CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: Good morning.
Welcome. I hereby call to order the regular
meeting of the Board of Elections for May 2015.
It is Thursday, May 14, 2015. The time is 10:34
a.m. We are meeting in Room 280 North of One
Judiciary Square.
I am Deborah K. Nichols, Chairman of
the Board of Elections and present with me this
morning is Board Member Stephen Danzansky. Also
present this morning are Mr. Clifford Tatum, the
Board's Executive Director; Ms. Cecily Collier-
Montgomery, the Board's Director of Campaign
Finance; and last, but not least, our General
Counsel, Mr. Kenneth McGhie.
Without objection, the agenda for this
morning's meeting is adopted.
Unless there are corrections to the
minutes, without objection the minutes of the
Board's meeting of April 8, 2015 are adopted.
Are there any matters that members of

1	the Board wish to raise in this public meeting?
2	MR. DANZANSKY: None, Madam Chair.
3	CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: All right,
4	hearing none, we will now receive the report of
5	the Board's Executive Director, Mr. Tatum.
6	MR. TATUM: Thank you, Madam Chair.
7	I have two items on my report agenda today. The
8	certification of the April 28, 2015 Special
9	Election for Wards 4 and Ward 8, members of the
10	Council, the District of Columbia, and general
11	matters.
12	As the Board is aware, we conducted an
13	April 28, 2015 special election in both Wards 4
14	and Ward 8. We tabulated votes on election night
15	
10	on April the 28th without incident. We processed
16	on April the 28th without incident. We processed special ballots over the course of the next seven
16	special ballots over the course of the next seven
16 17	special ballots over the course of the next seven days and finalized the completion of those
16 17 18	special ballots over the course of the next seven days and finalized the completion of those special ballots the week of April the 11th. We
16 17 18 19	special ballots over the course of the next seven days and finalized the completion of those special ballots the week of April the 11th. We tabulated absentees and special ballots on

the tabulation on Friday, April the 8th, which was the cutoff time for all absentee ballots. And special ballot information that we brought to our office for proofs.

On May the 11th, we conducted the 5 post-election audit by manually counting the 6 results in Precincts No. 55 and 65 in Ward 4 and 7 Precincts 118 and 122 in Ward 8. And as a result 8 9 of that manual audit, we determined that there 10 was a small discrepancy between the machine count 11 results and the hand count results. The 12 differences between the machine count and the 13 hand count are commonly the result of either 14 additional, incomplete marks made by a voter on 15 the ballot or counting errors on the part of the 16 audit teams. Each of these discrepancies was 17 within the margin of error specified by law of 18 .25 percent or 20 percent of the margin of 19 victory.

Accordingly, the results of the election did not change and as a result of that successful audit, we posted the audit report to

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the website for public viewing. We are now 1 2 asking the Board to certify the election results 3 for Ward 4 and Ward 8 with the following: the winner of the Ward 4 member of the contest for 4 5 Council of the District of Columbia is Brandon Todd with 4,584 votes. And the winner of the 6 7 Ward 8 member of the Council of the District of Columbia contest is LaRuby May, with 1,955 votes. 8 9 So Madam Chair, I would ask, the Board would ask 10 for a certification of these results and a motion 11 to that effect. 12 CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: All right. Ι 13 will entertain a motion to certify the results as 14 read into the record by Mr. Tatum of the April 15 28, 2015 special election to fill the Ward 4 and Ward 8 seats on the Council of the District of 16 17 Columbia. 18 MR. DANZANSKY: So moved, Madam Chair. 19 CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: All right, all 20 in favor, say aye. 21 (Chorus of ayes.) 22 All opposed, say nay. Hearing none,

the motion carries.

2 MR. TATUM: Thank you, Madam Chair. I'd ask that the certifications be made a part of 3 the record, as well as the certified election 4 5 results would be made a part of the record as well. 6 CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: All right. 7 MR. TATUM: We would post the 8 9 certified election results to the website after 10 this meeting. Madam Chair, on my agenda for general 11 12 matters, I have no general matters today, so that 13 concludes my report. 14 CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: Thank you, Mr. 15 A job well done by staff in carrying out Tatum. 16 the duties and responsibilities with regard to 17 the administration of the special election 18 conducted on April 28, 2015 in Wards 4 and 8. 19 We will move now to the General 20 Counsel's report, Mr. McGhie. 21 MR. McGHIE: Yes, I have two matters 22 and it's the same two matters I have been

reporting on for the last couple of months. It's
 the matter of Sewell versus Board of Elections
 and Miller versus the Board of Elections.

4 With regard to the Sewell matter, that matter was -- we filed our motion to dismiss and 5 it was dismissed by the Court of Appeals, but Mr. 6 Sewell immediately -- it was dismissed with 7 prejudice by the Court of Appeals. Mr. Sewell 8 9 immediately refiled his action. But because it 10 was dismissed with prejudice, the matter was, to 11 bring it to the court's attention, should be disposed of. So it is just a question of us 12 13 getting that before the court. It indicates the 14 court has scheduled a status hearing on June 15 19th, so I'm pretty sure it will get dismissed on 16 June 19th.

And with McMillian versus the Board, again, this is the person that filed a claim because of his allegation that "the rent is too damn high." We filed our motion to dismiss on April 10th. He was supposed to file on April 23rd. He did not file on April 23rd and so the court decided to give him an additional time to
 file in response to our motion to dismiss. So on
 May 4th, the court ordered that he file his
 response to our motion to dismiss by on or before
 June 3rd. That would conclude my litigation
 reporting.

7 CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: And one other 8 matter --

9 MR. McGHIE: And one more matter that 10 I have is that the Board has hired an ADA 11 coordinator and her name is Terrica Jennings. 12 She comes to us from the University of Legal 13 Services, so we'd like to welcome her at this 14 time to the Board.

15 CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: Welcome, Ms.
16 Jennings. We're happy to have you on board and
17 look forward to you doing great things in the
18 area of helping us to address ADA compliance
19 issues with regard to our polling places.
20 All right, with that, we will -- do
21 you have any questions, Mr. Danzansky?

MR. DANZANSKY: No, I have no

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questions.

CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: With that, we
will move on to the report of our campaign
finance, Ms. Montgomery.

MS. MONTGOMERY: Good morning, the 5 first thing I would like to report is that during 6 7 the month of April, on April 15th, the new website for the Office of Campaign Finance 8 9 launched. And with our new website, what we were 10 trying to address were the concerns of the public 11 that we received as a result of a survey that we 12 -- an online survey which we offered to members 13 of the public to give us their comments on our 14 website and that was done about a year or so ago. 15 And basically, even though the public was 16 satisfied with the content and the information 17 that was provided at the site, they were very 18 concerned with the fact that the site was not 19 easy to navigate. So the new website that was 20 launched addresses those -- that particular 21 concern. The website is less cluttered and it is 22 much easier to navigate.

During the month of April also staff 1 2 visited the early voting centers on April 23rd, 2015 and on election day they visited precincts 3 in both Wards 4 and 8. 4 In Ward 4, there were 15 5 precincts visited and in Ward 8, there were 9 precincts visited. And overall, the visits were 6 7 uneventful in terms of what the observations of the staff were. Where there was campaign 8 9 literature that did not have the proper 10 disclaimers, the staff brought that to the 11 attention of the campaign workers who were there 12 and the Office of the General Counsel followed up 13 with emails to the treasurers to let them know 14 that in the future they must have the disclaimers 15 on their campaign literature. 16 April the 1st was the deadline for the

filing of the report of receipts and expenditures by our constituent service program. There are 11 required filings and all of the programs timely filed and they were all electronically filed and certified their filings as well.

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With our Senator Representative

Statehood Fund program, there were three required
 filings on April the 1st and all three timely
 filed and electronically filed.

4 The Eight Day Pre-Special Election 5 report of receipts and expenditures was due on April the 20th, 2015 for our principal campaign 6 7 committees and PACs participating in the special election cycle. There were 79 required filers, 8 9 34 PCCs, and 45 PACs. Sixty-four timely filed 10 their reports and there were 25 PCCs and 39 PACs. 11 There was one late filer. With our failures to file, there were 15, 9 PCCs, and 6 PACs. 12 And one 13 of the failures to file was a paper filing and 14 again, I would again state that in the District 15 of Columbia, effective with our March 10 filing, 16 even though the law became effective on January 17 31, electronic filing is now mandatory and if 18 there's a paper submission, it's treated as a 19 failure to file. So there was one PCC which 20 submitted a paper filing and that was treated as 21 a failure to file.

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Overall, there was 16 referrals which

were made to the General Counsel for failure to 1 2 timely file the 8 Day Special Election Pre-Report of Receipts and Expenditures. The principal 3 4 campaign committees were K. Armstead for Ward 8; 5 Fleming 2015, Bell for Ward 8, Anderson Ward for Council, Help Lucius Gallion Help You, Committee 6 7 to Elect Ron Austin, Edwina for Ward 8, Whitaker for Ward 4, Corley for Ward 4, and Bruce Morrison 8 9 for Ward 4.

10 The Political Action Committees which 11 were referred were the Ward 6 Democrats, the Mid-12 Atlantic Regional Council of Carpenters PAC, BB&T 13 District of Columbia PAC, the Republican 14 Committee, Youth Action PAC, and the Credit Union 15 PAC of Washington.

With the entrance conferences for the month of April, we held two, one on April 9th, and one on April 23rd, 2015. With the entrance conference that was held on April 23rd, two of the participants were the treasurers of newly registered Political Action Committees who attended. And again, the training for new

treasurers and candidates is now mandatory in the
 District of Columbia. And those were Roy
 Russell, Treasurer of Democrats for Education
 Reform, which is an Independent Expenditure
 Committee, and also Jonathan Steingart, Treasurer
 for the Ward 1 Democrats.

7 On April 22nd, we also mailed letters to all of our active Principal Campaign 8 9 Committees, PACs, constituent services, and 10 statehood programs, as well as our initiative and 11 referendum committees to once again advise of our 12 new regulations and the changes in our law which 13 required that where committees or programs 14 received business contribution that they must 15 list the affiliated entities of those business 16 contributors because they do share a single 17 contribution limit.

In our audit branch during the month of April, the audit branch conducted 82 desk reviews. With respect to our ongoing audit, we have the full field audit of Gray for Mayor.
With periodic random audits for candidates

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1	registered for the 2015 election, we have the
2	Committee to Elect Natalie Williams from Ward 8,
3	Barry for Council, Friends of Leon Andrews and
4	Tengen for D.C.
5	We also have an ongoing audit with
6	respect to inaugural committees who registered
7	and that would be the DC Proud Inaugural
8	Committee, periodic random audits for the
9	candidates who registered for the 2014 election
10	which are ongoing, Ruth for Schools, Brian Hart
11	for DC. With respect to our continuing
12	committees, the Republic Committee DC, Morgan for
13	DC. Periodic random audits of candidates for the
14	Office of Attorney General, Lori Masters for
15	Attorney General and Smitty for AG. During the
16	month of April we issued three audits. One was
17	the Committee to Elect Eugene Puryear, April 7th,
18	2015. The second was Friends of Courtney R.
19	Snowden, which was issued on April 7th, 2015.
20	And the last one was Tengen for DC, April 13th,
21	2015 and those audits are available at our
22	website for review by members of the public. And

I would ask Mr. Sanford to give the Report of the
 Office of the General Counsel.

MR. SANFORD: Good morning, Madam 3 4 Chair, and distinguished Board Member Danzansky. 5 I am William Sanford, General Counsel for the Office of Campaign Finance. During the month of 6 7 April, the Office of the General Counsel received 21 referrals for informal hearings; 16 of the 8 referrals were from the Public Information and 9 10 Records Management Division; and 5 referrals were 11 from the Reports Analysis and Audit Division. 12 The Office of the General Counsel 13 conducted 16 informal hearings and issued 31 orders which included the following: 14 17 orders 15 were issued for failure to timely file in which 16 no fines were imposed; 2 orders were issued for 17 failure to timely respond to a request for 18 additional information in which no fines were 19 imposed; 9 orders were issued for failure to 20 timely file a report in which fines totaling 21 \$13,800 were imposed; 2 orders were issued for 22 failure to timely respond to a request for

1	additional information in which fines totaling
2	\$2,550 were imposed; and one order to vacate a
3	previous order upon the respondent's payment of
4	full payment of the fine was also issued.
5	Also, during the month of April, the
6	Office of the General Counsel imposed fines
7	against the following committees: Greater
8	Washington Board of Trade was fined \$100 for
9	failing to timely file the report. Bruce Majors
10	for Mayor was fined \$1,400. Beverly Wheeler for
11	Ward 1 was fined \$1,500. Martin Sterbal for U.S.
12	Senate was fined \$1,400. Carter at Large,
13	Christine Carter was fined \$1,400. Whitaker for
14	Ward 4 was fined \$2,000. Gaston 2014 was fined
15	\$2,000. Bell for Ward 8 was fined \$2,000.
16	Edwina for Ward 3 was fined \$2,000. Marc Morgan
17	for DC was fined \$2,200. And Marc Morgan for DC
18	was again fined \$350.
19	During the month of April, you
20	referenced the General Counsel, seven opened
21	investigations and no new investigations were
22	opened during that month. And during the month

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of April, the Office of the General Counsel 1 2 received one request for an alternative of payment and that was request was transmitted by 3 Sylvia E. Anderson, Esquire and it was regarding 4 5 campaign literature. The issue was whether or not the candidates and their committees were 6 7 permitted to bring campaign literature into a candidates' forum in a Department of Recreation 8 9 building and place that literature on a table 10 during the forum. We advised that they were 11 permitted to bring the literature into the forum 12 and make it available on a table, but we also 13 advised that they must remove the literature at the conclusion of the forum and that all 14 15 candidates must be given identical conditions to display their literature. They agreed to comply 16 17 with that advice.

During the month of April, the Office of the General Counsel did not conduct any show cause proceedings. And that should conclude my report.

CHAIRPERSON NICHOLS: Thank you, Mr.

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1	Sanford. Are there any questions of Ms.
2	Montgomery or her staff? All right, hearing
3	none, thank you.
4	Are there any public matters to be
5	brought before the Board this morning? Hearing
6	none and there being no further business before
7	the Board, this meeting is adjourned. The time
