 13 matter how soon they realistically get the 14 petitions in, that it's going to cause this Board to potentially have three elections in a very --15 16 (Simultaneous speaking.) 17 MEMBER LEWIS: So you're just making 18 a projection? 19 MR. DINAN: Which in the brief I said 20 in the most optimistic in a five to six-month 21 period. 22 MEMBER LEWIS: I see. Okay. I see.

1 You're just making a projection. This isn't 2 necessarily a --MR. DINAN: No. On the one side we 3 4 sort of gave what it's probably going to be; then 5 we showed a worst case scenario. MEMBER LEWIS: I don't think I have 6 7 any further questions. 8 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Mr. Gill. 9 MEMBER GILL: No, I just -- just so 10 your point is that regardless -- I get you on two 11 separate points here. You're trying to make the 12 one point that he had cars registered at Mintwood Place, but the only thing in the record just 13 shows that he has a renewal for Massachusetts 14 15 Avenue. 16 Your point is he didn't previously claim to live at Massachusetts Avenue when he had 17 18 his car registered there. And so we're just 19 trying to get --20 MR. DINAN: Okay. Yes --21 MEMBER GILL: I think I got it. 22 It's a subpoint to MR. DINAN: Okay.

the fact that he keeps changing the documents as 1 2 this case has gone on. But we have -- our main point is, is that just having the driver's 3 license and I would even say moving the 4 5 registration ex post facto, you still have to take the totality of all the documents in 6 7 evidence, which are the documents that Mr. McGhie 8 summed up to be that we've stated, the IRS, the 9 mobile phones, the other car's still registered there, and the like. 10 11 And that's our argument, when you take 12 together the totality of the evidence and how it 13 keeps changing, you know, renewing things, that he's not a bona fide resident. I think it's 14 15 clear by overwhelming preponderance of the 16 evidence is that --17 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Mr. Dinan, I'm 18 going to stop you. You're kind of getting into 19 rebuttal. 20 You have another question? 21 MEMBER LEWIS: Yeah, I do. I'm sorry. You mentioned this friend. How or who's the 22

1 friend and how do you identify the friend that 2 lives at this other alternative address? And do you have any documentation supporting that? 3 4 MR. DINAN: Well, on the -- again, in 5 public records it shows who lives there. And I 6 believe Mr. Eidinger's going to address this, but 7 it's one of his business associates who we 8 believe is a Mr. Nikolas Schiller. 9 MEMBER LEWIS: Can you spell that name 10 for us? 11 Nikolas is spelled with a MR. DINAN: 12 K, N-I-K-O-L-A-S. And Schiller is S-C-H-I-L-E 13 R. 14 But the presumption, that's who we 15 believe it is. Mr. Eidinger may say no, it's somebody else. But he was running the business 16 17 out of that address. He wasn't living there, all 18 that's undisputed, before November of 2018. 19 Somebody else was, and that somebody else is his 20 business associate, so it's to be presumed he was 21 a friend or a friendly associate. 22 We think that person is Nikolas

1	Schiller; it could be somebody else. But he did
2	have the coincidence he's running a business out
3	of somebody else's apartment. And this was all
4	predates any time that he makes any claim of
5	moving, which I believe was November of 2018.
6	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Any other
7	questions, Ms. Lewis?
8	MEMBER LEWIS: No.
9	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Mr. Gill?
10	MEMBER GILL: Nope.
11	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. Let's
12	proceed.
13	MR. McGHIE: Thank you. So, Mr.
14	Eidinger.
15	MR. EIDINGER: Yes. Eidinger.
16	MR. McGHIE: Okay. You have 15
17	minutes.
18	MR. EIDINGER: Okay. Does that
19	include time for witnesses because we had
20	prescheduled witnesses?
21	(Simultaneous speaking.)
22	MR. McGHIE: No, that will be more

2	In his case in chief if he has any
3	witnesses, they should be included.
4	MR. EIDINGER: All right. Well first
5	I'd like to say the packet of evidence is my
6	rebuttal information here I present today I'd
7	like to be entered into the record. This packet
8	here, you should all have a copy.
9	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Yes, sir.
10	MR. EIDINGER: Have you read have
11	you read this?
12	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Yes.
13	MR. EIDINGER: I won't necessarily
14	read this verbatim. I'll just highlight some
15	points before I call my witnesses.
16	The new evidence that is being, you
17	know, brought forward here is it only further
18	confirms where my residence is. The fact is I
19	had vehicles that were registered at a prior
20	residence that are now coming for re-
21	registration, and they're being re-registered at
22	the correct location.

1	I own the other apartment in question
2	here, but I've not lived there for many years.
3	I've only recently made word to my super, you
4	know, residence where I am, everything matches up
5	because I did that back in the fall of last year.
6	So I have been a Ward 2 voter since the fall of
7	last year. There should be no issue here.
8	All these other bills and things that
9	are going to another address, I own that
10	property, and I wouldn't change an address on a
11	property I own. Okay. So when he says why
12	didn't you go to the post office and change your
13	address? And I said well, because I'm still
14	receiving important mail there and I still can
15	receive mail there if I want to.
16	You know, people own properties in
17	multiple states, they rent properties in multiple
18	states and multiple places in one city. That's
19	the confusion here. And he's trying to conflate
20	that with, you know, that I'm somehow trying to
21	pull one over on the Board.
22	When I bring up my witnesses you'll

see that -- okay. Thank you. You'll see that 1 2 there is actually plenty of evidence that I live there. 3 So since you've read all this, I'm not 4 5 going to repeat it all, but I do want to go to the conclusion here because I think it's kind of 6 7 important. 8 You know, Councilmember Jack Evans is 9 arguing some incorrect facts when it comes to the possible time line and the burden on D.C. 10 11 If you look on the document that was 12 provided by his attorney, it shows the election happening in -- the first one happening in 13 14 November of 2020. What I'm trying to do is have 15 the election in November or December of 2019 if 16 we succeed in collecting the petitions. 17 I am kind of complimented by you all 18 and the Councilmember assuming that we'll collect 19 the signatures to put this on the ballot. We have a tremendous burden of 10 percent of 20 21 registered voters in Ward 2 to put this on the 22 ballot. And I think that should instruct whether

or not it's a good use of taxpayers' funds to pay for a recall vote.

There's no other way to look at it. 3 I don't think this Board should decide whether 4 5 it's okay to do a recall. I don't think the Councilmember should decide if it's okay. 6 It's 7 up to the 10 percent who sign that petition. And 8 we -- you have to let us get at least a shot at 9 doing that before you decide this is a waste of Because you don't know what the intensity 10 money. 11 is for this recall.

12 Plus, of course, the statute makes 13 clear that you can only do recalls in the third 14 year of a term. This is actually going into his, I think, 28th year in office. So for someone to 15 16 be in office for so long to finally have a recall 17 is actually kind of reasonable. And we're only 18 doing it in the third year. So we're not having 19 -- it's not right after an election and it's not right before election, an election as has been 20 21 stated here today.

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So, yes, please don't prejudge voter

1	intent by denying us the right to collect
2	signatures for the recall. It's important to
3	note that this is only once every four years.
4	At this time I'd like to call Nikolas
5	Schiller. I guess have a seat here.
6	MR. DINAN: Mr. Chairman, if we could
7	ask for instruction from the bench, are we going
8	to have the right the opposing have a right to
9	cross-examination of these witnesses?
10	MR. McGHIE: Yes, you have the right
11	to cross-examine them. And when you're cross-
12	examining the witness, his time will stop. So
13	cross-examination is not going to take up his
14	time.
15	MR. DINAN: In that case, we would
16	respectfully request the Board invoke the rule on
17	witnesses, that the other witnesses has to leave
18	the room while each is testifying and that they
19	be instructed not to talk to each other while the
20	case in chief is being put on.
21	MEMBER LEWIS: I'm fine with that.
22	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. You good

with that, Mr. Gill? Mr. Gill?
MEMBER GILL: I'm fine.
MR. McGHIE: Do you have any other
additional witnesses that you
MR. EIDINGER: I object. This isn't
a court of law. This is a public hearing.
MEMBER GILL: Yeah. I want to I
want more discussion on this before we just say
yes.
This whole idea of being cross-
examined when you take time out and come to a
public hearing. We're trusting people are coming
here with the truth. If you've got documentary
evidence to question that but if we're going
to turn this into every time we do one of these,
cross-examination of witnesses, I wouldn't show
up to be put to that.
I mean there's only so many facts at
issue here, right? I think we, as a Board, can
ask the questions of witnesses. We're not no
one's under oath, for goodness sakes, as it is.
So I don't know what

1	MR. McGHIE: I will put him under
2	oath.
3	MR. EIDINGER: Either way this is
4	evidence I'm presenting
5	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Your time is not
6	running.
7	MR. EIDINGER: and he can talk
8	about it on rebuttal.
9	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Lewis.
10	MEMBER GILL: I'm just I'm sorry.
11	I'll shut up.
12	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: No, you're fine.
13	I just want to make sure we hear everybody.
14	MEMBER LEWIS: I think that's valid.
15	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: What?
16	MEMBER LEWIS: court of law. I
17	mean it's obviously up to our discretion. They
18	will be under oath so the protection is
19	already there.
20	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. Anything
21	else?
22	MEMBER GILL: No.

2	will allow witnesses to stay. We will allow you
3	to, Mr. Dinan, to ask additional questions. I
4	hate to even call it cross-examination. We'll
5	allow you to ask additional questions. We'll

7	kind of go on and on. I won't put a time limit
8	on it, but we'll limit those questions to the
9	specific things they they're testifying to.
10	We're not looking for additional
11	evidence that you may draw out of a witness that
12	Mr. Eidinger did not put on. But we're not going
13	to ask them to leave the room, and we will stop
14	the time for Mr. Eidinger.
15	And, Mr. Eidinger, you'll have the
16	same opportunity.
17	But we'll stop the time for Mr.

20	should be pretty short and succinct and not try
21	to draw out additional evidence in that regard.

EIDINGER: Do you have some 19 questions? Do you want to start with the questions for me? 20 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: 21 I have a couple 22 questions for you.

1	MR. EIDINGER: Okay.
2	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: But I'll ask my
3	colleagues if they have any.
4	Mr. Gill, do you have any questions?
5	MEMBER GILL: No. I mean my
6	question is where do you lay your bed your
7	head at night, and you've answered that with
8	witnesses.
9	The only other observation I would
10	make is that are there other Ward 2 residents
11	that I mean, we are now having to do this the
12	second time. There was a large discussion about
13	this. The Ward 2 residents that are here, why do
14	you got to do this?
15	MR. EIDINGER: Wait a second. I am a
16	Ward 2 resident, first of all. And this was me
17	initially doing it, my treasurer did not file the
18	proper campaign finance report. The issue of
19	residency wasn't brought up as a reason why it
20	was denied.
21	On the second round, this is an
22	allegation from the target of the recall and

we're responding overwhelmingly saying look, no, 1 2 I really live in Ward 2 and this is kind of ridiculous of having to prove this, but here we 3 are proving it. 4 5 I've been consistent the entire time that I've registered to vote there. 6 I've been 7 registered there since December. I explained in 8 the previous hearing why I didn't change my voter 9 registration in D.C. in the first place and it's irrelevant to this. It just doesn't matter. 10 11 Secondly, my treasurer and a new 12 treasurer, who is here today, and all of our 13 campaign finance paperwork is on file, is also from Ward 2. And there are numerous Ward 2 14 15 residents here today. I've got about 40 16 volunteers signed up ready to go. We're waiting 17 on this petition. 18 You know, and I do appreciate you 19 doing your due diligence here and when allegations like this are brought up, but these 20 21 are really, you know, dramatic allegations that you better have the proof. And I just don't 22

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think there's -- this comes even close to 1 2 presenting enough proof. And in the totality of it all, you 3 4 know, he's asking to prejudge the voters. You 5 don't know what the voter intent is yet. The voters might really want this recall. 6 So if they don't, it will go away. 7 8 And as was noted by Nikolas Schiller, 9 I'm concerned that a private investigator was hired to do this work, that it's not just pro 10 bono work, perhaps friend of the Councilmember. 11 12 I think at this point the Councilmember should have filed a rebuttal or a no recall campaign 13 14 committee by D.C. law. 15 Yes, he's entitled to representation, 16 but I think it's gone beyond that. I think there 17 has been -- I don't have -- unfortunately I don't 18 have a receipt for a payment to a private 19 investigator, but it does seem like that that's 20 what's going on in this case. And there is a second recall -- I'm 21 22 sorry, a third recall committee that's been

formed you may have heard about. Some of those 1 2 people are here in the room right now. They have told me they're going to drop that recall 3 position as soon as my petition is issued. 4 But 5 that's just so to hold this Board accountable that someone is going to get this recall started. 6 7 And, you know, it really shouldn't be 8 denied to me at this point. It is correct, I've 9 lived at the house, I've slept at the house for It took a while for me to move my 10 four years. 11 residency because I own the other place. And I 12 have a right to have all four residencies. I'm 13 blessed by this city and I've been really 14 fortunate in my career in being able to support multiple residencies at the same time. 15 16 But, you know, my girlfriend was here, 17 my friend was here, my activist colleague is 18 here, they've all been to my house. It's a home 19 and I welcome -- I would invite any of you into

20 my home today to come see it if that's what it 21 took to convince you.

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CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Lewis, do you

1 have any questions? 2 MEMBER LEWIS: No, I don't. 3 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Mr. Dinan, do you 4 have any other questions? 5 MR. DINAN: No questions. I got the 6 answer. 7 MR. EIDINGER: You got the answer that 8 you want. 9 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Ms. Lewis. Mr. Eidinger, is 10 MEMBER LEWIS: Yes. it true that you will be moving back to Maryland 11 12 to fight Congressman Andy Harris in the next election? 13 14 MR. EIDINGER: Not the next election actually. The comment was taken out of context. 15 16 I am interested in seeing what happens in that district in 2022 after Congressional 17 18 redistricting. It has -- I'm being perfectly 19 honest. It has occurred to me as a political 20 animal that I might move to another state in the 21 future. 22 But I'm here now and I'm here for the

1	rest of this election cycle through 2020. I'm
2	going to be voting in D.C. in 2020. And, you
3	know, 2022, if we get a good redistricting, I
4	might even move to Maryland and run for that
5	office. It's my right, you know. And I've done
6	a lot of activism in Salisbury and I'm proud of
7	it. And it was on behalf of the District of
8	Columbia and our lack of voting rights in
9	Congress. That's why I was there.
10	You know, I wasn't and I'm not
11	trying to throw away my life here. I love my
12	life in D.C. And the fact that the media,
13	Washington Post, Baltimore Sun, AP, they all want
14	to write about this, this is good for D.C. It
15	shows that people are standing up for D.C.
16	So, yeah, you know, I think this is,
17	you know, desperation by the Jack Evans camp here
18	to raise this issue.
19	MEMBER LEWIS: Thank you.
20	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: I have no
21	additional questions.
22	Were we going to do rebuttal now or

MR. DINAN: Yes, if
MS. CHRISTENSEN: Five minutes.
MR. McGHIE: You have five minutes
left. If you want to relinquish your time, Mr.
Eidinger, then we'll just begin with the rebuttal
of Mr. Dinan.
MR. EIDINGER: I mean, you've all
affirmed that you've read my statement here so
I'm not going to read it all.
I just also included, you know,
excessive proof. There's a statement here from
my Temple, Temple Micah, which is just up the
road. You know, it's very close. Jewish people
like live close to where they pray. Okay. So
this is, you know, it doesn't say in the statute
I have to prove with a PEPCO bill, but I figured
this Temple bill is a little more relevant.
And it's true, I did have a PEPCO bill
sent out when I first rented the property as a
home office. So, yes, the PEPCO bill's been
there for a long time.
And then lastly, the registration

residential parking renewal, doesn't that show that in renewing it at an address? So whatever allegation they're making about me having the cars registered at the old address is old information.

And then there's a renters and a 6 7 policy bill here. It doesn't have any business 8 name on it, it just has my name, Adam Eidinger. 9 Because this is a home renter's policy. Which I just used at this home when the house caught on 10 11 fire two years ago. And that's also in the 12 newspaper if you want to pull out public record. I've had it there for a long time. 13

Many people move to Washington, D.C. for -- and they don't register to vote here right away. That's your right, you know, and many people keep registration if they have multiple properties at a desired location. And then they move it when it's convenient for them. And so, you know, I didn't even know

I was going to be doing this recall in Decemberwhen I registered to vote there. I had no

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1	intention of doing this. It was only after
2	reading in the Washington Post about the
3	corruption for these FOIAs that and then the
4	lack of holding them accountable that I decided
5	I had to do this.
6	And I have said to Jack Evans' counsel
7	here I will withdraw the petition for recall if
8	he simply agrees not to run for office again.
9	That would save the taxpayers the cost of a
10	recall as well. So why don't you just not run
11	for office? And he's not taken me up on that
12	offer.
13	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you.
14	MR. McGHIE: Okay. Mr. Dinan, you
15	have another five minutes for rebuttal.
16	MR. DINAN: Okay.
17	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: And please pull the
18	mic over to you, sir.
19	MR. DINAN: I will limit our rebuttal
20	to matters that came up on the petition's case.
21	First of all, the again, we
22	reiterate the address of convenience argument and

the coincidence that he had this business at Massachusetts Avenue which gave him the utility bills, which gave him the right, the ability to transfer the driver's license, even under the DHS, the new regulations. Which is really the crutch pin.

7 We did say that we believe Mr. 8 Schiller lived there. He says he doesn't. He 9 just works there. We would accept that. We 10 think that that distinction's immaterial. Other 11 people that we have living there is Sean Robinson 12 and Keith Carr again when I snooped around.

But as to the other witnesses, on the record, and it's Exhibit 2 to our opposition, there's an article in the Washington Post, and it was dated April 10th, 2018, and that's when Mr. Eidinger says that he's moving to Maryland.

18 The focus of the article had to do 19 with DCPS. We're not going to go into that. 20 April 10th it says he's moving to Maryland. And 21 he gives as his address Mintwood Place. Totally 22 contradicts the evidence with which we just

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heard.

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2	Tell me time, please.
3	Mr. Eidinger in his previous testimony
4	has stated that he moved to Mintwood Place in
5	November of 2018. The evidence we just heard is
6	totally contradicted by that.
7	And then we hear evidence, statement
8	from Mr. Eidinger well, I really don't have a
9	present intention of moving to Maryland. In
10	fact, I'm thinking about 2022. Yet he goes and
11	tells the newspaper, in particular the Baltimore
12	Sun, this was a big issue in Maryland, on April
13	11th, published on April 11th, that he's moving
14	back. And the Board can read this article.
15	Plain and it's republished by the Post. No
16	offer asking for retraction.
17	But if you read this article it can
18	only be read in the present tense. It doesn't
19	mean he's moving back this afternoon, but it
20	doesn't mean he's moving back in 2022. There's
21	no way that his statements given to the press can
22	now be squared with the evidence that's just put

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2	As for the testimony of Ms. Hanrahan
3	attending a meeting there, I had no doubt she
4	attended a meeting there. She had a business
5	there, a marijuana business.
6	So, we reiterate I'm running out of
7	time address of convenience, the law cannot be
8	read that you can just move into a place, use the
9	coincidence, get a driver's license, get a recall
10	petition and then leave.
11	This Board has discretion and it
12	should use it to deny this petition in the sound
13	use of discretion and the fact he is not a bona
14	fide resident. And as to the evidence that was
15	just put on, it is completely rebutted by his own
16	words in other fora.
17	Thank you very much.
18	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. Great. Go
19	ahead.
20	MEMBER LEWIS: Mr. Eidinger, just to
21	make sure I'm clear. Did you testify that you
22	changed your address in November of 2018?

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1	MR. EIDINGER: In November of well,
2	after the election I moved back from Maryland to
3	D.C. And I believe I was on the voter rolls the
4	first week of December in D.C. I re-registered
5	here in D.C. I reported my prior address in
6	Maryland and my former voting address and, you
7	know, submitted the card and got the card in the
8	mail at my residence at 2448 Massachusetts
9	Avenue.
10	MEMBER LEWIS: Thank you.
11	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Any others?
12	Mr. Gill.
13	MEMBER GILL: No questions.
14	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: All right. None
15	from me. Can we get the public comments?
16	MR. McGHIE: So at this point is there
17	anybody in the public that would like to be heard
18	in support on the challenge?
19	In support of the challenge?
20	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: That would be in
21	support of Mr
22	MR. McGHIE: Evans.

1	7
1	Seeing none, is there anybody that
2	would like to be heard in support or in
3	opposition to the challenge? Let me just count
4	first. One, two, three, four, five, six. Let's
5	go from this is left, my left to right.
6	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: How many people did
7	we have?
8	MR. McGHIE: Seven.
9	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Seven. Okay.
10	Please limit to two minutes, please.
11	Can you time?
12	MS. ORY: Two minutes?
13	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Yes.
14	MR. McGHIE: Just please state your
15	name and address for the record and then you have
16	two minutes.
17	MR. EDEN: My name is Art Solutionator
18	Eden. And I want to beseech this Board that it
19	comes a moment in history where you can stand for
20	something, not fall for anything.
21	And that the children of the city
22	deserve professionals who stand for the elements

1	that make this country a free country. So think
2	of the children when you're going to vote.
3	Thank you.
4	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you, sir.
5	MS. ORY: My name is Eleanor Ory. I
6	go by Echo for short and I am the Ward 2
7	Committee Woman for the Statehood Green Party.
8	And I want to speak in favor of the recall.
9	D.C. is at a critical and sensitive
10	point in time in the fight for statehood with
11	historic endorsements for D.C. statehood passed
12	in HR1 and record number of cosigners for HR51
13	and now listed as a top priority of the Senate
14	Minority leadership.
15	The ongoing ethics investigation and
16	the dangerous distraction that frames to paint
17	D.C. as having a corrupt political culture and
18	sent damaging swamp tropes which conceivably risk
19	chilling and hampering D.C.'s effort of
20	encouraging hesitant members of Congress to
21	cosign.
22	The statehood movement has worked too

hard to separate the reputation of D.C. residents 1 2 from the toxic environment of Congress to be ruined by one elected official's impropriety. 3 In a city that has taken the lead in 4 5 prosecuting a high profile elected official's abuse of office on the national level, I believe 6 elected officials should be held to the highest 7 8 standards of ethics and integrity as we complete 9 our final sprint for D.C. statehood. 10 Furthermore, as someone who lives in 11 Ward 2, I've spoken to many residents who are not 12 only concerned with the conduct of Evans, but 13 with the stonewalling of this process. Recalls, 14 like impeachment, are a critical democratic check on our elected officials. 15 16 If you choose to stop this petition 17 for recall, you will only create more petitions. 18 Already one person has already filed an 19 additional recall and others that I have spoken 20 to have considered and speculated considered by 21 them. Worse, we will further erode the public 22 trust in our system.

1	Already between Don't Mute DC, zero
2	vision, and lack of congressional representation,
3	there is damage to the public trust. I urge you
4	to recognize Adam's residency and issue the
5	petition as it will only delay what many in Ward
6	2 want.
7	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you.
8	MR. McGHIE: Next lady behind Ms.
9	Miller.
10	MS. DIENER: Hello, Board Members. My
11	name is Robin Diener. I live in Ward 2. I have
12	for approximately ten years been the President of
13	the Dupont Circle Citizens Association. And I
14	would just like to say in answer to the question
15	from the gentleman, second person in, these
16	signs, by the way, terribly hard to read. You
17	might want to get them rethought. It's usually
18	nice to know who's speaking.
19	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you.
20	MS. DIENER: I don't think it is that
21	unusual to not find easily as someone, you know,
22	ongoing, a solid 25 year resident, let's say, of

a particular residence to do a recall. Because it is a negative thing. It comes after really quite terrible things have occurred.

And for most of us, like myself, a little community leader who's working watering trees and taking care of gardens and seeing that rats are fought, and has been eradicated, I mean these are not big, big deals but they make up the daily life in any neighborhood.

And in order to do that work, we work 10 11 with our Councilmember and his representatives. 12 The NCs the same thing as the citizens 13 association. So that someone like an Adam 14 Eidinger who has, frankly, political expertise and a willingness to take this on, is quite 15 16 welcome by the residents who are doing the work 17 on an everyday basis and who frankly rely on the 18 support and open communication with the 19 Councilmember that they have. 20 So I present that to you for your

21 consideration. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you.

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1	MR. McGHIE: Sir?
2	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Could you just
3	state your name and address for the record?
4	MR. HANRAHAN: Yes. My name is John
5	Hanrahan, 1505 Q Street NW. Lived there for 46
6	years, I guess it is.
7	Just in response to a couple points
8	that the that Mr. Evans' attorney made that I
9	just was struck by.
10	The one thing, the cost of the
11	election. This is a matter of public corruption.
12	We should not be putting a price tag on what it
13	might cost. We don't have these kind of
14	elections very often. In fact, I think there
15	have only been two or three that were for ANC and
16	there's none for a Councilmember. This
17	unprecedented, it doesn't happen every other
18	year.
19	As I said, democracy does not come
20	cheap especially when a matter of public
21	corruption is involved. And also we're dealing
22	with a structure that Mr. Dinan does a terrific

job, I must say.

2	What I do want to say though is this
3	is again Mr. Evans is attempting to thwart the
4	role of the people. He has done that in three
5	different initiatives where he has overturned
6	citizen initiatives. That's probably the least
7	of the things that we're dealing with in this
8	recall. But overturned Initiative 77 recently.
9	Overturned term limits and he overturned campaign
10	contribution limits some years ago. So I bring
11	that only in the context of this, that I think
12	this is another effort to sort of run out of the
13	clock, thwart the procedure, et cetera.
14	There will be another petition, as
15	you've heard. There's already been one been
16	filed. You have it in front of you. I think
17	they were supposed to respond to it by maybe
18	today, another 10-day limit.
19	But, in any event, that's why we're
20	very much in support of this. I've known Adam
21	for years. I can't you know, I don't go to
22	his house. I know where he lives, though.

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1	Thanks very much.
2	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you, sir.
3	MR. McGHIE: Okay. Ma'am. Yes.
4	MS. HOBSON: Good afternoon.
5	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Good afternoon.
6	MS. HOBSON: I'm Tina Hobson. I'm the
7	wife of Julius Hobson who was on the first
8	elected City Council Can D.C. I have lived at
9	1330 Massachusetts Avenue at Thomas Circle for
10	seven years here.
11	And I want to tell you that the reason
12	why I am speaking is because I don't believe that
13	my husband, Julius, would have tolerated the
14	councilman we're talking about for this long.
15	And, therefore, because of his problems as we
16	have read them and as I have lived them in my
17	community, so I am asking for a chance for us to
18	vote, to have a recall election.
19	So let the community that Evans lives
20	in let us vote. And if we don't want him
21	there and do not feel he now represents the best
22	of the community, then let us have a chance to

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And I ask you that, and I thank you very 1 say so. 2 much for considering it. 3 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you. 4 (Applause.) Okay. 5 MR. McGHIE: The gentleman sitting behind to Ms. Hanrahan. 6 7 MR. OTTEN: Good afternoon. My name 8 is Chris Otten. I'm a 19-year resident in the 9 District of Columbia. And I'm tired of the 10 corruption. 11 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Can you state your 12 address, sir? 13 MR. OTTEN: My address is 1830 Belmont 14 Road NW. Actually I have -- I'm a former elected ANC Commissioner and what we see from Jack Evans, 15 16 I mean none of this would be happening right now 17 if he didn't flip the term limits initiative 18 back, what, 12 years ago? 19 And, I mean, Jack Evans represents 20 corruption. And the flip side is somebody like 21 Adam Eidinger who I've known since April of 2000. 22 He's run as a candidate, he's supported

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1	campaigns. He was a leader in the Statehood
2	Green Party. He's now in the Democratic Party.
3	He's helped us get to initiatives and
4	helped folks stay out of jail, like Issue 71.
5	And I think he's proved beyond a doubt that he's
6	lived at his residence for some time.
7	I have watched Game of Thrones at his
8	house regularly and I've even stayed there. His
9	daughter lives there. I've known him, like I
10	said, since 2000 so I've been to both locations.
11	Mintwood Place residence is a one
12	bedroom. He had a daughter, you know, more than
13	a decade ago, almost 13 years ago now and he
14	needed more space and I remember, to raise his
15	family. So that's part of why he has a big home
16	now, bigger home.
17	And so I just suggest we get past this
18	little obstacle and let's get on to the recall
19	because we have the right people ready to go and
20	we're going to get the signatures ASAP so we'll
21	have the election this year.
22	Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Is there one more?
MR. McGHIE: Yes. That will be the
last one as Ms. Hanrahan.
MS. HANRAHAN: Debbie Hanrahan, 1505
Q Street NW, Washington, D.C., 20009. I've lived
there more years than I want to admit. Probably
50. I don't know.
We want to assert the importance of a
level playing field when citizens come forward
trying to exercise their rights.
When Mr. Evans can hire a very
expensive lawyer, investigators and other people
to use to fight our interests and our wanting to
move forward, it's very difficult and it ceases
to be a level playing field.
It is this Board's job to make sure
that there is a correction that we are not
overwhelmed by his money and the expertise of his
overwhelmed by his money and the expertise of his experts that he's been able to hire and for us to

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1 democracy and fairness.

2	And so I was struck by the Chairman
3	saying to Adam or somebody on our side oh,
4	no, talking to Dorothy Brizill, you're not going
5	to take over this process. Well, I would ask you
6	to have the same concern about our effort to get
7	a recall against Mr. Evans, that Mr. Evans does
8	not take over this process. He's a very powerful
9	figure. All of your political appointees.
10	This recall is not an unnoticed event
11	by the power structure of this city and it is
12	your moment for basically I forget the name of
13	the book that Kennedy wrote, but this is your
14	moment to stand up and be independent and show
15	some courage. And let us go forward.
16	And, as we have mentioned, we have
17	another group of people who are prepared to take
18	Mr. Eidinger's place. And if you turn those
19	people down because of this unfair system, we
20	will have another group. Now, you don't want
21	that. We don't want that. Nobody wants that.
22	So please do your job. Thank you.

1	(Applause.)
2	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Any other?
3	MR. McGHIE: Okay. If there's no more
4	public comments, can I have the parties at the
5	table again for their closing argument?
6	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Prior to you
7	starting, let me thank those persons who provided
8	statements relative to their views on recall.
9	This is a big deal, it's very important, and they
10	are very much appreciated, and you're serving the
11	District of Columbia citizens when you do come in
12	and make your perspective also. Thank you for
13	taking the time to come and speak with us.
14	MR. McGHIE: Okay, since, Mr. Dinan,
15	you're the challenger, you have the burden of
16	proof. You'll have the last say. So you have
17	two minutes for closing, Mr. Eidinger.
18	MR. EIDINGER: Well, I mean I don't
19	want to take any more much more time except to
20	say that I feel like I've proven beyond any doubt
21	that this is my residence today. And that, you
22	know, this should be a matter of just issuing the

recall today. And I want to encourage you to do
 it today.

Waiting -- I was told at the last 3 4 meeting where I presented on the first effort 5 that this could be done at the next meeting, which it didn't happen at the next meeting. 6 We 7 had this special meeting. I was anticipating 8 that to happen in early May. 9 So there's already been a significant delay from my perspective in just getting to be 10 11 I understand, general counsel explained heard. 12 to me that this was a matter of scheduling with 13 the Board members and I respect that. 14 But to have another delay, I think

15 there's overwhelming evidence today right now 16 that I am a registered voter in Ward 2 and that 17 I've met all the qualifications to bring this 18 recall.

And so I hope you'll do your job and approve it today and issue the petition today so we can really start collecting signatures tonight. Which is what our intention is.

1	So I just want to thank everybody on
2	this Board. I know you are here to ensure the
3	public trust and I thank you for your serious
4	consideration today.
5	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you.
6	MR. DINAN: Mr. Chairman, members of
7	the Board, we would just reiterate our arguments
8	that driver's license is not a rebuttable
9	presumption. That it is not, per se, evidence.
10	That you have to look at the evidence in its
11	totality that we went through, including all the
12	items that he uses been for an address
13	including current account items like your income
14	tax, your cell phones, et cetera.
15	We again submit to use the huge
16	coincidence that he had this place of business in
17	Ward 2. Just today he admits well, he was moving
18	in Maryland. And then when he moved back to the
19	District he took up a Ward 2 address.
20	But he did, as the overwhelming
21	evidence shows, for the sole purpose of using
22	this business this coincidence address to

recall Jack Evans and then following it lists
 statements publically in the press that he's
 going to move back to Maryland.

As for the evidence the witnesses have put on, we believe is contradicted by Mr. Eidinger's own statements in the newspaper where in April of 2018 he told the newspaper he lived in Mintwood Place. Then he told them he moved in Maryland, that he was moving to Maryland, which he did.

11 And, therefore, looking at the 12 totality of the evidence, this is an address of convenience. It's not a bona fide address. 13 And 14 that within that, this Board should use its 15 inherent agency discretion as stated by the D.C. 16 Court of Appeals and also in United States Court 17 of Appeals for the 4th Circuit, which is in 18 Richmond, and that discretion should --19 It's time. CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank 20 you. 21 MR. DINAN: And just to -- and thank 22 you very much.

1	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thank you.
2	Mr. Gill, do you have any questions.
3	MEMBER GILL: No questions.
4	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Do you have any
5	questions, Ms. Lewis, for the parties?
6	MEMBER LEWIS: I do. Mr. Eidinger,
7	just one last question. Mr. Eidinger, just one
8	last question that was raised, I believe it was
9	at the last hearing that we had.
10	The proponent raises issue or the
11	proponent raises issue about the Homestead waiver
12	or withdrawal of the Homestead deduction. Would
13	you mind just explaining that for us and what
14	actually happened?
15	MR. EIDINGER: On the last page of the
16	packet you'll see a corrected bill from D.C.
17	Government. This is the bill without the
18	Homestead deduction. So when we had our last
19	hearing, I had not concluded my taxes. And this
20	was something that at the beginning of 2018 the
21	Homestead deduction was still on the books and it
22	was a couple months later that I moved to

Maryland, in April of 2018, registered there, set up a residence there and then moved back to D.C. in November of 2018.

So, you know, this should have been 4 5 done within 30 days of moving. Like when I moved to Maryland I should have changed the Homestead 6 deduction from the old address. 7 I did not. Ι 8 hadn't even -- wasn't even thinking about the 9 Homestead deduction. And I bought the house in 1999, the apartment on Mintwood Place, so this 10 was me report -- self-reporting to D.C. Office of 11 12 Tax and Revenue that, in fact, I should have notified them earlier that I had moved and then 13 14 they sent me a corrected bill, which you can see -- well, it says paid for 15. But basically 15 16 that's me paying the D.C. Government extra tax 17 revenue because I'm not entitled to the Homestead 18 deduction on that property.

19And, you know, I'm an Eagle Scout, Boy20Scouts of America, and I honestly like paying my21taxes. It's a good feeling to be caught up on22paying your taxes. I'm sure some of you

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experience the same feeling.

2	So I actually thanked Jack Evans
3	counsel here today because not today but in
4	our prior meeting for bringing it to my attention
5	because I this could have gone on for years
6	and I would have had an even bigger tax bill and
7	penalty. So he actually kind of saved me from
8	having a bigger penalty. And thanks for getting
9	me up to date on my taxes.
10	So does that answer your question?
11	MEMBER LEWIS: Yes. Thank you.
12	MR. EIDINGER: Thank you.
13	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Any other
14	questions?
15	Mr. McGhie, do you have anything else?
16	MR. McGHIE: No.
17	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. What we're
18	going to do is, one, Mr. SanFord is going to get
19	with Ms. Brizill and make sure that the
20	because I'd like to do some final rulemaking when
21	we get back. Can you get with Ms. Brizill and
22	make sure that those chapters are clear, if you

don't mind? 1 2 We will take a 15-minute recess, convene and we'll come back out and let you know 3 4 where we are. Okay. All right. Thank you. 5 (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter 6 7 went off the record at 1:26 p.m. and resumed at 8 1:39 p.m.) 9 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. We'd like to reconvene. 10 11 Procedurally what we're going to do is 12 we're going to give you a decision on the 13 challenge today and then we'll also walk through 14 some procedural matters. 15 Once that is concluded, we intend to 16 go back to the item that was tabled and hopefully 17 move through those regulations relatively 18 quickly. 19 So I'm going to ask that as we finish 20 up on the recall petition matter that if you 21 decide to leave, try to do so quietly. If you stay, that will be great because we can kind of 22

get through that and I'd like not to have a lot 1 2 of disruption. So, from that I would like -- just for 3 4 the record, we are reconvened the meeting. Mr. McGhie, would you go through what 5 we need to do procedurally? 6 7 MR. McGHIE: Okay. At this point of 8 the proceeding the Board is prepared to give you 9 its oral order on this matter and a written order will follow, which either party can appeal. 10 11 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: And the oral order 12 is -- is that Mr. Evans did not reach the 13 threshold necessary to prove that you are not a resident of Ward 2. We concluded that the 14 evidence was simply not sufficient. Your recall 15 16 petition, since you have met all the filing 17 requirement, will go forward. 18 (Applause.) 19 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: And we will issue 20 -- this is Mr. Eidinger, we will issue that 21 petition now. However, I have one more member, maybe 22

1	two, who'd like to make a comment as we go
2	forward.
3	Mr. Gill? You want to go ahead with
4	the
5	MEMBER GILL: Yeah, with this
6	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: And then we'll
7	correct that.
8	Are there any questions?
9	MEMBER GILL: So far no.
10	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay.
11	MR. McGHIE: Okay. The third matter
12	on our agenda being concluded with respect to the
13	challenge to Mr. Adam Eidinger, we move to the
14	fourth matter on our agenda, which is issuance
15	and formal adoption of a petition to Adam
16	Eidinger for the proposed recall of Jack Evans,
17	Ward 2 Member of the Council of the District of
18	Columbia.
19	And I ask the Registrar of Voters
20	(Off-mic comments.)
21	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: We have to have the
22	Registrar of Voters have to make a certification.

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1	She stepped out. She hasn't come back yet.
2	We'll hold on for a second.
3	Is there anything else we need to do
4	before proceeding?
5	MR. McGHIE: No.
6	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay.
7	MR. McGHIE: Unless you want to move to
8	the regulations.
9	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: No, I'll wait for
10	her. Thank you for your indulgence.
11	(Pause.)
12	MR. EIDINGER: I do have a question on
13	the procedure. So either you're saying as the
14	Chairman that this will go forward but there was
15	no vote taken in public. Or is that necessary?
16	I just wanted to know.
17	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: You received a
18	majority vote to go forward.
19	MR. EIDINGER: Okay. But I didn't
20	that vote was when did that vote take place?
21	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: It just took place.
22	It just took place when we convened to discuss

the evidence that we --1 2 MR. EIDINGER: Back behind closed doors? 3 4 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Yes, sir. 5 Okay. I'm just curious MR. EIDINGER: why that isn't done in public so we know who 6 7 voted how and what way? 8 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Well, it was 9 unanimous if you want to know, but --MR. EIDINGER: All right. Well, 10 that's good to know. I just -- just my question 11 12 is -- we're both wondering and he's giving me 13 advice too on procedure and thought that that was 14 part of the procedure was to do it in public. MEMBER GILL: So -- pardon me. 15 It's 16 not nefarious at all. But in the regular 17 hearings that we have on matters we like to take 18 in information and then talk amongst ourselves. 19 If we were going to then wait to have a public 20 vote, we would have to wait a month every time. 21 So generally how these work is that we take in information. We don't sort of show our cards 22

1 here, talk amongst ourselves, vote and then issue 2 an order based on that vote. It actually just speeds things up. 3 4 MR. EIDINGER: Okay. I appreciate 5 it's being issued today a lot. MEMBER LEWIS: And that talk amongst 6 7 ourselves is actually called executive session. 8 And so we go into executive session and then we discuss the evidence or the information that we 9 received and then we take a vote at that point in 10 time. 11 12 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Good question, but 13 we're not trying to be clandestine. MR. EDEN: You said it was a unanimous 14 15 vote? 16 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Yes, sir. 17 PARTICIPANT: No, majority. 18 MEMBER LEWIS: No, it was actually a 19 unanimous vote. 20 (Simultaneous speaking.) MEMBER LEWIS: He said it was 21 majority, and I was just clarifying to say no, it 22

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was actually unanimous. 1 2 MR. EDEN: For Adam? MEMBER LEWIS: 3 Yes. 4 MR. McGHIE: Okay. Ms. Brooks, you --5 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: We need you today. Have you received a copy 6 MR. McGHIE: 7 of the petition with the parties? 8 MS. BROOKS: I think it was emailed on 9 Friday. 10 MR. EIDINGER: We got an email, yes. 11 MS. BROOKS: Did you have any changes 12 to it? 13 MR. EIDINGER: No changes. 14 MR. DINAN: No changes. 15 Okay. So both parties MR. McGHIE: 16 had the opportunity to look at the petition. Is 17 there any other parties that object to any of the 18 language that's in the petition? 19 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Before you 20 continue, did you get the registrar's name for 21 the record? 22 MR. McGHIE: Brooks. Yes.

1	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. Ms. Brooks.
2	MR. McGHIE: No, you did. He said he
3	did.
4	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: I'm sorry. I just
5	wanted to make sure the record was clear.
6	MR. McGHIE: Okay.
7	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Please continue.
8	MR. McGHIE: All right. So if neither
9	party has any objections to the language in the
10	petition, I ask that the Board entertain a motion
11	to adopt the petition as presented by the
12	Registrar of Voters.
13	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay, I think I'd
14	like to ask one of the Board Members to make a
15	motion and then we'll have a point.
16	Can I get a motion from one of the
17	Board members to adopt the petition?
18	MEMBER GILL: So a motion to adopt the
19	petition as written.
20	MEMBER LEWIS: So moved and second.
21	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. Questions.
22	Points.

I	
1	Mr. Gill?
2	MEMBER GILL: Yes. When this was
3	first presented, I raised I felt that portions
4	of the Eidinger the recall verbiage talked
5	about staff. And I didn't think that was
6	appropriate. And essentially because our
7	newspaper has reported on some things, the
8	staff's name is thrown in this petition. So I've
9	gone round and round with the general counsel on
10	the law as it's written and I think I think
11	it's a really unfair language. But that's not
12	important. It's at the end of the day the
13	language is what people will read.
14	But what I've mentioned to our general
15	counsel and I wanted to state for the record, I
16	think the Board should be given more discretion
17	on the language that's put forth. And that the
18	way the law is written, we have to accept
19	whatever the petitioner writes down.
20	And I think there's a certain stamp of
21	approval that comes with a Board of Election
22	petition and I'm still confused as to why bother

having a Board if there's no adult supervision 1 2 over what gets the Board of Election's approval. So, if there is given discretion on 3 4 this, I would have requested and I would not have 5 voted for a petition that disparages staff who have no -- have no way to defend themselves and 6 no way to be on the opposite side of this 7 8 petition. But I do not have that discretion and 9 so I, based on the law and based on, you know, as I said the objective of the petition, the points 10 11 in the petition are immaterial to the Board. We 12 just make sure it follows within our statute. But I do believe that one sentence 13 14 there, I would have requested to be changed or I would not have voted for it had I had that power. 15 16 That's my point. 17 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Before I ask you 18 further, Ms. Lewis, did you have a comment on the 19 record? 20 MEMBER LEWIS: Yes. I believe at the 21 last hearing I also echoed Councilmember Gill's 22 sentiments just concerning --

1	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Board Member.
2	MEMBER LEWIS: Excuse me.
3	Councilmember. I'm promoting you. Board Member
4	Gill's
5	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: I'm not sure on
6	that.
7	(Laughter.)
8	MEMBER LEWIS: Board Member Gill's
9	sentiments concerning that language. It just was
10	also concerning to me as well.
11	And I do think and I understood your
12	arguments, Mr. Eidinger, regarding kind of
13	looking at the totality of the circumstances.
14	You know that I, of course, humbly disagree with
15	that similar to how Board Member Gill in that I
16	would also requested that that language about the
17	staff specifically be stricken. Particularly
18	considering that the staff doesn't have the right
19	to respond to that.
20	And, I guess, there is concern when
21	the media publishes these articles and seems to
22	implicate not only the candidate but also those

working for him. While there's an argument of what was used or who was using the means to an end there, I don't think that it is proper, per se, to have the staff implicated in that particular manner.

And so I also just wanted to echo for the record what I presented at the very first hearing regarding this matter just concerning the concerns that I have with the language.

MR. EIDINGER: It's totally germane to this, both your points. I took your comments to heart and I resubmitted with new language I took out the remaining reference to his staff. So if you look at the draft, it just says Jack Evans' office. Doesn't say staff. And, yeah, so I took it to heart.

I actually thought it was a really legitimate point and we talked about it internally like it's not necessary for us to make our point to disparage his staff. And, you're right. They have no way of defending themselves and they're not recallable. But I will note --

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1	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: It's been properly
2	moved and seconded. And we'll take a vote. And
3	is it a unanimous vote to I assume for the
4	petition to move forward?
5	(Chorus of aye.)
6	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. So you got
7	a unanimous vote.
8	MR. EIDINGER: All right. Thank you.
9	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: It's properly
10	issued. This is an oral order and you'll get a
11	written order at some point in the coming days.
12	And I think you'll be getting we'll actually
13	issue the petition for you guys to get started.
14	MR. McGHIE: Ms. Brooks? Ms. Brooks,
15	can you outline the process?
16	MS. BROOKS: A notice of potential
17	recall
18	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Can you pull the
19	mic close to you. Thank you.
20	MS. BROOKS: A notice of intention to
21	recall Jack Evans, Ward 2 Member of the Council
22	of the District of Columbia, was filed by Adam

Eidinger and a resident in District of Columbia 1 2 who resides in the same ward as the subject of the recall on Friday, April 12th, 2019. 3 Councilmember Jack Evans filed with 4 5 the Board a response to Mr. Eidinger's statement of recall, reason to recall on Monday, April 6 22nd, 2019. Pursuant to the D.C. Official Code 7 1, Section 1001.17(g) the proposer of the recall 8 9 to have 180 days to collect signatures beginning 10 on a date when the proponent of the recall 11 formally adopts the original petition form as his 12 or her own form. 13 Accordingly, the deadline for Mr. 14 Eidinger to file his petition in support of the recall is 5:00 p.m. on Monday, November 18, 2019. 15 16 Pursuant to D.C. Official Code 1, 17 Section 1001.17(h)(1), the petition submitted in 18 support of the recall of Councilmember Evans must 19 contain the signatures of 10 percent of the 20 registered qualifying voters in Ward 2. Pursuant to D.C. Official Code 21 22 1204.112, the signatures required must be

computed from the total number of registered voters of the Election Board from which he or she was elected according to the latest official count of registered voters and determined by the Board 30 days prior to the submission of the signatures for the recall petition.

While the signature requirement cannot 7 8 yet be determined if the most recent registration 9 figures published by the Board were used, the petition filed in support of the notice of intent 10 11 to recall Councilman Evans will require to 12 include the signatures of 5,195 newly registered 13 voters in Ward 2. Both the proposer of the recall and the elected official who is the 14 subject of the recall are advised to check with 15 16 the Board's Voter Services Office on a monthly 17 basis as the reports are published.

18Also as a reminder, when filing your19petition, make sure they are assembled in serial20number.

21 MR. EIDINGER: I'm sorry, and what?
22 MS. BROOKS: As a reminder, when you

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1 file your petitions, make sure they are assembled 2 in serial number. MR. EIDINGER: Serial number. 3 4 MS. BROOKS: Serial number, yes. 5 MR. EIDINGER: Not organized in any other way? Like by addition or anything like 6 7 that? 8 MS. BROOKS: Exactly. One through 9 whatever. 10 MR. EIDINGER: And just to be clear, 11 they don't have to be organized by petitioner, 12 they have to be organized just to number? 13 MS. BROOKS: Yeah, one through however 14 many pages you submit. And two we only -- you 15 can file as many as you want, but we only going 16 to count up to that amount of the signature 17 requirement. 18 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okay. Anything, 19 Mr. McGhie? 20 MR. McGHIE: Does anybody have any 21 questions? 22 Okay. All right, CHAIRMAN BENNETT:

I	
1	thank you, sir. We're going to go back to the
2	item that was tabled.
3	Mr. SanFord, would you please come
4	forward?
5	Mr. SanFord, can we move forward,
6	please, on that?
7	MR. SANFORD: Yes.
8	CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Thanks for waiting.
9	MR. SANFORD: Good afternoon, Mr.
10	Chairman, distinguished Board Members. William
11	SanFord, general counsel for the Office of
12	Campaign Finance. The first thing I need to do
13	is apologize to Ms. Brizill.
14	Earlier during these proceedings I
15	actually read the wrong Chapters into the record
16	and I think that's the reason for the mistaken
17	misunderstanding. So I have discussed that with
18	Ms. Brizill, and the agenda was not incorrect.
19	It was me; I was the person who was incorrect.
20	So it was my error, and I'd like to correct that
21	on the record.
22	The Final Rulemaking that will occur

today will be of Chapters 3, Chapter 37, Chapter 1 2 42 and Chapter 43 of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations, and previously I had cited 3 4 the wrong Chapters because we had two proposed 5 rulemakings that went over the D.C. Register and they were published and the Chapters I cited are 6 7 currently still running until close of business today. But the Chapters, the correct Chapters, 8 9 as indicated by the agenda expired on the 22nd of April. And those are ready for Final Rulemaking. 10 11 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: Okav. 12 MR. McGHIE: So at this point can I 13 ask that the Board entertain a motion to accept 14 as Final Rulemaking the Chapters as indicated by Mr. SanFord? 15 16 MEMBER LEWIS: So moved. 17 MEMBER GILL: Second. 18 CHAIRMAN BENNETT: It has been 19 properly moved and second. I don't have any 20 additional questions. It's unanimous. 21 Rulemaking are final. We will, as I 22 said earlier, address the legislative changes at

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our May 29th meeting.
